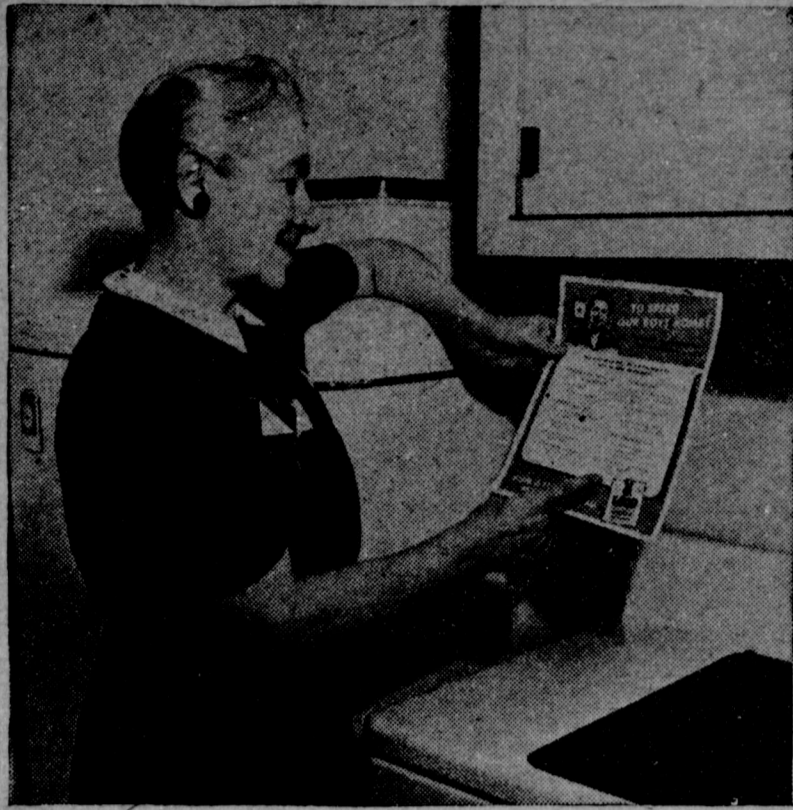

### SELECTING SEED PEANUTS

Choosing seed should be given first thought in making plans to meet the large peanut acreage. Albert Brient, county agent, says that to obtain good stands and high yields only seed of good germination quality should be planted.

The severe drought and extremely hot summer are responsible for a rather serious condition affecting peanut seed, especially in the principal commercial peanut growing areas of the state. Brient suggests that farmers who produced nuts of good quality store at least enough for their own planting needs. Even in the drier areas, he added, some farmers produced a fair crop of a quality suitable for planting. Peanuts which are sound and not shriveled, and which grade well on the market, should have good germination. Regardless, it will be well to have a germination test made before planting.

If too many farmers sell all of their peanuts now with the intention of buying planting seed next spring, Brient cautions that they may find it difficult to locate supplies of good seed. In that case they will have to take a chance on seed of inferior quality. Generally, this would be unfortunate for the grower because poor seed results in poor yields.

The Extension Service has been informed that on account of the large demand for meal, oil and edible peanuts, storage has been light this fall. Storage in previous years has been heavy.

Brient says that this condition makes it doubly important for farmers who produced good quality peanuts to store a supply for planting. They should be stored unshelled as peanuts in the shell retain germination better than shelled seed.

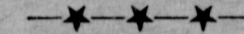

## Your Health

BY GEO. W. COX, M. D.

AUSTIN, TEXAS. — "This year, as possibly never before, it is necessary that precautions be taken to avoid the widespread incidence of common colds, ordinarily expected at this time of the year," cautions Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"Sickness, and the loss of manpower from colds alone can amount to a serious handicap to our necessary war effort production peak, but in addition, colds lower resistance to such an extent, individuals easily fall victim to other diseases," Dr. Cox said.

The State Health Officer urged persons suffering from a cold to use every precaution to prevent passing the disease on to others. The patient should avoid being

with others, preferably remaining in his own room in bed. He should cover his mouth and nose with a paper handkerchief when coughing or sneezing and the paper should be destroyed. All drinking glasses and dishes should be sterilized after he has used them.

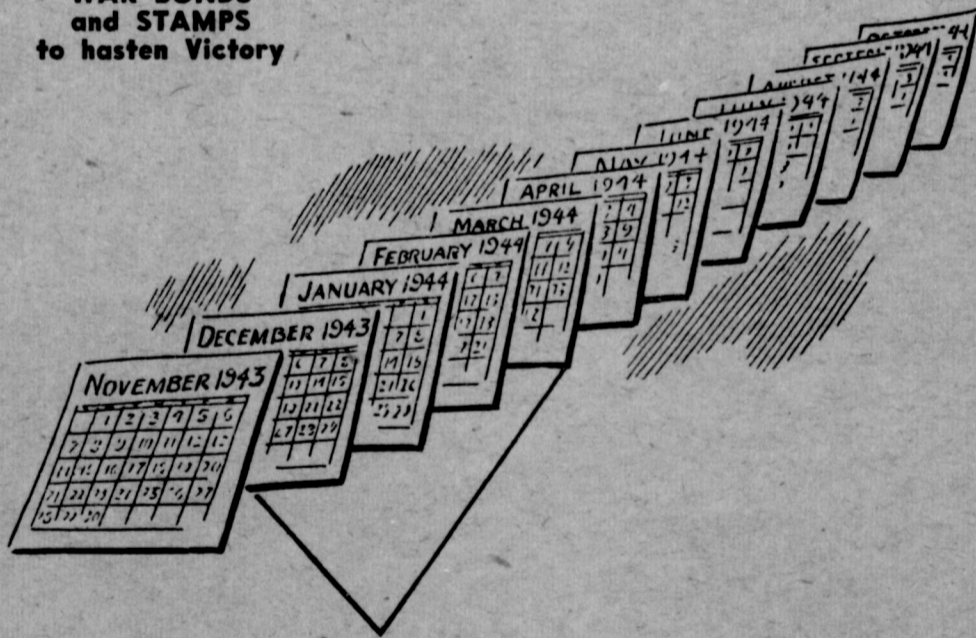
"The quickest and safest way to recover from a cold is to rest quietly in bed in a well ventilated room and drink plenty of water and fruit juices," Dr. Cox stated. "It is a dangerous procedure to try to 'wear a cold out.' In going about his usual routine a patient not only harms himself, but needlessly exposes all others with whom he comes in contact."
