One of the principal issues being discussed this week in the state convention of the Farm Bureau is the economic squeeze that seems inevitable for farmers as a result of the government's policy toward the energy crisis.

President Carter had his say months ago in calling up on the nation to conserve, but ignoring the inducements to produce more oil and gas. The president has even proposed a special tax on gasoline and diesel to discourage people from using it freely. He rightfully reasons that this extra price boost piled on top of the increases caused by scarcity will make the energy supply go farther. It stands to reason that public response will increase as the financial pinch increases.

But farmers don't have the same kind of inducement. They can't reduce consumption because planting, cultivating and harvesting need as much fuel as ever. Also they'll need the same amount of fertilizer, which is a petroleum product, and they'll pay more for tires, likewise made from petroleum. The result is that the cost of producing on a farm keeps going up whereas farm income keeps shrinking.

Solution to the farm dilemma has two approaches. Something should be done to improve the farmer's income establishing a better ratio between the things he buys and the things he sells. For instance as quoted by someone a few days ago, two bushels of wheat used to buy a pair of shoes, now it takes ten bushels.

At the same time relief is needed at the other side of the dilemma. We need production of oil and gas to force the prices down by the old time economic law of supply and demand.

Here is where official policy has been at fault for years. A short sighted congress pampered people of the North and East by forcing Texans to furnish them gas at reduced prices. Elementary economics should have told those people that producers with a depressed market had no incentive to seek and develop reserves. The low price on oil had a similar effect.

Meanwhile the official ear was constantly turned to the complaints of environmental extremists. The Alaska pipeline was delayed while the fault finders fretted about possible oil spills. The same excuse was used to delay development of off shore production. For the same reason nuclear development is delayed on the theory that some catastrophe may possibly result. In holding up this progress they are ignoring the fact that many nuclear plants have been in service for years and under perfect control.

The situation involves more than a squeeze on farmers and higher bills to us average consumers. It is first and foremost a matter of national security. Considering our dependence on foreign oil imports, the nation would face a terrible shortage if the outside flow were suddenly cut off. Think what would happen if our energy supply were cut in half. How would it affect us? (Continued on Page 12)

## Registration Begins for Christmas Multi-Drawing

With the community's annual Christmas parade and drawing only a month away, Muenster business firms are starting registrations for the big event. ## Tigers, Knights Meet Saturday in TCIL Title Game

The Tiger football field, at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, will be the scene of a shootout for the TCIL District 4-A championship. It will be the occasion for the clash of Sacred Heart with Notre Dame of Wichita Falls, both of whom will bring a 2-0 record into the game. And it will be the big event of Sacred Heart's homecoming.

Anticipation is soaring at the school this week as the Tigers and their fans eagerly look forward to another chance at the honor they missed last year by the narrow margin of 20-15. They are determined that this is the time to avenge that loss.

A look at comparative records so far plus the home field advantage establishes them as slight favorites over the Knights. They were 26-3 winners over Tyler Gorman and 26-0 winners over Christ the King of Lubbock whereas Notre Dame barely nudged the Tyler boys 21-20 and topped the Lubbock boys 14-6. For the entire season Sacred Heart stands at 8-1 and Notre Dame at 5-4.

Team comparisons favor the Notre Dame line and the Sacred Heart backfield. Knights will have the weight advantage with four men up front ranging between 190 and 200. The backfields are nearly equal in size, both averaging near 160. However the speed of Walterscheid and Sicking plus the power runs of Bartush should be in Sacred Heart's favor. The Knights are expected to depend heavily on their big linemen and keep their backs pounding at the inside. The team has used passes sparingly and has been effective in the few attempts.

The Tigers, on the other hand are expected to continue relying on their open game, including sweeps and options and passes.

Physical condition of the Tigers is reported as up to par. The only effects from last week's game were the usual bruises, which normally heal before the next game.

**Muenster Favors One Amendment**

Only 116 persons voted Tuesday in the election on constitutional amendments and they opposed all propositions except one by strong majorities. By more than 2 to 1 they favored Number 3 on denial of bail to repeat criminals.

On this proposal they agreed with the rest of the state by voting for and on Numbers 5 and 6 they agreed by voting against. The other four issues, approved here, were opposed statewide.

Combined voting in the two local boxes was as follows. No. 1: 72-40 against; No. 2: 63-48 against; No. 3: 83-32 for; No. 4: 74-37 against; No. 5: 69-42 against; No. 6: 81-35 against; No. 7: 70-38 against.

**Purchase of New Improved Radar Okayed by City**

A sophisticated new radar camera, like those currently in use by the Department of Public Safety, will monitor speed on Muenster streets in the future. City councilmen at Monday's meeting voted to buy the unit.

It will differ principally from the city's present model in that it can be used in a moving vehicle whereas the old radar had to be operated from a stationary position. Informed speeders know that an officer in motion could not check them except by actually following. The new model reveals the speed regardless of direction of travel of the officer's car or the other. If two or more cars are in view it will select the faster one and blank out the others.

The council also heard a request for annexation by Don Hess for the area in the Y of Highway 82 and the gravel road just north of the new Valenite building west of town. The old building there is to be replaced by a convenience store owned by Don Hess and Sylvan Walterscheid. The council postponed action and will consider it along with the proposed annexation across the road.

The county's request for two years of free service by the Muenster Fire Department at rural fires was turned down. The county asked to be relieved of the expense while getting its ambulance service organized. The council reasoned that residents here are paying their share for the ambulance and the city does not feel obligated to provide the free fire protection.

Action was taken on a new federal regulation requiring unemployment compensation for municipal employees. It becomes effective January 1 and applies to \$6000 of a person's pay. Cities have the option of paying 1 per cent a year on the \$6000 for each employee or compensating the federal government if and when a compensation payment has been made. The council chose to pay the 1 per cent, which amounts to \$480 a year for its eight employees.

Also, the city voted to return to its former owner the area of 5th Street between Weinzapfel and Ash Streets. It had been given for use as a street, but the street is not wanted.

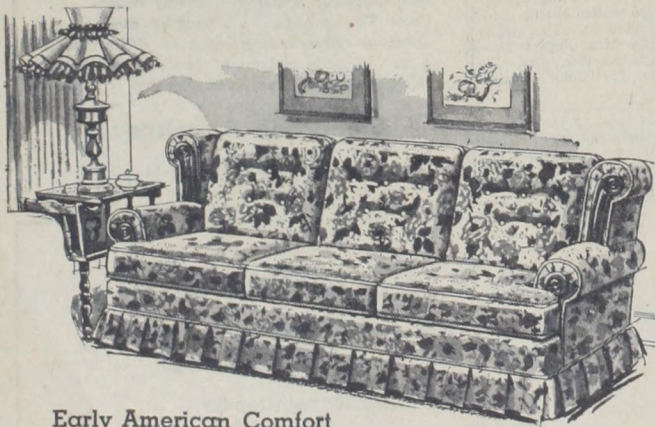

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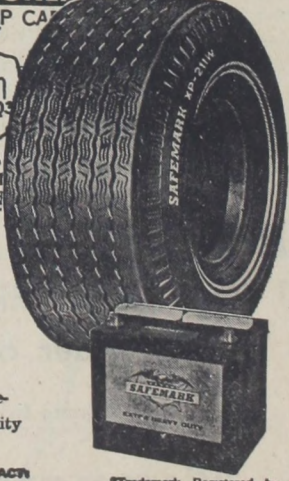
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
