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An interesting observation by Congressman Omar Burlison is that conservatives and conservative causes may have been more successful in the last year or two than many might think. As he sees it, liberal and left wing groups meeting recently in Washington seem to think that is the case.

A broad cross section of liberal organizations agreed to join in an alliance to help each other meet what they perceive to be a growing challenge from the conservatives, whom they call "right wingers." Meeting in the headquarters of the National Education Association, their purpose, according to participants, is to provide a central clearing house of information on "the right wing." According to Human Events, they have chosen to name their organization "Interchange Resource Center" (IRC).

Besides NEA, organizations represented at the founding meeting included AFL-CIO, Coalition of American Public Employees, National Organization for Women, National Women's Political Caucus, National Council of Churches, National Consumers League, Congress Watch and American Civil Liberties Union. They reportedly had the common opinion that "we have all been taking a beating from the right wing."

A representative from Wisconsin was quoted as saying that the liberal groups "had only recently come to appreciate the nature and extent of the threat from the new right." She said she had been campaigning for the equal rights amendment and was disturbed by the efficiency of the right wing opposition.

The right wing was identified with such organizations as National Right to Work Committee, Young Americans for Freedom, Americans Against Union Control of Government, Organized Opposition to the Panama Canal Treaties, Stop ERA, Right to Life, Conservative Caucus, and other organizations which the liberals consider to be ultra-conservative.

Issues on which these conservatives were conceded to have had an impact are equal rights, abortion, consumer protection legislation, so-called labor law reform, anti-gun control, spending on social programs, defense preparedness and many others.

To more effectively oppose the conservative efforts on those issues the new liberal alliance proposes to set-up regional and local seminars and workshops to promote their favorite causes. They also propose to put interested groups in contact with speakers and experts to promote their views. Many of the groups, if not all, pledge money and other resources in-

## Open House Shows New Kindergarten

Muenster Public School's new kindergarten building, the first completed unit in a \$490,000 expansion and improvement program, was shown Monday, May 15, at an open house from 7 to 9 p.m.

Actually shown was the entire elementary building which includes the new addition plus the area formerly used by grades K through 6. Present space is an increase of about 60 per cent over that in previous use.

The new part of the building, consisting principally of grades K and 1, was favored with the visitors' principal attention . . . and admiration. It features bright and cheerful classroom colors along with arrangement and facilities in keeping with the newest teaching theories.

Almost half of the new space is taken up by the kindergarten classroom measuring some 50x40 feet. It has two areas with different types of facilities for work and play type of learning. Under the present arrangement of separate morning and afternoon classes, one area is used and then the other. But if kindergarten is put on a full time schedule there will be two classes in session and exchanging areas for the work or play types of instruction. Because of the size of the room neither class will be disturbed by the presence of the other.

The other classroom is the first grade, also featuring bright, cheerful colors in furniture, floors and walls. It is less than half the size of the K class, partly because it has less variety of facilities and partly because of the smaller enrollment.

Other rooms of the new wing are the Resource Center (teachers' work and planning room), a speech therapy room, a Plan A room and the rest rooms.

And there is one more room, a product of the school board's effort to conserve energy. It is the heat storage room in the solar heating system. . . . filled with 12 1/2 cubic yards of egg-size rocks.

Solar screens on the roof collect heat from the sun, and the heated air is circulated through the rocks to heat them. Also by air circulation the stored heat is taken from the reservoir as needed to heat the rooms. This heat is expected to keep the building at the proper temperature in normal times, and a heat pump will be used for additional heat in severe cold or extended periods without sunshine. Workmen on the job during the past severe weather were kept comfortable by the system.

The other part of the enlarged and improved building is the original elementary. Its remodeling job consisted principally of moving partitions to enlarge classrooms 4, 5 and 6 by 50 per cent each. Left over space was about half of a previous classroom which is

## ASC Final Sign-up Extends to May 31

Cooke County ASC Committee advises area farmers that the final date to sign up to participate in the 1978 cotton, feed grain and wheat programs has been extended to May 31. Also, the final date to report acreages of wheat, oats and barley has been extended to May 31.

The 1978 target price for wheat has been raised to \$3.40 per bushel. Producers are reminded to consider this in deciding whether to sign up in the program. They are also advised that failure to sign up excludes them from all program benefits, including commodity loans, deficiency payments and protection under the disaster program. This could have a bearing on program eligibility in the future.

## Set-Aside Acres Clearing Overdue

The current bulletin of Cooke County ASC Committee reports that recent spot checks on some farms show that small grain crops on set-aside acreage are still not disposed of. Producers are reminded that if these crops are harvested from set-aside acres, the farm will be ineligible for program benefits.

Small grain crops on set-aside acreage must be clipped or plowed in a stubble mulch manner. Grain sorghum on set aside acres must be done away with in a similar manner by June 15.

## Jaycee Award Goes to R. N. Fette For No. 1 Citizen

The flabbergasted honoree could hardly believe it Saturday night when he heard himself identified as this year's selection by Muenster Jaycees as the community's outstanding citizen. But R. N. Fette eventually recovered sufficiently to respond with a few random remarks about surprise and pride and being very, very grateful.

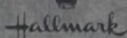

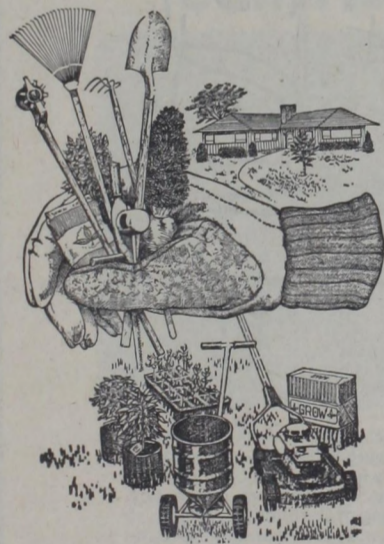


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# Pride in Country Urged at Muenster High Graduation

Being proud of our country, appreciating the sacrifices of those who made it great, and resolving to carry on its ideals and traditions were the recommendations made to Muenster High School graduates at their commencement service last Thursday night.

Stanley White of the Smith Douglas Company, in his graduation address, told them they are heirs to the world's highest standards of freedom and progress because of what men of the past had done for them . . . men like Washington, McCormick, Woolworth and Kennedy. The long history of progress through sacrifice started with the Pilgrims and still goes on.

He reminded them also to appreciate Christ even more than our nation's forefathers. As the source of our spiritual heritage and civilization's highest standard of human dignity, He is our greatest benefactor.

The speaker illustrated with a brief comparison of American and Soviet life. To be on a par with the Russians we would have to give up most of our comforts and freedoms and live in fear of being betrayed for expressing an idea. Also he said that a Swiss bank had sought a computer idea on the best place to live. With a feed-in of all possible factors of life, both good and bad, the computer showed the U.S. by a big margin as the best place to be.

White said that the graduate's aim should be to keep and improve what we have through perseverance and hard work. Stay with the ideal, he urged, recalling that "quitters don't win and winners don't quit."

A companion thought was presented to the grads in their baccalaureate address by Father Placidus Eckart. He emphasized responsibility as a characteristic of a happy, rewarding life. First be responsible to God because His way is the right way. Related and likewise important is responsibility to self for the pride and satisfaction it gives. And there's responsibility to others, especially spouse and family, for the happiness it conveys. The measure of a good deed, he said, is not what it does for me but for others.

Diplomas were presented to the class by Urban Endres, president of the school board, with the assistance of Superintendent L. B. Bruns, as class sponsors, Robert McDaniel and Patsy Sloan, changed rings and tassels. And Principal Alfordan Winn presented scholarship awards to Deryl Zimmerman, valedictorian, Jack Endres, salutatorian, and Cindy Sangster, girl with the highest average. Each of the three received a scholarship to a church related school and Zimmerman also received a scholarship to a state supported university. Zimmerman and Endres also received trophies for their high averages.

Also on the program were the valedictory and salutatory by the two class leaders, an instrumental selection by Ruth Walterscheid and Jack Endres accompanied by Miss Bettye Dodds, invocation by Adam Wolf, vice president of the board, and benediction by Edmund Fleitman, secretary of the board. Miss Dodds played for the processional and recessional.
