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With the Panama Canal giveaway accomplished just a few weeks ago, the Carter Administration appears to be cooking up another incident to make Americans ashamed.

This time it's the sell out of an old ally, the Republic of China (ROC) on Taiwan. One might note that this situation is especially significant because ROC is the last remnant of a great nation remaining after US had betrayed it to Communism in the early fifties.

In almost a quarter century since then Taiwan has been a model of freedom and progress. It has been a constant embarrassment to Red China, developing a high standard of living through free enterprise while the conquering reds had a miserable record of regimentation, fear and oppression.

This proud little country, the final link with many centuries of Chinese heritage, which has merited world wide admiration in just a quarter century of progress and heroism, is now marked as the next victim of our country's detente with the enemy.

Regarded as a sure sign of this development is a trip to Peking this week by Brezinski, the President's top security adviser, at the precise time (May 20), when ROC will install its new head of state, a ceremony to which the Free Chinese attach great importance.

As if to remove any doubt about the administration's intention, the man declared a few weeks ago in a speech before the Japan Society in Washington that "as a central element of our global policy it is important that we make progress in normalizing our relations with China".

The same message was conveyed by Secretary of State Cyrus Vance in his April 30 appearance on the TV show, Face the Nation. He said "Normalization of relations with China is one of the fundamental goals of the Carter Administration. I would hope that during the first term we would be able to normalize relations".

As pointed out in Human Events "Everyone in the diplomatic business knows what normalization really means — the end of formal ties with the ROC. The Communist Chinese refuse to establish full diplomatic relations with US until Washington severs diplomatic links with Taiwan, withdraws US troops from the island country and abrogates the 1954 defense treaty. All this, apparently, we are prepared to do."

US has already informed ROC's ambassador to US that if he returns home this country will not accept another ambassador from Taiwan. Also, since 1973 US has reduced its troop strength on Taiwan from 10,000 to 1,000, and the rest will likely be withdrawn soon. In that connection manipulators of the sellout are wondering how to gracefully dump the defense treaty without letting it look like what it is — abandoning an ally.

All this is both humiliating and frightening. Our country which ended World War II less than forty years ago as the most powerful of them all and also the world wide defender of freedom and independence, has been declining pitifully in both respects.

Following the present dry week the moisture measure continues at 2.39 inches for the month and 12.82 for the year.

Great Season in Track Ends for Muenster Hornets

Coach Don Ostermann's Muenster High track team has enjoyed an outstanding season of four first places and four seconds, including the 13-A championship, in its eight track meets of the season.

The last of the honors came last Saturday when Deryl Zimmerer placed fourth in the 800 meter run at the UIL state meet. He advanced to state by winning second place in the regional meet to which eight Hornets had qualified at the district meet.

Competing several times with Classes 2A and 3A, the team got its championship at Graham, Chico, Saint Jo and the district. Second places were earned at Olney, Pilot Point, Healdton and Dickson.

Along the way they broke three MHS track records and tied two. Bryan Sicking tied the long jump record with 19' 11 1/2" and beat the high hurdles record with 14.9. Deryl Zimmerer set a new record of 1:57.8 in the 800 meter run; Carl Pagel set a record of 52 3/4" for the shot put; Kevin Klement tied at 6'2" in the high jump.

Qualifiers for regional were Bryan Sicking in high and intermediate hurdles, the long jump and the mile relay. He placed fifth in the two hurdles events. Also Deryl Zimmerer in the 800 and mile relay; he was second in the 800. Bert Walterscheid qualified in shot put and discus, and placed 4th in discus. David Felderhoff qualified in the mile and placed 6th. Other qualifiers were Nick Walterscheid and Todd Richey in the mile relay, Carl Pagel in shot put and Kevin Klement in high jump.

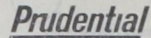

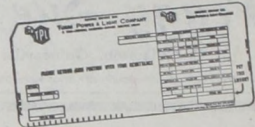
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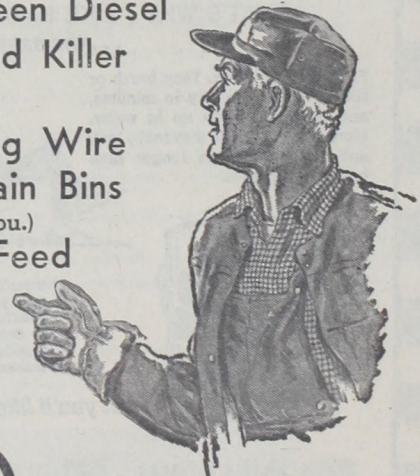

County College Will Have Classes In Scuba Diving

A new and exciting world will be opened to persons participating in a special community service course to be offered soon at Cooke County College.

Scuba diving lessons for those interested in exploring this underwater world will begin during the last week in May at CCC, sponsored by the college's Division of Continuing Education.

According to Dr. Jerry Bayless, dean of Continuing Education, dates for the class sessions are May 21, 22, 24, 25, 29, 31, and June 2, 3 and 4.

Interested persons are urged to be present at the first session Sunday, May 21, 2 p.m. in the faculty lounge. Depending on enrollment, Bayless said, "we may set up two or more classes with flexible meeting schedules to accommodate all."

He adds that each class will require a minimum enrollment of eight persons and will be held to no more than 10.

The course will be comprised of seven training sessions involving classroom work and pool training in addition to two lake dives. Cost for participation is \$75.

Instructor for the course will be Dan Hamric, a certified diving instructor with more than five years' experience. He is associated with the Dive Shop in Ardmore, Okla.

Hamric explains that each of the regular sessions will involve one and a half hours of classroom instruction and an equivalent amount of time spent on application of technique and equipment training in a swimming pool.

The \$75 fee will cover all necessary diving equipment except for mask, snorkel and fins. Participants may, however, want to wait until the first class meeting to get advice on the most appropriate type of such accessories to purchase. They will be made available during the first class session to those who have not yet acquired them.

"We will cover all the fundamentals of diving during the course, and we will spend a considerable amount of time actually in the water," says Hamric. "But the real payoff is when we get out of just a swimming pool and get into the real underwater world on our lake dives."

Persons who satisfactorily complete the course will be certified divers and be issued a card by the National Association of Skindiving Schools. Persons who do not hold such cards are not allowed to purchase air for their scuba tanks at dive shops.

According to Dr. Jerry Bayless, dean of Continuing Education at CCC, tentative dates for the class sessions are May 21, 22, 24, 25, 29, 31, and June 2, 3 and 4.

"Persons who are interested should call as soon as possible," Bayless stresses. "Depending on the interest, we may set up two or more classes with flexible meeting schedules to accommodate everyone who wants to participate."

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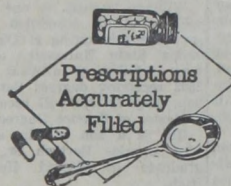
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Dan Sicking Is Summa Cum Laude Graduate at A&M

Comments on the outstanding success of Germanfest held the attention of Chamber of Commerce members at their regular monthly meeting Tuesday, May 9.

President John Pagel said that, with just a few exceptions, the whole show was conducted in good order, food and drinks were plentiful, entertainment was good and took up almost all of the available time. Also the crowd was the biggest ever in Muenster, people obviously enjoyed themselves, and it was a financial success.

Reporting on the finances, David Bright, treasurer said some receipts and some bills are still due, however it is certain that the festival was good business to the concessions and the Chamber. He added that the profit will enable the chamber to make full payment for the rest rooms that were built just before. He estimated that total volume of Germanfest business was about \$75,000 whereas the guess was \$50,000 last year. Attendance as well as amount was estimated at 50 per cent increase over 1977.

Biggest of the faults was the traffic jam during the Fun Run when emergency vehicles were delayed in reaching runners who needed help. The situation could have been serious if the need had been more serious. Also more seating space and lower prices in some areas would be preferable. And there were occasional bottlenecks in serving, especially at the beer stand. Those things will be studied by chamber directors with a view to improving for next year.

Probably the most appreciated of the facilities was the pavilion, which was entertainment headquarters for the duration. Along with a number of local produced musical numbers and folk dances it had a German band from NTSU, an accordion and drum trio from Dallas, and an orchestra from Sheppard AFB. Each of them entertained for hours and spread the festive spirit over all the park. Their contribution to Germanfest was described as enormous.

Talk at the chamber meeting referred to repeating the good features and eliminating the problems for next year's show, which is already taken for granted.

At the motion of Mayor Leonard Endres the chamber gave a round of applause to Chairman John Pagel for a fine job of supervising the festival.
