### Taxpayers begin fundraising for fees

and Cooke County since 1936

Members of the Cooke County
Taxpayers Association have begun
fundraising efforts to pay for
future legal fees, but stopped
short of making a commitment to
file a lawsuit against the Cooke
County Commissioners Court until they have a chapte to confertil they have a chance to confer with an attorney.

CCTA members met in a special meeting last Friday. They were organizers of a petition drive requesting a county rollback election that has been denied on a 4-1 vote by the commissioners court.

Owen Fulton, a member of the Denton Taxpayers Association, told CCTA members what they'd be facing should they decide to file suit against Cooke County. The DCTA was successful in reversing a decision by the Denton County Commissioners that resulted in a rollback vote last month. Should they decide to file suit, the CCTA they decide to file suit, the CCTA plans to work with Denton Attor-ney Bill Trantham, who was suc-cessful in fighting the Denton County suit for the Denton tax-

County suit for the Denton tax-payers group, said Virgil Welch, CCTA president.

"As you know, it was a long, drawn-out affair between Denton County and the Denton County Taxpayers," said Fulton, who said the case took almost three yearstoresolve.

He told the group that their case could very well go to the Texas Supreme Court, as did Denton County's case, because there are


Supreme Court, as did Denton County's case, because there are still many provisions of the state's property tax code which governs rollback petitions that have never been tested in court.

Since the 8-1 Supreme Court decision in the Denton County taxpayers' favor, legislation has been enacted to clarify further the provision of the code referring to the collection of signatures on petitions, he said.

Cooke County commissioners rejected petition srequesting a rollback election last week after an attorney told them that, in his opinion, supplemental petitions submitted by organizers were invalid. CCTA members claim they were forced to submit supplemental petitions by mail because the courthouse was closed for four consecutive days during the Thanksgiving holidays. ### Dry weather sparks area grass fires

Six Cooke and Montague coun-ty fire departments battled unseasonable cold, windy, dry weather last Friday afternoon in an attempt to keep a raging grass

fire under control.

The fire started along the county road north of the Meador Hay Meadow, burning approximately 120 acres of grassland and a number of large round hay bales. The fire departments prevented the flames from reaching a hay barn and equipment located on the Meador pasture.

High winds and tall dry grass along the old MKT railroad allowed the blaze to jump over the Copper Switch road in several places, burning an undetermined amount of acreage on the old Ed Wolf farm, with fire reaching the yard

of the Charlie Wolf home

The extreme cold hampered fire fighting efforts: though departments' equipment remained operational, local ranchers' sprayers froze. Wet sacks used by volunteers and neighbors would freeze between fighting one hot spot to another.

"Insulated fire suits helped tremendously in battling the cold," said Muenster Chief Herbie Knabe.

An unknown amount of water was used, with Muenster's truck estimated spraying around 5,000 gallons of water. "We loaded from a pond on the farm three times," Knabesaid.

Sunday morning the Muenster Fire Department responded to a small grass fire at the Oscar

Walter farm east of town. The blaze, caused by burning trash, was quicky extinguished.

Monday afternoon Myra's Volunteer Fire Department answered a fire call at Ron Page's, south of Myra. An aerosol can exploded in a burning trash barrel, starting a grass fire. No one was at home at the time and high winds spread the fire to 157 big round hay bales, all of which were lost.

"They (Myra department) were here quickly," Page said, "but it was too late."

Volunteers prevented the flames from spreading by lighting back fires around the blazing hay.

"As long as it doesn't rain and

"As long as it doesn't rain and the low humidity and wind con-tinue, everything is crispy dry," Knabe warned.

### A message to the community

from the pastor of Sacred Heart Church

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In response to many, many requests (verbal, written and phoned), for printed or taped copies of the homily presented by Father Victor Gillespie at the funeral of Travis Klement, the pastor of Sacred Heart Church has graciously submitted a copy of his statements reflecting his heartfelt thoughts at the funeral Mass for the young man. Travis Klement died at age 18, following a long struggle with leukemia.

#### Funeral of Travis Lee Klement, Dec. 13, 1989

There are those who will say that our prayers for Travis were not answered, that there was no miracle, that Travis is dead. May I submit to you that all three of those statements are false. Our prayers were answered. Though there was no miraculous cure for Travis, I truly believe that we have winessed many other miracles in answer to our prayers, and that Travis still lives.

I saw a miracle last Sunday evening. We had gathered here for the conferral of the Sacrament of Confirmation on 34 of our young people, and we made the first public announcement of Travis's death earlier that afternoon. And numerous heads visibly bowed and tears welled in many eyes at this sad news. But we had just sung in the entrance hymr: 'lesus is life!' And we knew in our hearts that Travis was not really dead, but that he was with Jesus, and Jesus is life.

"Pure coincidence, Father," some may say, But there were too many coincidences last Sunday evening as we continued the fitting of Confirmation and sang hymns that were meant for us, but they must have also been meant for Travis, for Robert and Gloria, their other children and the grandparents. Let me try to illustrate by tying together some of the words we sang Sunday evening with what I believe were miracles of grace.

I saw in Baylor Hospital the miracle of a Mother's love for her critically ill son, a Mother's love which would not permit her to sleep for more than a few minutes at a time. But we sang these words, and surely these same thoughts came to Gloria in the dar- of night." Bestill, be still, and know that I am withyou." And to her son, we sang in God's name: "Before you were born, Travis, I knew you; within your mother's womb, I formed you. "By name I have called you, Travis, by name I will save you; by name you are Mine, you are precious tome... Forever, with you I will be,"

I saw the miracle of a Father who must have felt so utterly helpless as he saw his son grow weaker and weaker. And so we sang for Robert's heart speake therefor to min." And Robert's heart speake

will come when we put our hands together. I believe that we can find the way."

There are two things I ask each one of you to do in memory of Travis. First, be detached from the glittering material things of this world. Now Travis would not have used those words; he might not have known what I was talking about. But Travis would say, as he did say to his parents, "I don't need a fancy, new pickup; just something that will get me there and back."


This was such a good example of Travis who was happy with the simple things in life, things like God's good earth, fields of grain, bales of hay, newborn calves, and a good riding horse.

The second thing I ask of you to do in memory of Travis is much more difficult. I ask each of you to love and respect everyone in this community, no matter which school they choose. I beg you to root out of your lives all the anger, and, yes, the hatred that has divided this community for decades because of our school situation. Let not a derogatory word about either school, or any teacher, or any parent, or any student ever sully our lips. I am speaking principally to you adults; remember that the students in that poster have already joined hands; you are the ones who have fed this cancer that has contaminated our comones who have fed this cancer that has contaminated our com-munity for years. But now, let us forgive one another; let us forget the past; let us be reconciled with one another; let us strive

forget the past; let us be reconciled with one another; let us strive with all our might to bring peace and unity to this parish.

I believe we can find the way. Let us do what we sang last Sunday evening: "in the day of the Lord, we will put our hands together... I believe it will come when we put our hands together. I believe we can find the way. I believe we can find the way." I believe that Travis wants us to find the way. I believe, by his suffering and death, he has started us on the way. I believe that mow wants to help us on the way. And to find that way to peace and unity in our community would be the greatest miracle of all, done in the memory of Travis Lee Klement.

### Lindsay City gives notice to cable company

The Lindsay City Council has directed its attorney to give 30 days notice to the Houston company that holds the city's cable franchise that it is proceeding with legal steps to be released from its contract.

The city has been complaining to officials of WGA Cable Co., located near Houston, about continual poor service to the city's approximately 120 customers. After meeting with officials last month, detailing the problems of alleged poor reception and requesting a written timeline of when corrections would be made, there has been little, if any progress, said Lindsay Mayor Don Metzler.

"We can't see the improvement at all, and we're tired of dealing with them," said Metzler. He said the city will proceed with legal steps to get released from the contract, and is awaiting a reply from the contract, and is awaiting a reply from

The council, at its regular December meeting, turned down a zoning change requested by Frank Haverkamp. Haverkamp was requesting that a large lot on the east end of Main Street be divided into two smaller lots for building sites. The council unanimously turned down the request, stating that adjacent property owners were concerned that houses built on a divided site would not fit in with those houses already in that sec-

Evergreens and winter hardy

flowers such as pansies, daisies and snap dragons should be given more care to ensure enough moisture to survive on. Trees and shrubs that were planted this summer, as well as any planted this winter, should be provided with ample water. It takes about a full year for plants to take hold.

"In this part of the country roots continue to develop all winter long," he commented.
"Many people may not be aware that they can continue to use underground water sprinkler systems year-round as long as they don't use them during subfreezing weather."

Dry, litchy skin, dry nasal membranes and numerous shocks are among discomforts people are affilicted with during such cold, dry weather.

### Holiday travelers should keep safe motoring

Motorists planning to drive across rural stretches of Texas during the holidays should be on the lookout for one more traffic hazard - deer and occasionally cattle on the roadways foraging for winter feet. winter food.

winter food.

Traffic statistics kept by the Texas Department of Public Safety show that over the last four years animal-vehicle collisions have accounted for an average of 4,100 accidents and nearly a dozen deaths annually. In 1988, for example, nine people were killed and ample, nine people were killed and 901 people were injured in 3,891 acidents.

Most of these accidents occur in Most of these accidents occur in rural areas, and many involve deer and cattle, said Thomas D. Valco, a safety expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Drivers should be particularly vigilant this winter, he said, because drought conditions in many parts of Texas will attract deer and other animals to roadways in search of food.

in search of food.
Valco said some motorists who drive frequently in deer country have installed ultra-high frequency warning devices on their cars. Several of these gadgets are on the market; typically one is mounted on a bumper, and it emits a high pitched signal caused by the force of air when the vehicle is in mo-

Auto-

tion. The noise is supposed to frighten a deer as the vehicle approaches.

"They could be helpful for motorists driving at night or when fog reduces visibility," hesaid.
Extension Wildlife Specialist Charles Ramsey said motorists should not be lulled into a false sense of security by use of the ultrasonic "fright devices."

"The warning device will not be

"The warning device will not be effective if a deer is hungry or a buck is interested in following the doe ahead of him," Ramsey said. "Winter is the mating season for deer."

deer."

Animal-vehicle accidents are not a high-percentage traffic risk; in 1988, for example, the nine people killed accounted for only 0.3 percent of all traffic fatilities. Even so, Valco said, many of these accidents may be prevented by taking some presuitions.

these accidents may be prevented by taking some precautions. He said that slowing down when approaching "Deer Crossing" signs along the highway is prudent defensive driving. "Deer also tend to travel in groups, so if you spot one, look about for others."

"If you see a deer on the road, don't try to drive around it because it might dodge in front of you," Valco said. "Blow your horn and flip your headlights from low to high beam.

### 1988 rabies overview detailed

Laboratory confirmed rabies in Public Health Region 5 (PHRS), consisting of 50 counties in the North Central Texas area, totaled 113 cases during 1988, an increase over the 79 cases reported in 1987. Skunks comprised 95 percent of the total, but of most interest was the increase in cat and dog rabies, detailed below.

During 1988 there were 11 cats and five dogs in PHRS confirmed by laboratory examination to be rabid. This represents almost a two-fold increase for each of these species over the previous year. These cases occurred at residences in small urban localities and farms. Eight of the 11 rabid cats and one of the rabid dogs bit a total of 11 people including some veterinary personnel. As a consequence of the bites, exposure to saliva and direct contact with these rabid animals, 41 individuals received post-exposure rabies prophylaxis.

Whereas all of the five dogs were owned, two of the cats were

Whereas all of the five dogs were owned, two of the cats were strays and the remaining nine cats were characterized as barnyard cats. Six (55 percent) of the cats and three (60 percent) of the dogs were three months of age or younger. The remaining cats and dogs were described as adults.

None of the eligible animals were

None of the eligible animals were vaccinated against rabies except for one dog which had been vaccinated with Endurall-R, modified live rabies virus vaccine about 13 months prior to the onset of rabies. Nine (82 percent) of the cats and three (60 percent) of the dogs were females.

Three of the dog cases and three of the four cat cases had histories suggestive of exposure to possibly rabid skunks. The estimated period of incubation in dogs ranged from 11 to 35 days and in cats from 14 to 19 days. All monoclonal antibody identification of rabies virus isolates from dogs and cats in this region point to infection with rabies virus of skunk origin.

Although eight of the cats were involved in biting accidents of humans, there were, with one ex-ception, no known attacks on other animals. Only two of the biting cats were described as ag-

gressive. Generally some behavorial changes were noted in the cats followed by weakness and paralysis of the hindquarters. One of the five dogs, a Doberman mix, was described as aggressive, attacking three family dogs and five neighbor's dogs. Subsequently, it scaled a six-foot cement wall and viciously attacked and killed a dog in an addioning kennel of the in an adjoining kennel of the veterinary clinic where it had been confined. The dog died shortly after the last attack.

after the last attack.
Fortunately all of these cases were observed, veterinary assistance sought and suspicion of rabies confirmed. The persistence of rabies in our native wild skunks poses a continuous threat to small animals and livestock which live in the natural habitats of skunks. We cannot overemphasize the importance of responsible animal ownership, awareness and annual vaccination of dogs and cats by licensed veternarians.

A small planting that receives proper care will produce more desirable fruit than a large neglected planting.

All fruit trees must have sun and demand a sunny, open location. Most fruiting plants must go through a period of inactivity called the "rest period" which usually occurs due to cold temperatures in the winter. The length of rest or cold exposure varies with various fruit and accounts for the fact that one's choice of fruit tree must be deaptable to available winter cold one's choice of fruit tree must be adaptable to available winter cold

The home gardener should also consider the time of ripening of the various fruit varieties. By including several different varieties that ripen at different times, the grower has a longer period of production. production.

Some fruit trees will not bear unless the flowers are pollinated by another variety. Often times, pears, apples, and some grape and plum varieties require a second variety for pollination purposes. In selection the pollinator, one must find a variety that blooms at the same time as the one to be the same time as the one to be pollinated.

Fruit growing in the home grounds provides an interesting hobby which can also be profitable. Although many of the fruits that the homeowner can grow are obtainable in the market, the quality of homegrown fruit, which is allowed to ripen on the tree, is by far of better quality. In addition, many fruiting plants are ornamental, particularly during spring bloom and add much enrichment to the landscape planting.




Many home gardens are small, and planting the garden to utilize the available space is of primary importance. Most gardeners have little choice in the location of the fruit tree planting. One of the first and primary considerations in and primary considerations in choosing home fruit trees is to consider the demands of upkeep and care and to select the type of planting and number of plantings

Many homeowners are not prepared to spray for the control of insects and diseases on fruiting plants and for this reason should plant and tor this reason should plant only those fruits that can be expected to produce a reasonable crop with a limited insect and disease control. Careful variey selection may ensure a disease

tions may vary from place to place even within a short distance, and the cultural or growing practices often differ with homeowners. Variety selection will also depend to a large extent on individual and personal desires in a fruit variety. For example, a pear variety may make an excellent ornamental tree, yet have a poor quality fruit. Winter is fruit tree planting time; these plants, which are purchased bare-root, are available at nurseries and should be selected for quality and by desired variety.
