

High Spots in Community's First 50 Years

A thrilling narrative of communi-ty progress founded on industry, thrift, co-operation, and courageous determination—that is the story of Muenster as unfolded in the History of the Sacred Heart Partsh, 1839-1939, The book, written by Rev. Jo-seph Puhrmann, O.S. B., Ph. D., was released this week by the Standard Printing Company of San Antonio. Confining itself almost entirely to parish activity the book gives only limited space to the development of the community in general. It does, however include short historical stetches of several leading business organizations.





By opening the cheese factory it provided a better market for milk, thereby creating the dairy industry which has brought prosperity to many a home.


