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Six Local Residents Join 3 Weeks Fun Tour to Alaska

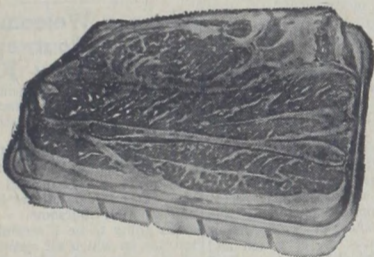
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Malaspina, a ship of the Alaska ferry system, for a day and night cruise to Juneau.

For the next 8 days the group was escorted by West Tours in Alaska and the Yukon. This included tours of Juneau and Fairbanks, visits to museums, a trip to the glacier fields, a ride on a stern wheeler when stops were made to see fish traps, fur tanning and salmon smoking, and allowing time for shopping.

A flight from Juneau to Fairbanks with a stop-over at Anchorage gave the tour group a view of glacier fields and Mt. McKinley from the air.

Again by West Tours and with a driver-guide, they traveled the Alaskan highway into the Yukon Territory, seeing the Alaskan pipe line, Santaland, North Pole Alaska and the ghost town of Silver City, Yukon Territory.

The trip was highlighted by a train ride from Whitehorse to Skagway, a 110 mile, 6 hour ride around, through and over mountains, on tracks built in two years, with only hand tools and dynamite. The tracks were built to carry provisions for the thousands of gold miners rushing to the Yukon in 1899 to the 1890s. Views were thrilling, with thundering waterfalls, deep canyons, rivers, high trestle bridges, snow and glimpses of old foot paths used by miners before the railroad was completed. One day was a relaxing fun day in Skagway which has been preserved to keep the 1890s atmosphere of original wood buildings, board walks and dirt streets.

Then two nights and a day by ship returned the group to Prince Rupert, Canada, where they boarded their own bus again for the trip home. Most agreed that the ride through the rugged Canadian Rockies, the Columbian Ice Fields and Lake Louise were the most beautiful sights.

The trip home took them through Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, (with a stop at the Air Force Academy) then into New Mexico and then home. Every day they were gone they saw snow or ice sometime during the day, with variation of temperature from 40 degrees at Mt. Ranier to in the 90s at Whitehorse, Alaska.

In various areas, wildlife was seen, including deer, antelope, elk and moose; and whales and porpoises in the waters near Hanes, Alaska. In the Juneau area they saw eagles in their nesting places and spawning salmon in the streams. One morning on the ferry, they watched as 3 icebergs floated by.

The trip covered over 9,000 miles an ended on July 29.

By the way, Mr. Tolbert and Mr. Stower were not refused service, only the "Monkey". Metzler Bros. by Bill Metzler



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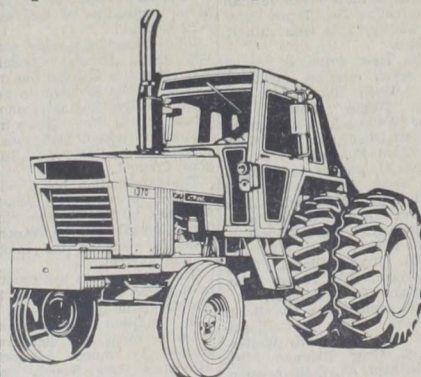
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**Ceremony in Dallas Unites

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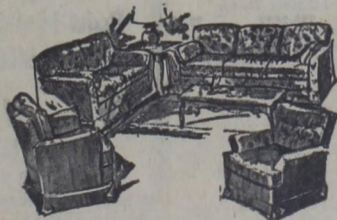
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Lynda Klement and Douglas Yosten United in Double Ring Ceremony

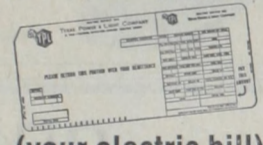

On window units, adjust the cooling control to maintain a room temperature in the upper seventies. Turn the air conditioner off if you're going to be away from home for several days or longer.

Check filters every 30 days. Replace dirty disposable-type filters; clean permanent-type by manufacturer's directions. Keep furniture and draperies away from air outlets and returns; clean grills often. Close draperies and blinds to keep out direct sunlight. Keep fireplace damper closed.

Replace worn or missing weatherstripping and caulking around windows and doors. Ask an insulation dealer or a TP&L Service Representative to help you make certain your home is adequately insulated.

Bill Fisher Sees Bright Outlook in District 17 Race
