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COMMUNISTS PLAN TO ENCIRCLE US
 Fulbright said in 1960 that the Communist plan from the days of Lenin has been to encircle the United States. "Forty-four years ago," he said, "communism was confined to a rented room in Zurich, Switzerland. Today it dominates one-third of the earth containing 40 per cent of the population and a third of the industrial power."

"The Soviet Union's trained cadres operate throughout Southeast Asia, and are now appearing in countries on our doorstep. Promoters of communism swarm over Africa and Latin America. In Egypt the Soviet Union is constructing spectacular works that will dominate world headlines for years to come and enable her to tighten her grip on the strategic Middle East where no former Russian regime had ever been able to penetrate. At the same time she lends money to free world countries and builds great mills for them as in India. The Soviet Union is on the move."

"Thus Lenin's strategy of encirclement is not only being fulfilled — it is moving ahead of schedule."

On March 28, 1960, Fulbright put it this way: "Of course, if we think Khrushchev was only kidding when he said he would bury us, we have no need to worry. But I, for one, believe our security is at stake. And yet, we stand as a nation, a 20th century Babylon, headless and heartless, a big, fat target for the ably led Communist world and the clamoring, poverty-ridden new states." (Congressional Record, March 28, 1960)

Fulbright bluntly warned us, "The American people ought to be told the bleak truth about their world, the character of the forces arrayed against them, and what they must do, at whatever cost, to survive or even to bring about a state of high security. They must be told that, however humane their

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STATE CAPITAL HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN — After sometimes petty, sometimes passionate debate, the Texas House this week passed a beefed-up version, at least where salaries are concerned, of a state budget.

The price tag on the House spending plan for 1980-81 is \$20.3 billion. Gov. Bill Clements says that's about \$600 million too much. House members increased various salaries by almost \$200 million. Clements had made it clear long before the House began its work that he was against many of those pay hikes.

It took the House four days and part of a fifth to finish the initial step in the appropriations process that now moves on to the Senate. Afterwards, the budget will probably be hammered out in a conference committee, and then, the governor must approve it.

Acting as if they didn't know Clements had threatened to veto teacher pay hikes that exceeded 5.1 percent, House members voted teachers a 7 percent raise for 1980 and 1981, on top of step increases. That amounts to a 20 percent increase in pay for teachers over the next two years. Teachers say that will just about keep them up with the inflation rate.

The House also approved raises for Department of Public Safety troopers (40 percent, state employees who make less than \$20,000-a-year (seven percent), district judges (14.8 percent) and district attorneys (36.7 percent). It must be pointed out that everytime legislators raise district judges salary,

they raise the amount of their own retirement pay which is based on a certain percentage of a district judge's yearly salary.

When the House was finished only \$530 million in state funds was left unspent. Remember, school finance is still to come.

After several emotional speeches, the tedious work of approving the two-inch thick appropriations bill crept along punctuated by a bomb scare that came at the end of a long day of debate, legislators giving the "Hook'm Horns" sign and singing the "Eyes of Texas" when discussing teacher salaries at UT.

The Governor

At almost the same moment Gov. Clements was announcing at a press conference that he wouldn't say what he would do if the Legislature passes to his desk a separate presidential primary bill, the House was attaching a rider to the appropriations bill that would prohibit the use of state funds for any primaries other than those in May.

Clements, who in effect killed legislation raising home loan interest rates by his announcement that he would veto such a bill, said the issue of a presidential primary was the Legislature's "baby," and that lawmakers should do their duty and vote without waiting to see what he will do if the bill reaches his desk.

From now on, Clements seemed to be saying, lawmakers would no longer have advance notice of how the governor would act re-

garding certain pieces of legislation. "We are not going to play this game that way," Clements declared.

The way the Senate was playing this week left the governor with little to cheer about. Senators rejected attempts to bring up legislation that would have given Clements budgetary powers. Senators opposing the bill said it would have given the governor the power to almost rewrite the budget. Opposition forces were quick to point out that the Senate also refused to give such powers to Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

Wiretap Bill

Wiretap legislation that Clements supports emerged from a Senate subcommittee this week even though the bill's author had pronounced the legislation "dead" only a week before. The bill would legalize electronic surveillance in hard drug cases. Sen. Ed Howard, sponsor of the wiretap legislation, appeared to have the votes necessary to move the measure out of the Jurisprudence Committee and onto the Senate floor.

And, when more than 5,000 union workers descended on the State Capitol this week, chanting "Kill that bill" in protest against legislation that would repeal the prevailing wage law, Clements, true to his earlier statements, said he had no opinion on the bill. "I do have an opinion about them being a little quieter," Clements said jokingly while traders in hard hats and carrying their lunchpails swarmed over the Capitol Building in one of the largest protests since the

days of the Vietnam War. A Goldbrick: a clock-eyed person.

Short Snorts

Those who had been biting their fingernails over an economy that had grown by 6.9 percent in the final quarter of 1978 breathed a sigh of relief this week when numbers released showed a growth rate of only 0.7 percent in the first quarter of this year. The "overheated" economy that had been roaring along at the end of 1978 was supposedly one of the contributing factors to the ever-increasing inflation rate.

Another economic note—statistics released this week show major corporations with hefty increases in their profits during the first quarter of this year. Texaco's profits were up almost 80 percent in that period, and Exxon's increased by more than 35 percent.

Finally, the Senate version of Rep. Wayne Peveto's tax reform bill, sponsored by Grant Jones of Abilene, slipped out of the Senate Finance Committee this week.

The Jones-Peveto bill would set up single appraisal units for each city, school district and special district in a county. Hopefully, the legislation would create standards and guidelines by which property could be taxed locally and state-wide in an equitable fashion with homeowners and commercial interests paying their fair share of the tax burden.

During the last two legislative sessions, Peveto's bill ended up buried in the Senate Economic Development Committee. But the bill was amended this time around to satisfy real estate interests that managed to kill the measure in 1975 and 1977. The amendment permits voters to roll back property tax increases over five percent. Peveto said he could live with such a provision.

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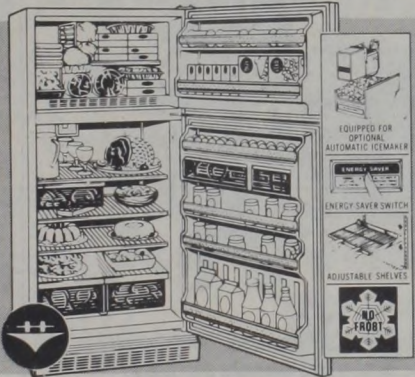
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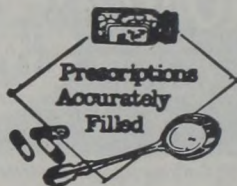
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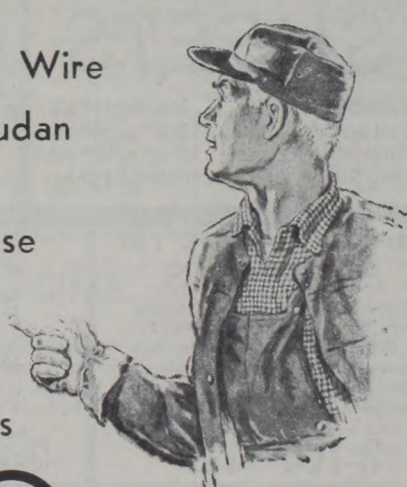

Early Application Advised for SS

Due to recent legislative changes in the social security law it is becoming increasingly important for potential social security beneficiaries to

file their claims at the proper time. Potential beneficiaries are urged to file their applications for social security three (3) months prior to the month benefits are to begin. For example, a widow born 9/10/19 would be 60 years of

age in September of 1979. She could file her application June 1, 1979 for benefits to begin September of 1979. Although benefits would not be payable until September, the early filing date would provide adequate processing time and insure against any possible loss of benefits.

Because of recent changes in the law, benefits are generally not payable for any month before an application is filed.

When a person files a claim three months before he or she becomes eligible for social security he insures that his benefits are paid in a timely manner and that all benefits to which he is entitled are paid.

The Sherman Social Security Office is located at 810 North Travis. The phone number is 665-0770. This is a direct line to the Sherman office. Office hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., Monday through Friday, except national holidays.

A representative may be contacted in Gainesville each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. to 12 noon and 12:45 to 2:00 p.m. at the Federal Building.

Stenholm Lists Requirements for Service Academy

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm reminds young persons who are interested in competing for nominations to the service academies, for the class entering July 1980, that he will use a competitive method of selection so that all young persons who meet the necessary requirements may be considered.

The service academies are the Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland; the Military Academy at West Point, New York; the Air Force Academy near Colorado Springs, Colorado; and the Merchant Marine Academy at Kings Point, New York. These institutions offer a fine education and a great opportunity for service to their country by young persons

who wish to follow a military career.

In order for Congressman Stenholm to consider applicants, a candidate must meet these requirements: (1) Must be a U. S. citizen, (2) Must be over 17, and a legal resident of the 17th Congressional District; (3) Must be under 22 years of age on July 1, 1980; (4) Must never have been married; (5) Must be physically fit including excellent eyesight; (6) Must have a good high school record.

Stenholm stresses that political influence is not a factor in his nominations to the Academies. The important thing is not who you know but who you are.

Interested young persons who meet the above require-

ments should write to Congressman Charles W. Stenholm, House of Representatives, Washington, D. C. 20515, no later than July 16, ACT or SAT examinations will then be necessary as a rating device to set up slates for nomination. The competition is keen but Congressman Stenholm wants to assure that all young persons who are interested in a military career may have an opportunity to compete for nomination.

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Rabies Warning Given by State Health Service

Dr. Larry Tisdale this week passed on a rabies alert which he has received from the Texas Department of Health. The message advises him that rabies has become alarmingly prevalent in many areas of the state, two having been reported in Cooke County. About 80 to 90 percent of the cases are skunk rabies, however some domestic animals have been infected.

The report states that Texas had more rabies in 1978 than any year since 1961 (564 laboratory confirmed cases), and the first quarter of 1979 produced more than twice as many cases as the first quarter 1978.

The article warns that the

keys to rabies control are public awareness, vaccination of pets and stray animal control. It is estimated that Texas has 3.7 million dogs, of which only 1.5 million are vaccinated. This is 33.8% whereas 70% is considered necessary for control.

Vets are asked to get a complete history of the pets they treat and submit heads for rabies examination or enforce quarantine in all cases of biting pets or suspicious activity.

When dealing with a sick skunk, Dr. Tisdale recommends sending the head to the state health department for examination if a person or dog has been bitten. The re-

port will indicate if rabies treatment is needed. If no person or animal was bitten the analysis is not needed the skunk can be just killed and buried.

Rabies vaccine is advised after a pet is 6 months old. It is good 2 to 3 years but annual boosters are recommended for maximum immunity.

Emilio Antonetti, son of Dr. and Mrs. Alfredo Antonetti, has received word of his admission to the medical school of Texas Tech University. He will graduate this month from North Texas State University with a major in biology.

Emilio is following the medical tradition of his family. His grandfather, now in retirement here, practiced in Cuba for many years, his father is presently practicing in Muenster, and an older brother is practicing in Houston.

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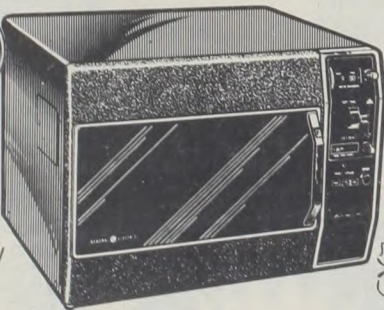
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
