It was satisfying a few days ago to hear that West Germany has joined U.S. Germany has joined U.S. and the growing list of other nations who will not participate in the Moscow Olympics. Despite the sacrifice required of hundreds of young athletes who trained for and looked forward to the big event for years, as well as possibilities to share in the glory, this boycott has the approval of fair minded people all over the world. This is a reprimand for Soviet aggression in Afghanistan as reprimand for Soviet aggression in Afghanistan as well as criticism of Russian professionalism in amateur competition and Russia's own use of sports to serve a

Our nation is highly pleased with President Carter's stand on this issue. Also it liked his idea of trade sanctions on grain and in. sanctions on grain and in-dustrial equipment and sup-plies. All of us favored anything that would hinder the Soviet drive to world domination.

domination.

But lately we get reports indicating that the President's opposition is more cosmetic than real, that the good reports are intended for their effect on us Americans. However, it's business as usual with regard to other dealings that help the Reds. Furthermore these dealings don't get the same generous news coverage as generous news coverage as the others, rather they are kept secret as much as possible.

possible.

Some two months ago the
Carter administration
quietly removed the general
embargo on exports of high
technology value to the
Reds. Thereby it returned to
the "case by case" check-off Reds. Thereby it returned to the "case by case" check-off system which applied before the Afghanistan invasion. This is the trade formula whereby all kinds of material and technology flowed from US industry to the USSR. Those included ball bearing technology, radars and computers and the great Kama River truck plant which was publicized as strictly a commerical venture but has supplied military vehicles for the invasion of Afghanistan. Other reports coming through the publicity blackout are that US technicians are over there

through the publicity blackout are that US technicians are over there servicing American made computers and that the Administration has approved export of \$5 million worth of oil well drilling equipment and technical assistance to the Soviets.

It seems that regardless of our apparent dislike of Soviet behavior and our concern for its global ambitions, we are squarely back on the course of previous policy whereby we assisted greatly in construction of the massive Soviet war machine. war machine.

war machine.

US has sent them endless help for building modernized farming equipment but they chose instead to build war equipment. People who should have grown food worked instead in war factories. So America provided huge shipments of grain to feed them. As we worry about shipments of gran to feed them. As we worry about the mighty Red armament and its threat to our survival we really should remember that the monster is very much our own Frankenstein. Meanwhile the Administ-ration has a sorry record of

ration has a sorry record of skimping on its own military preparedness. It has ruled out the manufacutre of modern new planes, tanks, ships, missiles and what not to replace the obsolete equipment in its armament. Even today, with the world in its present turmoil, it grudgingley allows a bit more for defense. It still can't say that the speed-up of our military program is equivalent to the help US is giving to the Russians.

Along the same line of thought, we have to wonder about the \$5 million loan to Russia for increasing oil production. This contrasts sharply with the ad-continued on Page 14... ration has a sorry record of

SOVIET PLANS FOR WAR

The international communist overall strategy of protracted conflict has never changed, and it will never change as long as a single spark of Marxism is alive anywhere in the world. The strategy was outlined by the well-known Soviet leader, Dimitry Z. Manuilsky, in a lecture at the Lenin School in Moscow in 1930, when he said: "War to the hilt between communism and capitalism is inevitable. Today, of course, we are not strong enough to attack. Our time will come in 20 or 30 years. To win we shall need the element of surprise. The bourgeoiste will have to be put to sleep. So we shall begin by launching the most spectacular peace movement on record. They will leap at another chance to be friends. As soon as their guard is down we shall smash them with our clenched fists."

Everything the Soviet leader prescribed has been done exactly as stated. We have been put to sleep by such communist tactics as cultural exchange programs, peaceful coexistence and detente. Once asleep we were duped into building up the communists through trade. At the same time they connect us into disarming while they continued arming themselves rapidly. Now they are ready for war — but we are not!

This is the nuclear age; consequently, nuclear weapons are mainstays of the armaments of both the U. S. and the Soviet Union. But weapons don't fight wars; people do. How people think about war is

consequently, nuclear wapons are mainstays of the armaments of both the U. S. and the Soviet Union. But weapons don't fight wars; people do How people think about war is critical. There is an important difference in the Western concept of nuclear war and that of the Soviets. Our leaders see such a war as catastrophic which neither side could win. Marxism-Leninism leads the Soviets to treat war as a con-

tinuation of politics by other means and as dedicated communists they plan to win any war in which they are engaged, nuclear or conventional.

About 1960 the Soviets launched a program to give them unquestioned military superiority. In the words of Air Vice-Marshal Stewart Menaul, "The Soviets have superior strategic nuclear forces, and they do not believe that a nuclear war would necessarily be a short war, they are prepared for all eventualities and are gearing their economic, psychological, political aim of total defeat of the capitalist countries.

"The Soviet aim in a future war is, therefore, total victory for Socialism which involves five specific conditions that are described in Soviet literature as constituting final victory. They are: defeat of the enemy militarily, seizure of strategic areas, occupation of territory, installation of governments favourable to Soviet Communism and ultimately ideological conversion."

To anyone who studies recent reports on Soviet planning, it is obvious they are in the ad-vanced stages of preparing for war. In addition to the tremendous build-up of their

AUSTIN — As expected, Republican Ronald Reagan and Democrat Jimmy Carter captured the majority of delegates to their parties' state conventions this summer following a weekend of county and senatorial district caucusing ... and Texas Gov. Bill Clements is still considered a possibility for vice president on the GOP slate.

Carter took an easy two-to-one delegate lead over his primary opponent, Sen. Ed-ward Kennedy of Massachu-setts, but Kennedy support-ers have vowed to wage a hard convention fight. hard convention fight.

The presidential contender with the hardest row to hoe in Texas is Illinois Sen. John Anderson who must gather over 40,000 signatures from registered voters here to gain Independent slot on the

He is now awaiting a legal opinion from Attorney Gen-eral Mark White to determine who is eligible to Sign his petition.

Anderson has already re-ceived a go-ahead from Tex-as Secretary of State George Strake, a Republican, who last week ruled that Democratic primary voters and others, but not Republican primary voters, were eligible to sign for Anderson.

Strake's interpretation of the legal language prohibited voters in a binding primary from signing for Anderson. The Republican presidential primary was binding; the Democratic primary was not.

Since Strake's ruling will enhance Anderson's ability to siphon votes from the Democrats, and lessen his ability to "raid" Republican voters, Texas Democrats are not pleased.

An opinion on the same subject has been requested of Atty. Gen. White by State Rep. Susan McBee, D-Del Rio, chairman of the House Elections Committee . . . but Anderson supporters say the related to the state of the same supporters and the same supporters with the same supporters and supporters say the same supporter they plan to go ahead with Strake's interpretation.

Speaker's Race

The middle fell out of the race for Texas Speaker of the House last week, leaving

the two ends stronger than ever but with no clearcut

winner.

The three top moderate candidates pledged to either conservative Gib Lewis, D-Fort Worth, or liberal John Bryant, D-Dallas.

The rapid action was apparently kicked off by Rep. Wayne Peveto of Orange, who joined with Lewis.

Representative Bill Caraway, D-Houston, reading the cards, promptly pledged the other way to Bryant. He was followed three days later by

followed three days later by Rep. Lynn Nabors of Brown-

Both Bryant and Lewis claimed to have over 80 votes (76 votes needed to win), but a media poll revealed Lewis ahead of Bryant by only 48 to 38, including representatives elect.

cluding representatives-elect. Meanwhile, present Speak-er Bill Clayton, sitting under a political cloud of Brilab troubles, told reporters he still has 117 votes assured, if he can clear himself.

We're hearing a lot in Washington these days about cutting the budget, as well we should. But cutting a service that benefits every man, woman and child in this nation by more than 15 percent is not the way to go about it.

And that is what eliminating Saturday mail delivery would do.

Delivering the mail was one of the first concerns of our national government. Next to defending our shores, it probably is the most basic thing the government does. The Postal Service used to take pride that "neither snow, nor sleet, nor dark of night" stopped the delivery of the mail.
What has happened to our government if we can forget this
obligation, and make it a scapegoat for our national budgetary problems?

Long distance telephone aside, mail still is one of the primary ways Americans communicate with each other. Your newspaper may come to you in Saturday's mail. Or a long, newsy letter from a faraway relative. Or even a bill that needs to be paid.

But the problems in eliminating Saturday delivery go beyond the fact that the mailbox would be empty on that day. The question of what happens on Monday also needs to be considered. Already, the Postal Service must cope with the buildup of mail that comes from not having delivery on Sunday, though mail is in the system. The glut of Monday mail caused by a two-day suspension in service every week would be an intolerable overload—especially to a system already plagued by too many delays in service

I have always believed the primary tests to the value of government spending are the number of people who benefit, and whether the service could be provided by the private system or a more local level of government. The Postal Service benefits every citizen, and it can't be provided by any other agency or government level—so its service must remain intact.

That is not to say we shouldn't demand that the Postal That is not to say we shouldn't demand that the Postal Service exercise economy. We in the Senate have approved a high enough subsidy to allow continued Saturday delivery. But we also must demand that the Post Office improve its productivity. When the Congress created the Postal Service as an independent agency, the idea was to improve its management and efficiency. I don't know anyone who would argue that their mail service has improved since that action was taken. Lam convinced considerable accomplish. action was taken. I am convinced considerable economies can be achieved in Postal Service operation, and that service can be made better.

But we should not allow vital postal service to become a scapegoat to our national budget ills. We are in a financial crisis. Even the most avid spenders on Capitol Hill have become budget conscious. The problem is that many politicians in Washington are indebted to special interest groups for their next election. That makes it difficult for them to vote against large amounts of money for programs that benefit only small numbers of vocal people. The temptation is for them to take money from programs to benefit every American to mollify their special constituencies. constituencies

The only way taking budget cuts to make sure this doesn't happen is to make your voices heard in Washington above the din of special interest lobbyists clamoring for a



The Texas Department of Health Region 5 Office in Arlington announces and immunization Clinic to be held at Sacred Heart Community Center, on Wednesday, May 28, 1980 from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00. The clinic will provide immunization against Diptheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), Polio, Rubeola (red measles) and Rubella (German measles), for infants 2 months through 18 years. (Exception: Females over age 12 will not receive rubella vaccine without a physician's consultation and prescription). Precautions must be taken with females in the 12-18 age group to insure that they are not pregnant when they are inmunized with measles vaccine, and that they do not become pregnant for 3 months following immunization.

Immunizations are incomplete if a child has not received three (3) doses of DTP and Polio vaccine with DTP and Polio vaccine with at least one dose administered past the fourth birthday. All children under 18 years must have an informed consent form read and signed by the parent or legal guardian. If possible, the parent should accompany the child to the clinic. Immunization records should accompany the child to the clinic and be examined by the Public Health Nurse who will answer any questions.
