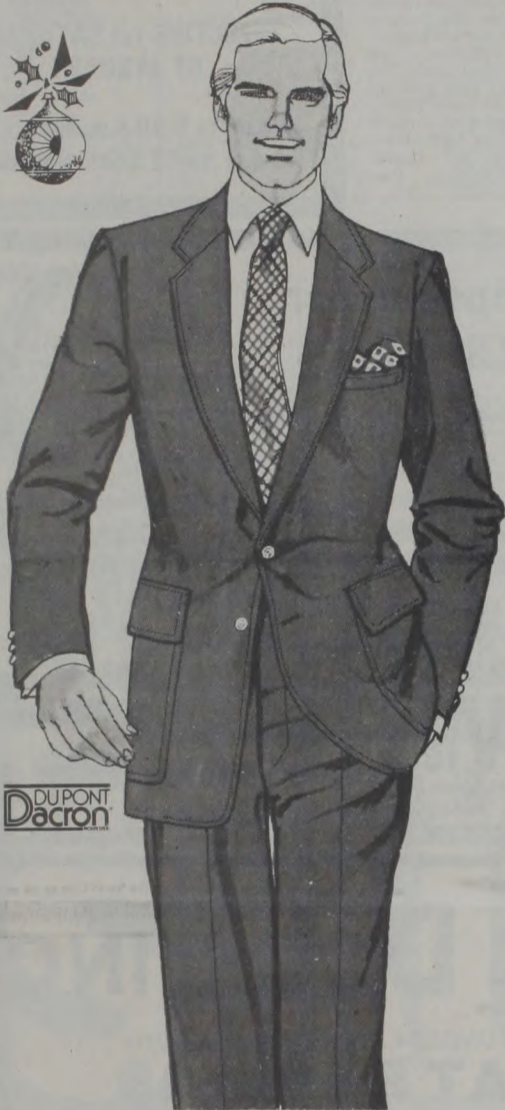

600 Texans mail responses national conservation survey

Nearly 600 people in Texas have mailed their responses on the proposed national soil and water conservation program outlined by the Secretary of Agriculture, reports George C. Marks, state conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service (SCS) in Temple.

When the review period ends on January 15, the responses will be summarized and a report prepared for the Secretary.

SCS has been designated to collect the comments in Texas. The mailing address is P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503.

Marks said he was pleased with the number of responses received so far but added that he expects and welcomes more before the January 15 cutoff date. During a review of earlier drafts, more than 3,700

people in Texas made written responses.

The main features of the proposed national conservation program are increased roles for local and state governments in conservation work and targeting a greater portion of USDA dollars and staff to critical soil and water resource problem areas.

The program is the USDA response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). SCS and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service offices throughout the state have a supply of a leaflet that summarizes the program containing a pre-addressed, postage-paid response form.

The offices also have a reference copy of the full report of the program and draft environmental impact statement.

small or pre-mature babies. When a baby's jaundice does require treatment, a technique called phototherapy is usually used. Phototherapy simply means treatment using light. Light-either sunlight or artificial light- speeds up the removal of bilirubin from the body.

In phototherapy the baby's skin is exposed to spinal high intensity lights, often called "bililights." Phototherapy continues until the amount of bilirubin in the baby's blood reaches and remains at a normal or near normal level.

Health Dept. to conduct clinics

Two clinics conducted by the Texas Department of Health, Region 5, will be held in the Community Center next Wednesday, December 23. At each clinic the service will be performed by public health nurses at no charge.

The first clinic, from 10 to noon, will provide immunization against diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis (DTP), polio, rubella (red measles) and rubella (German measles) for infants 2 months through 18 years. Exception: females over age 12 will not receive rubella vaccine without a physician's consultation and prescription. Immunizations are incomplete if a child has not received three doses of DTP and polio with at least one dose administered past the fourth birthday.

All children under 18 must have an informed consent form read and signed by a parent or legal guardian.

The second clinic is for hypertension and will be held from 1 to 3 p.m.

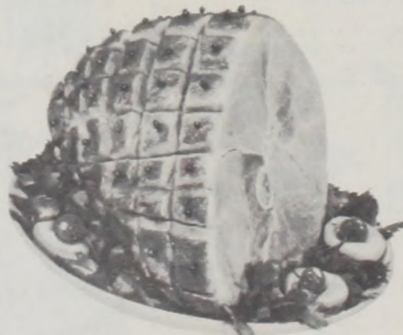

UL offers Yule safety tips

Christmas is a time for decorating the tree, crackling fires, toys wrapped up in brightly colored packages, gaily colored strings of lights and families gathered together to celebrate the season.

Christmas also is a time for fires, many of which will be traced back to Christmas trees and decorations, and many of which can be avoided.

"In the hustle and bustle of the season, it's easy to forget common sense safety rules," warns Robert Seelbach, Underwriters Laboratories vice president and chief electrical engineer.

Underwriters Laboratories Inc. (UL) is an independent not-for-profit organization testing for public safety. Among other products, UL tests indoor and outdoor Christmas tree lights, artificial trees and electrical decorations for a variety of safety features.

"Many fires are caused by damaged light strings, overloaded circuits and improper use of decorations. At UL, we try to make these products as safe as possible, but consumers have to do their part too," says Seelbach.

The National Fire Data Center reports approximately 82,000 fires killed or injured more than three thousand people and caused about 340 million

dollars in property damage last December. Seelbach says consumers can avoid fires if they use simple precautions. "A spark or a hot wire can ignite a dried out tree. Check each string of lights carefully. If you find a break in the wiring, frayed insulation, a broken bulb or a defective plug, don't use it; replace the string," Seelbach says.

Overloading a circuit with too many lights also can cause a fire. "Read manufacturer's instructions carefully and don't use more than the recommended number of lights on one circuit," says Seelbach.

Much terracing still needed

Recent high-frequency rains caused extensive damage to farmland in the Upper-Elm-Red Soil and

that has been plowed only four inches deep and the total 4-inch plow depth removed would equal a loss of approximately 463 tons per acre. Soil weights will vary from 85 pounds per cubic foot for a clay soil to 100 pounds per cubic foot for a sandy soil.

Even though farmers have been building terraces for many years, much farmland still remains to be terraced. Actions through nature can generally replenish soil losses caused by sheet erosion of four to six tons per acre based on depth of existing soil. Four to six tons per acre is approximately the thickness of a dime. A bottomland field of clay soils

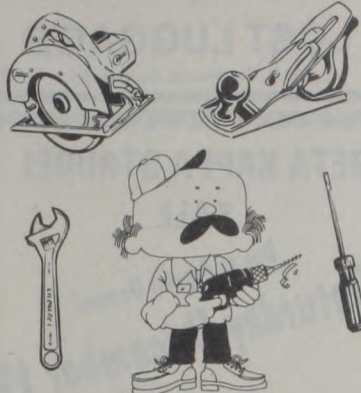

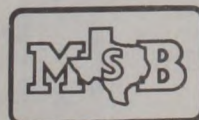

DPS intensifies efforts to fill current vacancies

The Texas Department of Public Safety will conduct an additional recruit training school next year to help state trooper vacancies, according to DPS Director Jim Adams.

"The department usually schedules two of these schools at the academy in Austin each year," Adams said. "Three schools will be necessary in 1982 to bring the DPS up to its authorized strength."

The DPS director said the agency hopes to recruit 268 new troopers during 1982.

"We are intensifying our statewide effort to attract qualified men and women who would like to serve in one of the finest law enforcement organizations in the country," Adams said. "DPS troopers are held in high esteem by their counterparts in other states."

The DPS presently has 86 trooper vacancies within the Highway Patrol ranks and five trooper vacancies in the Driver License Service due to promotions, retirements and attrition.

Adams pointed out that the 67th State Legislature allocated the DPS a total of 20 additional Highway Patrol positions, 10 more License and Weight troopers and 20 additional narcotics investigators over the next two years.

"We offer recruits the finest training available today," Adams said. "Preparing a person to confidently face the many law enforcement responsibilities requires a lot of effort, time, support and money."

In addition to the basic traffic safety responsibilities, DPS troopers regularly provide assistance in criminal investigations and disaster-emergency situations.

Trainees live and eat in the academy during the 18-week course.

Recruits earn a starting monthly salary of \$1,233. Upon graduation, the officers are paid \$1,347 monthly plus allowances for uniforms and equipment. When a trooper completes a year with the department

following graduation, he earns \$1,537 per month. New trooper assignments are based on regional needs. However, DPS academy graduates may request assignments in specific areas.

Adams said all the candidates must be prepared for rigorous demands of the training.

"It's a tough, intensive course which is designed to ensure quality and professionalism in the finest traditions of law enforcement. Some of the trainees will find the course too demanding or decide that another career is best for them," Adams said.

DPS trooper applicants must be between 20 and 35 years old and have a minimum of 60 hours of college level credit. Each candidate will undergo a personal history review and must be in excellent health.

Adams said the DPS has placed a high priority on the recruitment of minorities and females for uniformed service.

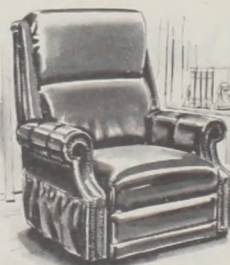

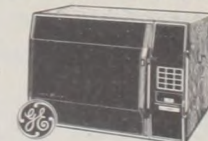

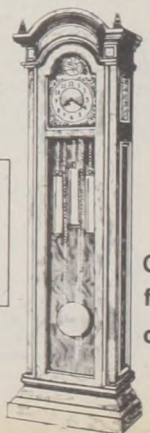
