Teachers Strike Out

Here's another case of running out of time, so the column this week is being turned over to a guest columnist, Edwin Feulner of the Heritage Foundation.

While fewer teachers ushered in the new school year 1st month by illegally walking off their jobs, it was not due to any change in policy by the huge teacher union, the National Education Association.

Once a staid professional organization interested in imparting knowledge to kids, the NEA today means muscle. Muscle for politics. Muscle for doing battle with school boards. Muscle for just about everything, it seems, but teaching Johnny and Jenny how to read and write.

Which is what has parents fed up and, according to author Burton Yale Pines in his new book, "Back to Basics," demanding an end to open classrooms, permissiveness, and sociological claptrap, and a return to reading, writing, and arithmetic.

But don't think the NEA is going to take this lying down. Union officials see the back-to-basics movement as some kind of right-wing conspiracy. And at the unions' big 120th national convention this summer, NEA President William McGuire rang the alarm.

McGuire told his flock in order to combat the "onslaught" from the right "you have to organize, you have to fight, you have to put your shoulders to the grindstone of the political and legislative lobbying process."

In his keynote address he said, "educational excellence without political power is not a practical possibility; political power for educational excellence is a professional responsibility."

Accordingly, the first set of "educational excellence" items on the convention agenda dealt with the international peace movement. The delegates approved a statement advocating a nuclear weapons freeze. Members also approved an unusually long seven-point plan to put the NEA in the forefront of the women's rights movement.

The ironic twist, of course, is that as the educational community has gotten more politically savvy, "educational excellence" has undeniably declined. Why, for instance, should the NEA spotlight the nuclear freeze movement as a priority issue when problems of student delinquency, declining test scores and functional illiteracy are plaguing our educational system?

How are parents to have any confidence in the teaching profession when even a superficial glance at what they as a collective body consider to be important shows broad international issues instead of rudimentary basics like how can we help our children to be intellectually better equipped to deal with a complex world?

Not all teachers are failures, of course. One teacher of my youth (whose name I regrettably forget) drummed a lesson into my head that I will always remember. She did so by making me write it on the blackboard several thousand times during a semester.

Burial was in Sacred Heart Cemetery directed by Nick Miller Funeral Home and pallbearers were Leonard Vogel, James Vogel, Chris Stoffels, Dennis Stoffels, Giles Truembach and Allen Truembach, all nephews.

Rosary service was held Monday at 4 and 8 p.m. in the chapel of Nick Miller Funeral Home.

Lawrence Vogel was a native of Muenster, born June 24, 1908, a son of early community settlers Mr. and Mrs. Emil Vogel. He was married to Philomena Stoffels on Jan. 3, 1940. He was a farmer and oil field worker and lived on a farm all of his married life until 1972 when he retired because of failing health.

Local vote disagrees with state and county

The election was a disaster to a big majority of Muenster voters. Their ballots were buried in the Democratic landslide that swept Texas and won every major political office of the state.

It was specially disappointing because the local voters not only came out in record numbers but were even more positive than the rest of the state in the ratio of selection.

Total number of votes in South Muen-

ster box was 172 out of a possible 205, and the number in the North box was 723 out of a possible 1249. For all of the community, it adds to 895 of a possible 1454...more than 61 percent.

In the Republican-Democratic comparison, the ratio was even higher, many more than 2 or 3 to 1.

Meanwhile Cooke County voted for the winners in all of the principal races. Those were Bentsen, White, Hobby, Mattox, Bullock, Richards, Mauro, Hightower, Nugent and Coody.

Regarding local offices, there were no races. There were no Republican nominees, hence all nominees of the Democratic coasted into office without opposition. Candidates and votes cast were as follows.

Muenster voters agreed with the state in the balloting on proposed amendments to the state constitution, except on proposal 6. All received statewide approval but No. 6 was opposed here. It provides for increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%.

Jr. Elite negotiations remain open

The old slogan "where there's life there's hope" still applies to Jr. Elite dress factory. Statements Wednesday by key personnel of both sides indicate that negotiations, though moving slowly, are definitely still open.

A representative of the First City Bank of Dallas, Trust Department revealed to The Enterprise that it has extended an invitation to

Jerell, Inc. to meet and negotiate.

When asked about the proposal Jerell replied it has not received the invitation at that time, and if it has a constructive offer Jerell will probably meet.

It was pointed out that a month to month contract between the parties is in effect since the regular contract expired, nevertheless production is currently suspended for two reasons.

The business is between seasons and would be slow regardless. Also the company is reluctant to increase production without assurance that the plant will remain open.

Bernice Sicking, plant manager, said the last load of work was shipped out and no more materials have arrived. Employees are just waiting for a call to come back.

Congressional Comment

With farm prices continuing to hover at the lowest levels recorded since the 1930s, Congressman Charles W. Stenholm is urging farmers to participate in the 1983 farm program as a first step on the long road back to profitability. Stenholm, speaking recently to farm groups in several states and at a Lubbock press conference with other Texas farm leaders, has repeatedly emphasized the necessity to bring agricultural production into

line with demand and to lower costs to taxpayers. "We come back to the age-old problem that hounds the agricultural industry," Stenholm said. "When agricultural supplies are high, market demand is down and prices drop accordingly. When prices drop, farmers invariably rely on increased production to make up the difference and the cycle is repeated. More production, less demand, lower prices. We have to break that vicious cycle."

At the recent Lubbock farm meeting, attended by Congressman Ken Hance and commodity leaders in rice, cotton, feed grains, wheat, dairy, as well as major farm organizations, Stenholm said all economic studies indicated that higher levels of participation in farm programs by farmers can contribute to increases in commodity prices.

"The more farmers who take part in the set-aside, the more land is taken out of production and the more closely supply comes into line with market demand," he told the group.

The participation push outlined at the press conference is part of a larger effort to get farmers united behind a common program. This includes the formation of the Texas Agricultural Forum. Stenholm, along with commodity leaders and Texas farm organization officials, started the Forum earlier this year. Its format is based on the Conservative Democratic Forum that Stenholm initiated during his first term in Congress.

"The Forum is not a replacement for existing farm organizations," Stenholm said, describing the young organization that is beginning to attract attention from neighboring farm state groups. "Neither does it complete with them. Rather, it compliments and assists their work by bringing producers from many different general and commodity organizations together.

"Our aim is to bring different farm views together, work on areas of agreement and eventually develop a consensus on opinion on what the options for agriculture are," the Stamford Democrat said.

Dear Friends,

I feel that I am no stranger to Muenster. While extending my sincere thanks to all my friends and benefactors I wish to make this appeal on behalf of my church and the children of my school and orphanage.

The present parish of St. Sebastian is an ancient Pilgrim center with an orphanage, school up to 8th grade and a convent. For want of funds the orphanage for boys had been closed since three years. The church with its meager income finds it too difficult to maintain the church the pastor, the orphanage and the convent. Under such a situation no priest could ever imagine to get a musical instrument to accompany the singing in the church. For the past over one century the church had no organ or harmonium to accompany the singing.

Hoping that concession on customs duty would be granted by the Government under the general concessions granted for imported goods during the Asiad Games in the month of November 1982, I arranged to import an electronic organ from France with the financial assistance of my friend Mr. J.M. Weinzapfel and few friends in France. But to my great dismay I had been informed that no concession will be granted in this case and that I will have to pay a heavy duty of 325% customs duty on \$1300.00 to import the organ which costs only \$1000, excluding the transport charges of \$300.00. Hence Dear Friends, I request you to consider the situation sympathetically and help me to get over this embarrassing situation. Your kind help however small it may be will be gratefully accepted and utilized for the purpose and thus you will avert the disappointment of the poor orphan girls.

Small business wants tax reform

A small-business owner wrote me recently to talk about tax reform. In his letter, he said, "I have an MBA and would not even consider trying to do my own tax filing."

The time is ripe for tax reform. Our tax system has become too complex. There are many proposals on the table to make it simpler.

One of the most talked about alternatives is the so-called flat rate tax. A survey of the half-million members of the National Federation of Independent Business, conducted last summer, showed that 62 percent of those responding favored the concept of taxing individual income at a flat rate. Only 26 percent said they wanted to retain the present progressive rate of taxation. One member wrote, "We don't need more taxes; what we need is compliance and fairness, neither of which the current system of taxation provides. Vive the flat tax!"

One of the arguments against the flat rate tax is that it could not survive unscathed the pressures of special interests represented in Congress — that what emerged would not be a pure flat rate tax. There are concerns that eliminating deductions for charitable contributions would spell ruin or at least hard times for churches, colleges and community volunteer organizations — all of which rely heavily on tax deductible donations.

The deduction for mortgage interest would also disappear with a true flat tax. Those in the housing and real estate industries — already hard hit by recession — say this would be an almost fatal blow to them and to the dreams of young people wanting to buy their first homes.

The small-business community believes that any changes in the tax code should make the system more fair and equitable and that improvements should encourage investment and capital formation. Proponents of the flat rate tax argue that their plan would eliminate tax shelters which merely "store" money in non-productive investments and would, instead, direct available capital to more productive investments in modernized plant and equipment.

Besides the flat rate tax, other reforms are being suggested. They include a consumption tax (taxing people on what they consume but not on savings or investment). A national sales tax has been mentioned and is favored by some in small business. On the other hand the Value Added Tax, which received some attention in the 1980 tax debate, is strongly rejected by most small-business people.

It is too soon to suggest any one alternative that is right for small business or the country. However, the present tax system has become too complex. It is not equitable. It needs reform.

One small-business man summed his feelings up this way: "I do believe the time has come for a flat rate income tax — if the Washington Boys do not mess it up with a variable tax on how much you earn."

The lame-duck Congress and the 98th Congress will both be faced with this important issue. Small-business owners must keep in touch with the critical debate on tax reform.

The message: "Persistent perversity provokes patient pedagogues producing painful penalties."

Instead of chasing right-wing boogymen and flexing their political muscle, perhaps McGuire and Company would do well to write those words down on paper — substituting the word "parents" for pedagogues.

City receives \$656 rebate on mixed drink tax

The City of Muenster has received a check for \$656.43 from State Comptroller Bob Bullock as a 15 percent rebate on the tax collected here on the sale of mixed drinks during the third quarter of 1982. The total tax collected was \$4,376.18, which is 10 percent of the total sales of mixed drinks. The tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and rebates of 15 percent are sent by the comptroller to the county and the city in which the sale was made.

The county's rebate check was in the amount of \$5,646.11 for a total tax of \$37,640.75, which is larger than combined amounts of Muenster, Lindsay and Gainesville. This indicates that some county mixed drink sales are outside the three cities.

The rebate check to Lindsay was \$2,571.68 on \$17,144.53 total tax, and the check to Gainesville was \$1,345.67 on a total tax of \$8,971.15.

Comptroller Bullock said that total rebate checks to 217 counties and 408 cities were more than \$10 million out of \$34.6 million. The \$24.6 million remaining after payments to cities and counties was paid to the state.

City completes Mesquite drainage

With only three items on their agenda, members of the city council had a quickie session for their regular meeting Monday night.

It received the welcome report that two fast metal culverts have been installed on Mesquite street. Their purpose is to carry drainage waters from the west to the east side of the street in heavy rains. Previously a drainage ditch along the east side had been cleaned and enlarged to assure faster disposal of the water.

Other action concerned annexation of a 3.533 acre tract to the city by Glenn Hess and Wanda and David Flusche. The purpose is to make the land, located outside the city east of Mesquite, available for city utilities. Final action awaits a public hearing and the council's decision.

Another matter was dedication by Muenster Independent School District of land to be used as a street approaching the school's baseball field. It is located 140 feet east of Oak streets from 8th to 9th streets.

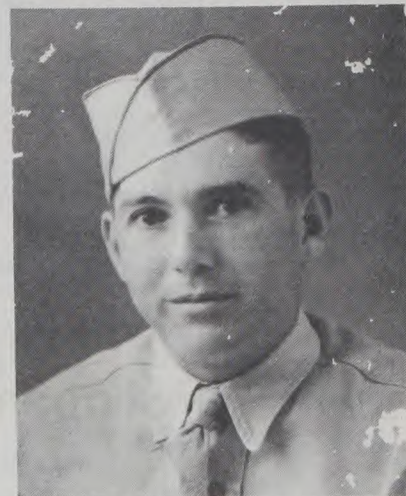

Tigers win TCIL opener over Crusaders

In a decisive and cheering homecoming victory last week the Sacred Heart Tigers cleared the first hurdle on their way to the champ title in District 3-AAA of TCIL. They triumphed 21-7 over Thomas K. Gorman High of Tyler.

Sacred Heart dominated the action all of the way with leads of 15-9 in first downs and 293 to 167 in total yardage. The same applies to turnovers, Sacred losing one interception and a fumble while the Crusaders lost two interceptions and two fumbles.

The teams started with a standoff, the Tigers moving on two series and losing a fourth known gamble on the third. Then Gorman repeated the act, gaining on two series and likewise losing a fourth down try on the third series.

Temporarily SH seemed to be on the way after a 15 yard pass from Neil Hesse to Darrell Herr but had to kick four plays later.

The quarter ended at 0-0, but excitement came early in the second. Gorman kicked to end its first series, and the Tigers were 49 paces away. Three plays later the Hesse and Herr combination made the distance with a pass. The kick by Curtis Henschel upped the score to 7-0 as the clock read 9:38.

On the kickoff that

followed Bret Walterscheid and Ronnie Dangelmayr teamed up in a jarring, fumble producing tackle and Ricky Hennigan was there to claim the loose ball. That was on the 21 and a pass interference call advanced them to the 15. The opportunity was wasted, however. The next four tries resulted in gains of 9 less a penalty loss of 5, bringing on a change of possession at the 11.

Gorman promptly gained to the 24 in 3 tries but a major penalty on the next series forced a punt.

A 15 yard penalty plus the run-back on that play put SH in business on Gorman's 24. Herr's 5 yard gain along with his 13 on a pass from Hesse moved to the 7, then Herr's 6 and Hesse's one yard plunge reached pay dirt. Henschel's PAT made the count 14-0 at 1:45.

Gorman opened the second half with two good series for 46 yards but bogged down on the next and had to give up possession after a 4 yard loss.

Tigers had to punt on first series but regained the ball promptly as Ronnie Dangelmayr jarred it loose and Floyd Truebenbach recovered. The same old routine followed. SH made one first down and failed on a fourth down gamble.

Next came a change. After an exchange of interceptions the Crusaders got organized and started moving from their own 46. First play was a 19 yard pass Prud'homme to Rook and the next a 20 yard run by Webb. Gorman was at the 15 and finished the drive in five plays. The payoff was a 6 yard pass Prud'homme to Rook on the first play of the fourth quarter. Johnson's kick upped the score to 14-7.

The Tigers snapped back with authority. After kickoff they drove 61 yards in six plays, the big gains being a 14 yard run by Hesse, a 17 yard pass Wade Walterscheid to Gene Haverkamp and a 20 yard touchdown sprint by Hesse. Henschel added the final PAT at 9:12.

The remaining time offered lots of action but no more scoring. On Gorman's first play after kickoff TJ

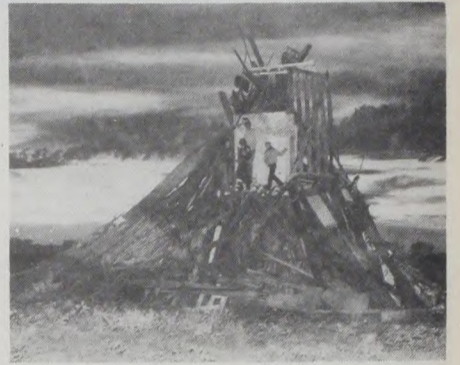
Walterscheid intercepted, and three plays later Hesse's pass to Mike Dangelmayr was good for 43 yards to the 5. But the big opportunity was spoiled on the next series by a 15 yard holding penalty. Tigers tried to settle for a field goal but missed.

Following Tyler's punt on second series of its next possession Sacred Heart missed its final chance to increase the score. Three plays and a 15 yard penalty advance 32 yards to the 11, but the drive ended in a fumble four plays later on the 8 yard line.

The perfectly executed play was good for 70 yards. For the PAT, the Tigers went for two points and made good, again on a halfback pass by Pitts. Drifting to the right on an apparent run, he tossed an easy floater to Kip Garner, upping the score to 22-14.

But that wasn't all. On first play following kickoff Muenster made a desperate pass attempt which ended in the worst way. Garner intercepted and sprinted untouched to pay dirt. John Pitts booted the bonus point. The Tigers had scored 15 amazing points in less than a half minute.

Besides firing the bomb that destroyed MHS, Jimmy Pitts was the Tigers' most consistent gainer as well as the break-away runner who made two long runs giving Gunter an 14-0 lead. The first came late in the second quarter after the Hornets, on a fourth down effort, failed by a foot to keep their drive alive, and they lost possession only 11 yards away.

On the next play Pitts busted through the middle and got loose. With Hornet defenders in futile pursuit, he accelerated 89 yards to pay dirt. John Pitts upped the score to 7-0 at 3:24 in the second quarter.

The next shocker came on the first scrimmage play of the second half. After kickoff the Tigers were 70 yards away and Pitts presented a replay of the previous big play. He crashed through and gained all the way to the end zone. Also John Pitts added the PAT, and Muenster was 14-0 in the hole.

So, Pitts accounted for the 229 yards in the three big plays that crushed Muenster. Furthermore the two breakaway runs made up 159 yards in Gunter's 218 rushing gains, and the pass was 70 of the teams aerial 103 gains. Besides, Pitts led his team in other rushing gains. He was by far the MVP of the game.

Other factors hurting the Hornets were misses on at least four scoring opportunities. Early in the second period a touchdown pass was barely missed and on the next play a touchdown pass was dropped in the end zone. And late in the period a drive died when a fourth down try was only 1 foot short on the 11 yard line. The next play was the big run by Pitts. Also, late in the fourth the Hornets missed a 33 yard field goal try.

Otherwise the Hornets gave a good account of themselves. During the first half they led in first downs and total yardage and penetrated the 20 yard line once.

In the second half, they started their catch up game immediately after Gunter's second touchdown. The drive gained 76 yards in fourteen plays and 5 first downs. Big gains were 22 by Kevin Felderhoff, 8 each by Ronnie Fisher and Carl Sicking and a 13 yard pass, Felderhoff to Fisher. The scoring play was a 6 yard pass from Felderhoff to Jeff Fisher. Felderhoff's PAT kick upped the count to 14-7 at 5:18.

Gunter then snapped back with a 46 yard drive in 7 plays featuring Pitts, before fumbling. Ronnie Fisher

recovered for MHS and the Hornets started their second scoring drive with 73 yards to go. Fourteen plays plus 15 free yards on penalties did the job as Sicking carried the ball 10 times and received Felderhoff's 6 yard pass for the TD. A kick by Felderhoff tied the score at 14-14 as the clock read 6:55 in the fourth.

On Gunter's next possession MHS got a break when Johnny Eldred intercepted on the 22, but a delay penalty spoiled the Hornet series. It was four yards short after 3 tries, after which Felderhoff's 33 yard field goal attempt failed.

Four plays later Fisher's interception stopped Gunter again, but the Tigers were not stopped the next time. That's when the 70 yard pass broke up the game.

The loss eliminates Muenster from 9-A contention. Its record drops to 3-2-1 whereas Gunter and Valley View share the second place at 4-2 and Lindsay leads with 6-0.

Defensive standouts for MHS were Chris Rohmer, Kevin Switzer, Brian Klement and Johnny Eldred.
