The old saying about the cure being worse than the ailment apparently applies to the Nader inspired federal order requiring air bags to be installed in future American built cars.

The chemical compound used to inflate the air bag is "a poison so deadly that it can cause convulsions and death, according to the Library of Congress."

The irony is that this substance is classified under federal law as hazardous material. The Office of Hazardous Material warns that "a cigarette spark or match can ignite the sodium azide and produce an inferno that burns faster and with greater intensity than gasoline."

Furthermore sodium azide can react chemically with the lead or copper in a car body to form an explosive more sensitive than nitro glycerine and a more effective detonating agent than mercury fulminate.

Representative Shuster says one's chance of being killed in a serious crash is five and a half times higher if using an air bag equipped car instead of wearing a safety belt.

And that isn't the only objection. Accepting the federal guess of \$200 as the price of an air bag, it means every car owner can be stuck that amount for a gadget that does more harm than good.

Also, after each inflation the bag would have to be replaced, and at a higher price than the original factory installation.

Another item to consider is the accidental inflation of some 30,000 bags a year, all of which would have to be replaced.

The thought of the thing's financial burden is downright depressing. The cost added to a new car is \$200 and installation cost in an older model is \$325 to \$600.

One has to wonder whether the smart alecs like Nader and his associates in the air bag brainstorm are really trying to serve the public or are they salesmen working for the interests of those who expect to provide the \$20 billion of unwanted gadgets?

What galls us especially about this thing is the fact that it is imposed on people who do not want it and would not use it if they could avoid it.

Certainly this was not the intent of our founding fathers. Their purpose was to protect people from others who might cause harm.

Ordinance Changes On Extension of Water, Sewer Lines

On the agenda for the city council meeting of Tuesday, September 6, is a public hearing on Ordinance 131-AB pertaining to a change of policy in extending water and sewer lines.

The change refers to Article 7 which specifies that a developer, contractor or property owner pay for water main extensions at the rate of \$2.50 a foot and for sewer main at the rate of \$4.00, and money is to be refunded as connections are made to the line.

The article is to require that the charge for extension be made at current cost rather than the formerly quoted figures, also that repayments be made on the basis of actual cost.

Schools Enroll 683 37 Under Last Year

The community's scholastic population took another dive this year as combined enrollment of the two schools lost 37 students.

Registrations last Friday added to 683 as compared with 720 after the beginning of classes in 1976.

The enrollment figure includes a kindergarten count of 39, which means that the total of grades 1 through 12 is 644.

However, on the basis of the 12 grades the enrollment drop is slightly less drastic. From 667 last year it declined to 644, a loss of 23 rather than 37.

Heat's to Blame For Most Increase In Electric Bills

The heat of summer has brought higher electric bills to most customers of Texas Power & Light Company.

While a recent rate adjustment played a part in the increase, TP&L Manager Mike Arrington says there are other more significant factors involved.

Arrington said TP&L customers have used more electricity — 22% more in June and July of this year over the same period of 1976 — to gain relief from the heat, a factor that obviously increased the total bill.

The average high temperature for June, 1977 was 93.4 degrees, 5.8 degrees above the June 1976 average.

Also affecting the total bill, however, is the cost of the fuel used to produce the electricity used.

Arrington explained that TP&L uses lignite coal at some of its generating plants, natural gas at others. The company used the least expensive fuels for its basic generation.

"At present, we are mining and burning almost 200 carloads of lignite coal per day, to generate about 40% of our customers' requirements."

Arrington said that previously TP&L's basic charge for electricity included a set rate for fuel of about eight-tenths of a cent per kilowatt hour.

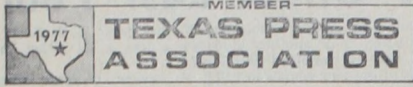

Free or Reduced Price of Lunches Continues at SH

The policy of offering free and reduced price lunches to children whose parents cannot afford to pay the regular price will continue this year at Sacred Heart School, according to Father Placidus Eckert, superintendent. The assistance is federally funded through the National School Lunch program.

Father Placidus announced that the school has adopted a family income scale based on the gross income and adjustments for family size below which children may receive the free or reduced price meal. A copy of the income schedule will be sent to the parents of each child.

Families falling within the scale or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for the free or reduced price meals. They can do so by filling in application forms, which may be submitted any time during the school year. Information is confidential and is used only to determine eligibility.

The form is reviewed and eligibility decided by the principal. A parent who is dissatisfied with the ruling may appeal to the superintendent. The policy provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against a student unable to pay the full price for a lunch.

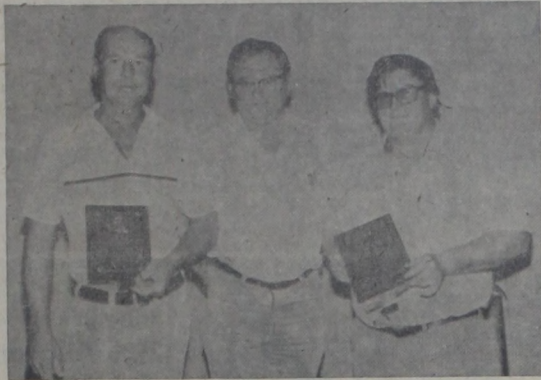

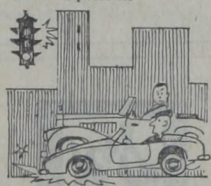

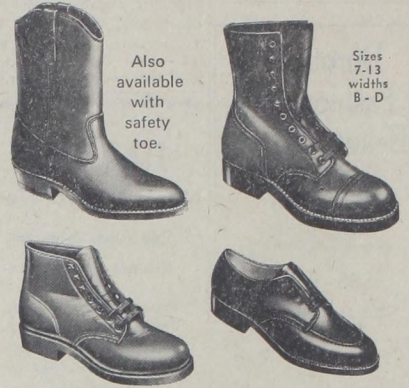
