



* * * To clean broiler grill, let cool before washing with soapsuds; use fine steel wool. (Remove grill and pan from the range, as soon as food is taken off.) Whenever possible, use only a moderate heat for broiling, and you will find the broiler easier to clean. (Many foods broil well with a moderate heat.) * * *

The oven-lining will last longer, if you roast meats at low temperatures (250° to 325°). It makes better tasting meat, besides, and also cuts down greasespatter on oven-walls

* * * To clean up spill-overs on oven-floor, let cool, and then use a fine steel wool




