Two hundred and twenty five cases of good whiskey purchased almost two years ago at a reasonable price continues to rest securely just beyond reach while men have to outrage their palates with bootleg hooch of questionable quality at outrageous prices

This much publicized incident will be long remembered as a first class legal farce. To evade state prohibition laws a group of officers ordered the liquor to be sent directly from a St. Louis distributor to the post, which was assumed to come only under federal and not state. jurisdiction. State officers, insisting that state liquor laws applied to the post and especially to liquor on its way to the post, grabbed the whole kabo-

Then followed months of legal red tape with the ultimate result that the state was informed it had no jurisdiction in the first place. Hence the shipment is to pro-

That will be one of the post war problems confronting this nation, he said. He urged against the tendency to let bureau men dictate, and spoke against acceptance of much federal aid, which, he reminded, is no gain in the long run, because the people, as tax payers, must pay for these services. He pointed out that cooperation and development of farm land through conservation practices is the thing to get back to. It is important in regard to our national security. Agriculture is the very foundation of our whole economic set up. When farm conditions are bad, the whole economic set up is affected and the result is depression. The spirit of community cooperation which prevails in Muenster is a fine example of what America can be, he said. It is an example of what America MUST be to survive. "This work you are doing here is a fine example to your own Texas and to the nation." he concluded. 




