County Goes 10 To 2 For Roosevelt; Ferguson Majority

County voters, who in 1923 elected a majority of 41 of their votes for the republican presidential ticket of Herbert Hoover, went last Tuesday and by a margin of ten to one repudiated their administration and expressed a desire for "a new deal" in the direction of Franklin D. Roosevelt, Democratic nominee for Governor, a big lead in the largest ever general election in this county was won decisively than ever before.

They were voting for the Democratic leaders, Brown people in a decisive majority their ballots for a straight ticket. They gave Mrs. A. Ferguson, Democratic nominee for Sheriff, a big lead in Bullington, Republican especially in the rural boxes of the four city wards the nominee had only a lead over her Republican opponent.

The total city vote is 1,049, Bullington 982, Ferguson 25 of the 30 wards gave Mrs. Ferguson 2,279 Bullington 1,400.

SET RECORD IN HEAD TRANSFER

When the Alexander Brothers of Brownwood trailed 12,500 sheep and goats in 36 days over the distance of 100 miles from Flatrock in Upton county to the 50,000 acre James River ranch in Kimble and Mason counties, they set a modern record for such transfers of stock. So says the San Angelo Standard. The story follows:

The trip 12 ewes were lost by death. Thirty head of horses went in the caravan and 16 men were employed. They crossed 46 different ranches. The march began at Flatrock, followed the Shell Pipe line to Fort McKavett and then to the destination. When they were on the highway, they traveled from one o'clock in the morning until about nine, when the flocks were penned to avoid traffic.

River Crossed in Wagons

The crossing of the Llano river was made by using eight wagons, one load of lumber. This crossing was made in two hours and 45 minutes. When the sheep were lost. Farmers nearly furnished their wagons. At night the men slept in two tents. Four hundred boxes were placed in the outfit during the march.

Could Not Go by Rail

Self Sustaining Department

One thing in the 1932 budget which city officials point out is the fact that the sanitary department is now self-sustaining, for the first time in many years, if ever before. In 1931 the department showed a loss of more than \$5,000, as seen in the table, over what the department collected. This big loss is entirely wiped out of the coming year's budget. COTTON CROP ESTIMATE IS 11,947,000 55 PER CENT FEED, SEED LOANS PAID

WASHINGTON, Nov. 9.—The Agriculture Department today estimated the 1932 cotton crop at 11,947,000 bales as of November 1, compared with a 1931 crop of 11,709,000 bales.

Ginning to November 1 were reported as 9,245,534 running bales, compared with 12,124,295 in 1931 and 10,863,896 two years ago.

The department estimated a yield of 156.2 pounds per acre of lint cotton for harvest.

A. P. JONES, 73, PIONEER LOCAL MERCHANT, DIES

With the death of Andrew Perry Jones, 73, at his home, 201 East Anderson street, Thursday night, Brownwood loses one of its pioneer prominent business men. Although ill health had forced his retirement in later years, he was a leading business man here for almost half a century and perhaps had more friends in Brownwood and in this section than any other man. He had been in ill health for some years and seriously ill for the past several weeks.

The life of Mr. Jones and the progress and development of his business interest is interwoven with the progress and development of Brownwood for almost half a century. The one can hardly be told without telling also of the other. He came to Brownwood as a young man and started business in what was then a frontier town. He watched the growth and progress of the town and with it his own business kept in step with progress.

Born in Georgia

Mr. Jones was born in Columbus, Georgia, June 27, 1859. Before he was a year old his family moved to Texas settling in the town of Jefferson. He grew up there and after receiving his education became an employe in a book store. Then, desiring a change of location, he came to Brownwood in March, 1886, and continued to make this his home. He operated a book and notion store here for many years, the business gradually developing into what is now the Dublin and Canon store. In 1913 Mr. Jones went into partnership with L. E. Dublin and the store was known as Jones & Dublin. He sold his interest in the store to Mr. Dublin and O. B. Cannon about four or five years ago on account of ill health. Mr. Jones' first store was located on Fisk avenue near the square. Later he moved his store to Center avenue and occupied various locations on that street until the store several years ago was moved to its present location on Center avenue across from the Southern Hotel.

Mr. Jones also operated the first ice cream parlor ever owned in Brownwood. When warm weather came along every year he gave an opening night, inviting the whole town to be his guests on that night. In 1914 he opened a floral house on the cemetery road and operated it for three years. He went into the floral business for a time on account of his love for flowers.

Claimed Three Hobbies

In his life time Mr. Jones always said he had three hobbies—prohibition, flowers and the Dallas News. As for "booze" he always said leave it alone. As for flowers they represented to him beauty and he took great pride while he was still active in his floral garden at home. He spent many hours cultivating the beautiful blossoms.

His liking for the Dallas News was quite natural, inasmuch as he started selling the paper some time during the past century. He was local agent for the paper for more than 35 years. The paper he used to sell, he would send him the paper gratis for the rest of his life.

Mr. Jones was a member of the Methodist church and had been a member for many years. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias Lodge.

Mr. Jones was married to Mrs. Rosa Luster in October, 1902. His many friends sent many condolences during his long illness and join the bereaved family in their sorrow at his passing.

He is survived by his wife, one step-daughter, Mrs. Nell Ross Spitt, Brownwood, and one grandchild, Miss Elinor Spratt.

Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock from First Methodist church with Rev. John N. Renfro, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Greenleaf cemetery. White & London Funeral Home had charge of funeral arrangements. The Knights of Pythias lodge had charge of services at the grave.

Making Progress Sidney Road Work

Progress has been made on the six miles of road between Sidney, Comanche county, and highway 10, although rain is delaying the work now. Two large road outfits are on the road, one working near Sidney and the other working on the south end of the road. According to the town Burks, secretary of Brownwood Chamber of Commerce, a third outfit is expected to go to work on the road soon.

Pence lines have been located in the places where the fence has to be set back, except for about one mile. Three crews of workmen are moving the fence.

County Valuations Now \$14,657,167

Property valuation of Brown county has dropped almost two million dollars in the last year, \$14,657,167 for 1932 as compared with \$16,505,285 in 1931, according to tax rolls prepared by Tax Assessor Mrs. J. L. Karr and now in the office of Tax Collector Lee Meek for use in current tax collections.

The total amount of taxes that would be derived from this valuation, if all taxes were paid, is \$305,153.55 as compared with \$404,164.51, the total assessed tax for 1931. Not only has the valuation, but the tax rate on the \$100 valuation has been reduced in both county and state. In 1932 county rate is \$1, while the 1931 rate was \$1.30. The state rate has dropped from 74 cents to 69 cents. With decreases in both valuations and rates, taxes are considerably lower this year than last.

Fewer Horses and Mules

There are fewer horses and mules in the county this year than last, according to the rolls. The figure for 1932 is 5,766 with a valuation of \$76,810, as compared with 5,993 in 1931 with a valuation of \$94,212. There are a greater number of cattle in the county this year on which taxes are to be paid than in 1931, but the valuation is not as great. The 1932 rolls show 69,766 head of cattle with a valuation of \$210,690, while the 1931 rolls showed 19,557 head of cattle with \$253,172 valuation.

Auto License Plates for '33 Received Here

Brown county's part of the new 1933 automobile license plates have been received at the office of Tax Collector Lee Meek. The new plates are in strikingly pretty colors this year—orange numbers on a white background. There are 6,300 pairs of passenger car plates and the numbers range from 129951 to 132350. The automobile registration period starts December 1st at the tax collector's office.

Increases in Trucks

Interesting Relic of Currency of 1841 in Hands Brown County Couple

Mr. and Mrs. George Jackson of the Chapel Hill community, near Brownwood, have in their possession a \$1 Shin Plaster, at least that's what they call the antique and that's the monicker given the relic of an earlier day by the hardy pioneers who used this "Shin Plaster" as a medium of exchange.

The "Shin Plaster" in question is a one dollar bill issued by the Republic of Texas on June 1, 1841, almost a century ago. The number of the bill is 2462 and it is signed by Sam B. Shaw, comptroller, and I. U. Raymond, treasurer. The odd looking bill is printed on only one side and is of about the same size as the old paper currency of the United States.

The "Shin Plaster" was little more than an order on the United States when presented to the national treasury. Mr. and Mrs. Jackson state that the "Shin Plaster" has been in their family for many years. The relic has been framed to protect it from destruction at the hands of the scores who have inspected it. Mr. Jackson states that he does not know whether or not the note has any monetary value as an antique but adds that he is not interested in disposing of it.

BIG AMOUNT FRUIT AND VEGETABLES IS PUT UP BY MRS. C. F. SHIELD

The Coleman Democrat-Voice reports the achievement day of the Trickham home demonstration club, held at the home of Mrs. C. F. Shield, as one of the biggest and best achievement days held in Coleman county. Some interesting information is given on work done by Mrs. Shield and other members of the club. Mrs. Shield is the mother of Mrs. Travis McClatchy of Brownwood. She has many friends here to whom the report of the club's work is of interest. The Coleman paper's report of the achievement day program is as follows:

The largest and probably the best achievement day yet presented in this county was given at the home of Mrs. C. F. Shield at Trickham Saturday.

Features of the achievement day were, the large number of varieties, the quality of canning, the number of exhibitors, an American Girl beauty party dealing with a health, exhibit, suggestion table, eight suggested menus and the evidence of work that had been done.

"Mrs. Shield, pantry demonstrator for the Trickham club, has converted a bathroom into a pantry and has added white shelving at a cost of only \$4.00. In this pantry she has 137 varieties of canned products. Included in the varieties are 175 cans of fruits, 566 leafy vegetables, 395 starchy vegetables, 251 other vegetables, 136 meats, 124 pickles and relishes, 209 tomatoes, 106 preserves and jellies, 150 pounds of cured meat and 20 pounds of dried products.

"There are 1,962 cans of all products which are valued, conservatively at \$465.40. And all of the cans were obtained by assisting neighbors in their work. In assisting the neighbors her total amount of canning has reached the 3,000 container mark.

"Mrs. Shield has been assisted in her work by a daughter, Mrs. Leo Driskill.

"Besides being able to use the products she has canned for family use, Mrs. Shield uses some of the products in the operation of her boarding house at Trickham.

"Other club members to enter exhibits at the achievement day program included, Mrs. O. J. Martin, with 21 varieties; her daughter, Mrs. Joe Stacy, with 22 varieties; Mrs. Marion Ford; 18 varieties; Mrs. Watson Thomas, 15; Mrs. B. W. McKeever, 45; Mrs. Howell Martin, 23; and Mrs. Jess York, 28 varieties.

BUSINESS LEADERS FORESEE PROSPERITY'S RETURN WITH ROOSEVELT AS PRESIDENT

(Copyright, 1932, By United Press) NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Leaders of American business expressed relief today at the conclusion of political uncertainty and belief that a "single-minded nation" may now proceed to consolidate recent economic gains and go forward toward prosperity.

The general tenor of opinions gathered by The United Press from representative bankers and industrialists was optimistic. It seems to be agreed that the change in political administrations will not halt an upward trend in economic conditions, although it is emphasized that cooperation from all parties and all classes will be essential from now until the upturn has been strongly demonstrated.

"I can see no reason why changing of administrations should halt our progress toward business recovery," said P. W. Litchfield, president of the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company.

"With a friendly congress and a competent cabinet, and the vast public confidence in him which is indicated by the vote, Mr. Roosevelt will be in a strong position to carry out his program."

"The country has had a vast amount of economic education in the past few weeks, and it is to be hoped that from this will emerge a better understanding and wiser action in the solution of our economic problems. That the resources and man-power of America, properly directed, will make this possible seems assured."

Defense Expected To End Test in Houston

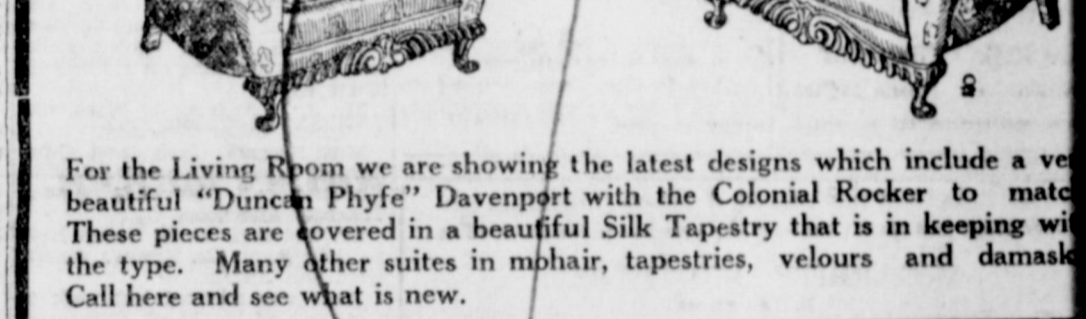

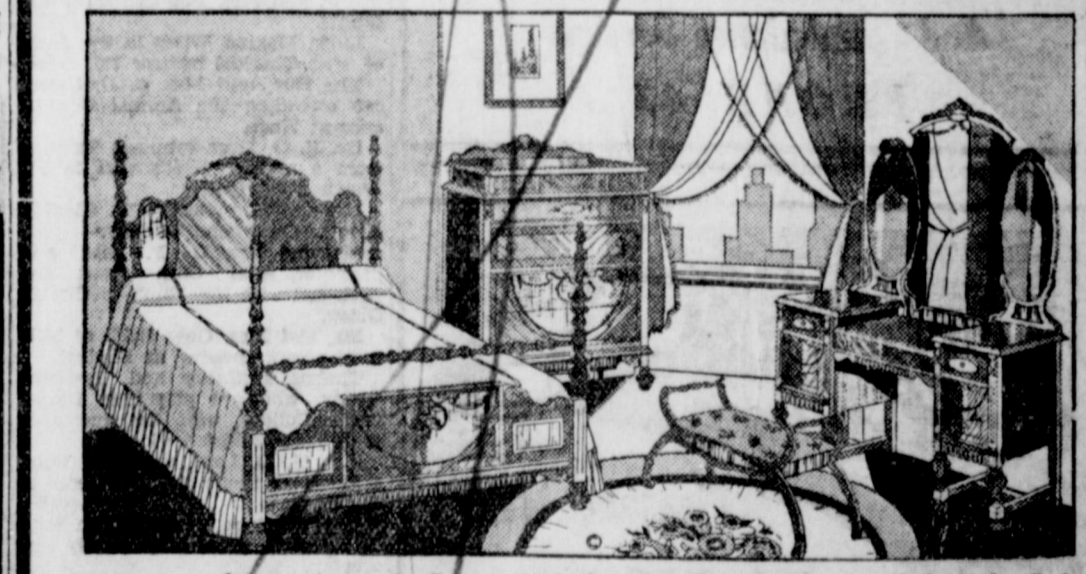

"Ma" and Jim Too Busy To Make Any Plans For Future

AUSTIN, Nov. 10.—Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson and former Governor James E. Ferguson, both today were working through the thousands of congratulatory messages that have come to the governor-elect and her husband.

"I haven't had time, even to read all the messages," Mrs. Ferguson told The United Press, "let alone make future plans."

She has decided, however, that she will reside in the Governor's mansion. "My daughter, Mrs. Dorrance Wait, will occupy my home and keep it in good condition," Mrs. Ferguson said.

Asked about plans for the new administration, they declared that relief of present economic conditions and relief from tax burdens are the first thing to be taken up.

"It is too early to go into details now," said former Governor Ferguson. "We have been busy with a campaign and have not had time to make definite plans."

Asked what Mrs. Ferguson's attitude would be toward repeal of the Dean law (state prohibition act) if the new Legislature voted to abandon it, former Governor James E. Ferguson answered for her that the important thing to consider now is what people will eat and wear and not what they are to drink.

For the present they are unprepared to make any statements about appointments under the new administration. "Governor Jim" said that when he has finished with campaign correspondence, he will have to devote some time to catching up with his private business affairs which have been neglected during the series of campaigns preceding the primaries and the general election.

The ten point platform, announced by Mrs. Ferguson at the opening of her campaign, and later adopted as the state Democratic platform, will be the chart for the new administration.

RULES MAKER OF FOOTBALL DIES TODAY

HANOVER, N. H., Nov. 10.—Edward Kimball Hall, 63, chairman of the rules committee of the National College Football Association, died of a heart attack at his home today.

Hall had been a member of the football rules committee for many years, having served on it with the late Walter Camp.

He presided at last year's meeting when numerous changes in the rules were enacted with a view toward reducing fatalities and serious injuries.

He was a native of Granville, Ill. He was an all-around athlete, at Dartmouth College, winning letters in track, baseball and football. He was graduated in 1892 and then matriculated at Harvard Law School, where he received his degree in 1895.

He returned to Dartmouth to receive a Master of Arts degree in 1902.

Hall resigned as vice-president of the American Telephone & Telegraph Company to return to his alma mater, Dartmouth, and become a lecturer, or, as he put it, "to play."

Thirty-eight years of business found him, at the age of 60, at the peak of his industrial career. Unlike most of the executive colleagues, he decided he would "rather play than work."

ROOSEVELT HAS STATE DUTIES TO ATTEND TO

BY FREDERICK A. STORM, United Press Staff Correspondent. ALBANY, N. Y., Nov. 10.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, the next president of the United States, went back to work today for the state of New York.

The President-elect who waged one of the most vigorous campaigns in American political history, traveling 20,000 miles and carrying his appeal for the "forgotten man" and a "new deal" into 37 states, turned to the task of budget-making for 1933.

"I'm going to be busy for the next couple of days on state budget matters," he declared. "Then I am going to Hyde Park for the week-end, returning to Albany probably Monday night."

"And what is more," he explained, "there are going to be no callers and no conferences. I am going to rest, that's all."

With less than two months to go before he hands over the reins of state government to Col. Herbert H. Lehman, who Roosevelt describes as that "good right arm of mine," there is at least one trip of some length to be taken by him.

He plans to go to Warm Springs, Ga., for about a week, during which he will attend the annual meeting of the board of trustees of the Warm Springs Foundation, an organization that operates the sanitarium there for persons suffering from infantile paralysis.

He will return immediately thereafter to remain in Albany until the first of the year. Close friends of the Governor said that between now and Jan. 1, his time would be devoted principally to the business of running the state and that consideration of cabinet possibilities would not be made until he was free to take an extended vacation, probably in Florida or some other semi-tropical spot.

Governor is Tired. For the first time since his battle for the presidency opened Roosevelt appeared tired from the ordeal. On his return to Albany late last night by motor from Hyde Park, he slept soundly while the car sped over the main highway that borders the Hudson River.

The President-elect awoke with a start. He alighted from the automobile and entered the mansion to be congratulated by the household. He went immediately to bed.

The Governor left New York for Hyde Park and Albany by motorcycle police. Along the route he was frequently cheered by persons who recognized the big No. 1 on the license plates of his car.

Neighbors Greet Him. Five miles up the road at the "Krum Elbow," his estate, several hundred more neighbors were there to greet him. With a band at their head they marched up to the house where the Governor addressed the briefly, thanking all for the support in the election.

"I want you to remember that I always will be just plain Frank Roosevelt to you," he remarked. "Hello, Madge," he called out to one in the crowd.

She was Miss Margaret Hedgecock, who had posed for a picture with him, remarking "isn't it thrilling."

"What I need is sleep," the Governor observed. "You don't need any votes," someone cried.

"Now, I'll tell you," Roosevelt said, "I had a serious talk with Jim Farley as to why we lost several states."

HOOVER AND ROOSEVELT DUE COOPERATE IN CHANGING OF ADMINISTRATIONS IN MARCH

BY RAYMOND CLAPPER, United Press Staff Correspondent. (Copyright, 1932, by United Press.) NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—President Hoover and President-elect Franklin D. Roosevelt have pledged their intentions to cooperate in an endeavor to accomplish a change of administrations with the least possible economic disturbance.

The patriotic good sense of both men is sufficient guarantee of this. But in addition they have directly indicated a desire to cooperate during the difficult transition.

In his message of congratulation to Governor Roosevelt, Mr. Hoover promised "every possible helpful effort."

Governor Roosevelt replied that he joined in expression of a common purpose in helpful effort to the country. Secretary of State Stimson sent word he would be glad to do everything possible to assist the incoming administration.

Furthermore, in an address to the nation last night, James A. Farley, Mr. Roosevelt's campaign manager, said "I think I am safe in the assertion that no political overturn in our history has left so small a heritage of bitterness."

"Our new president cannot be partisan in his conduct of national affairs, first because his sense of duty will not permit it, and second because he must realize that he is president of all the people, and not the president of the Democrats."

These exchanges were more than the usual perfunctory telegrams of congratulations and thanks. They were the friendly moves of men upon whom great responsibility rests in an effort to bridge the gap which recently existed—the gap of mind which caused Mr. Hoover to warn the country that grass would grow in the streets if Democratic policies prevailed.

Difficulties Foreseen. The change of administration comes at a difficult time. The ticklish debt question is expected to come up immediately. A world economic conference is scheduled to be held this winter. The fate of countless banks and business enterprises depends upon continuation of Reconstruction Finance Corporation aid until an upturn comes to the rescue.

There is reason to believe that Governor Roosevelt is thoroughly aware of the situation and will take proper measures to inform himself fully and to organize his administration and his program with greatest care before actually taking the helm.

Otherwise the sudden break would involve serious risks. It is necessary for careful preparation which, if there were no other reason, would militate against the suggested plan of an early registration by Mr. Hoover and Vice-President Curtis and the appointment of Roosevelt as secretary of state to be made automatically by some president before March 4.

Close friends of Mr. Hoover are reported to ridicule the plan. It is possible Governor Roosevelt will be consulted henceforth before any important state department decisions are made. This would not be necessary, but it would be a considerate and far-sighted course to pursue.

It can be taken for granted that Governor Roosevelt contemplates no sudden upheavals which will send shivers of fear through the business community. Almost exactly a year ago in an interview with this correspondent at Albany, Governor Roosevelt declared that legitimate business had nothing to fear from a Democratic administration at Washington.

Bond Holding Co. Commends City's Economy Policy

The city of Brownwood has received an unusual commendation from Brown-Crummer Co. of Dallas, chief city bondholders and fiscal agents on the policy of economy being carried out during present conditions.

The letter received by the city today is in part as follows: "In reviewing the figure on the financial affairs of Brownwood as submitted by our representative, we do not feel disposed to pass the matter by without making some comment on the reduction of operating expenses."

"Figures for first six months of 1932 show a saving in general expenses of 41.3 per cent as compared with the same period last year. The city administration, mayor and aldermen is to be congratulated upon its courage and ability to handle its problems and may be assured that such conservatism inspires the confidence of your bondholders."

Unprecedented Triumph. NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Latest congressional returns established the democratic victory Tuesday as an almost unprecedented triumph.

Democrats won 23 senate seats, republicans won 6 and a short term contest in Colorado is in doubt. Of the democratic winners, 19 were wet, 3 were dry and six could not be exactly classified. Two republicans were wet, 3 dry and 1 unclassified.

Incomplete House returns indicated election of 285 democrats, 109 republicans leaving 41 seats in doubt. Upwards of 100 House drys have been defeated and the wet majority will be more than 300.

The Senate line-up in the 73rd congress, meeting next year, will be as follows: Democrats 59, republicans 36, farmer-labor 1.

With one contest still in doubt, the short session Senate line-up is as follows: Democrats 47, republicans 47, farmer-labor 1.

next year is overwhelmingly wet as well as Democratic. The dispute over beer is whether it shall be legalized this winter or next year.

Drys count on the chairman of lame duck prohibitionists to block short session beer bills. The Congress which meets next month was dry by large majorities in both houses on beer votes last session.

House and Senate Democratic leaders, however, promise immediate beer in conformity with the Democratic platform pledge. Wets of both parties are eager to co-operate to modify the Volstead act at once.

But the prospect is for bitter, protracted dispute. Among hitherto dry Democrats, some of whom support the national wet platform plank reluctantly, there is doubt about the alcoholic content which would be consistent with the 18th amendment.

Senators and Congressmen replying to telegraphic United Press inquiries reflected all shades of prohibition opinion. The divergence of their views demonstrated the certainty of sharp controversy this winter centering around the question of what alcoholic content could be permitted without violating the constitution.

Leaders of wet organizations interpreted the election as a mandate for immediate modification and repeal. Weeks of committee hearings may be forced by doubtful members of Congress and the drys before new beer bills could reach either House or Senate floor. The short session ends March 4th. Congressional wets must be more than jubilant and enthusiastic. They must be quick if beer is to be legalized this winter.

LATER RETURNS INCREASE LEADS OF DEMOCRATS

As additional boxes come in and revised totals are made of the general election vote Tuesday the leads of Roosevelt and Garner in Brown county continues to gain. The county also is giving Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson a substantial majority over her Republican opponent, Orville Bullington.

Mrs. Ferguson is now leading Bullington by 1,142 votes. The totals are: Ferguson 2,606, Bullington 1,464. There are only four boxes on which figures have not been obtained. These are Grosvenor, Dulin, Byrds and Angel with a combined voting strength of about 325 votes.

The official canvass will be made by the commissioners' court Monday and official total can be announced at that time.

Reports on Amendments. Figures of the vote on the nine amendments are available from only six boxes, but these include the four city wards. These incomplete returns show that all nine amendments carried in Brown county. The largest vote in favor of an amendment being the one to exempt from state taxes homesteads up to \$3,000 and the largest vote against an amendment being on the Centennial.

Totals on the amendments are as follows: The amendment which would permit the Legislature to make appropriations for the University of Texas out of principal realized from income on university lands, instead of being restricted to the interest on such principal as now: For 854, against 243.

To authorize legislative appropriation of funds for the proposed Texas Centennial in 1936: For 755, against 469.

Permitting retired army and naval officials to hold office: For 731, against 354.

Permitting counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of Mexico upon a vote of two-thirds majority of their resident taxpayers, to levy taxes for construction of seawalls, breakwaters or sanitary purposes: For 752, against 309.

Homestead Amendment. To exempt homesteads from state taxation up to \$3,000 of their assessed ad valorem value: For 945, against 254.

To forbid the Legislature to release or abolish any indebtedness owed the state or any county or municipality by an individual or corporation, excepting delinquent taxes which have been due ten years or more: For 699, against 372.

Combining the office of county tax collector and assessor: For 941, against 224.

To allow tax collectors to sell property for taxes without filing suit in court, as now: For 852, against 273.

Permitting only qualified electors who own taxable property which they have rendered for taxation to vote in bond elections: For 922, against 230.

Work on Sidney Road Is Moving Forward Rapidly

Good progress on improving the Sidney road from the town of Sidney to a connection with highway 10 was reported by Hilton Burks, secretary, at the Chamber of Commerce directors' meeting today noon. About two miles of the six mile road have been graded and about three-fourths of the work of moving back fences has been completed, he said. The work is moving forward rapidly, but finances for Brownwood's half of the road are not coming in so well, it was reported. Brownwood is to subscribe money for building part of the road and a committee of directors is calling on various merchants this afternoon to ask them to contribute. About \$650 is needed and thus far only \$450 has been raised. Directors said they hoped people who are called on will help in the project.

The Chamber of Commerce voted to hold a no-charge directory for the city. The matter was presented by Captain Dixon, who is working locally on the directory which is to be printed by the J. F. Worley Directory Company. The canvass of the city is to be completed by January 5th and the directory will be in the hands of the people some time during that month. It was decided that no one from the Chamber of Commerce would be sent to a meeting of the Good Roads Association to be held in Fort Worth November 14. An invitation to local road boosters to attend was read. Finances were discussed and it was reported subscriptions of the chamber are not being paid. Directors urge people who subscribed to pay as the subscriptions fall due.
