Plans, prevention cure for herbicide problems

If problems have been clearly exposed from application of a it's not too early to consider procedures needed to prevent similar problems next year suggests Howard Greer, Okla homa State University Exten sion weed control specialist. Four reasons for a producer to be dissatisfied with a herbi de are poor performance on rop sprayed, drif and injury onto adjoining areas or crop injury to another field because of herbicide carryover in the pray tank, Greer explains. He adds he has heard of sev ral instances this year of her bicides that didn't kill the weeds present.
A major cause of lack of weed control simply is the parthat will kill the particula weed species," Greer says. For preplant-incorporated preemergence applications, a mixture of herbicides recom mended for broadleaf and grass control usually will be most effective, he adds. Poste mergence herbicide labels usu ally are fairly specific abou hich weeds they will contro Another big reason perfor mance of a preemergence her bicide may be poor is lack of needed to activate which i needed to activate the herbiminate before rainfall occire the herbicide often fails to proide control.
The major reason for poste mergence herbicide failure is improper timing of the appli cation, Greer says.

"Sometimes a produce applies the right herbicide because he has seen it work applies it too late after th applies it too late after the
weeds are too large to kill with weeds are too large to kill with cide label lists weeds that her bicide will kill and the size they must be when sprayed, Greer notes.
There can be several causes of crop injury from herbicides. In years such as this with abundant rainfall, herbicide oil where crop down into the minating. Preplant herbicides minating. Another cause for crop injury from soil-applied herbicides can be too much herbicide for particular soil type.

 year of herbicide injury to adjoining crops. Sometimes volatility or drift of a herbicide uch as 2,4-D occurs. Most incidents are caused by applying the herbicide when the wind is too high. Herbicides such as 2,4-D, Banvel, Tordon, Glean, Ally and Roundup that will cause plant injury at extremely low rates are the nes that usually result in darden.Carry
have long residual life in the soil also can be a problem. Each herbicide label specifies how long to wait before planting a certain crop. If a changing situation requires a decision about planting another crop, Greer advises checking the label before planting Another source of crop injury frequent is activity of a potent herbicide that was present in an extremely small amount in the spray tank from a previous application. Some herbicides are used at extremely
low rates, and it doesn't take much to injure plants, he says. Picloram is an example. If some formulation of Grazon is spray tank isn't cleaned thoroughly with the appropriate solution, there can be enough herbicide left in the tank walls, nozzles and hoses to cause injury to a crop such as soybeans or peanuts. Water alone won't clean out this type of herbicide adequately. The label will provide
