## Valley View hires new superintendent

Steve Schneider will be the new superintendent of the Valley View school district effective July 1 . their regular March meeting hire Schneider among more than 60 applicants for the position. Schneider's hiring is contingent upon final contract arrangement.

Glascock, who will retire after 13 years as superintendent of Valley View, which has 500 .

Schneider seems strong in the area

district. "His main interest is in the development of teachers," Brinkley said. "We were looking for

character, and I think Steve fulfills that," he said.
While Schneider was principal at Ponder High School, that district
won two awards for excellence in won two awards for excellence in
scores on the Texas state-mandated testing program, Brinkley said. The board hopes that Schneider will be able to come on board by June 1 . Schneider will also assist in the
selection of a new high school principal for Valley View, Brinkley priaid.
Schn Schneider agreed that curriculum will be high on the list in his new
job. "The focus is going to be
curriculum and course offerings
because that's the most important part of education," he said. "I've
found in 20 years in education that we need to be positive in setting our standards for teachers and

Schneider, 46 , is completing his first year as superintendent at Newcaste in Young County, which

University of Nebraska and his superintendent's certificate from Texas Woman's University. He

and has also taught or been an administrator in Texas schools at Utopia, Odessa and Abilene. Schneider's wife, Linda, is a teacher, certified in Math and

The tiered service contains some of the channels that were previously part of basic and several new channels. Four channels that
were part of basic have been moved were part of basic have been moved
to the tiered service. Then, seven to the tiered service. Then, seven
new channels were added to make up the tiered service. This service costs $\$ 5.45$ a month. Customers subscribing to basic
now have two choices. They can now have two choices. They can
choose to receive only the basic
service and service and pay $\$ 12.95$ per month, or they can remain on the tiered
service and pay an additional $\$ 5.45$ service and pay an additional $\$ 5.45$
per month. People will be able to per month. People will be able to
purchase premium networks without taking the additional tiered service. There is no change in the number of premium channels or

Small telephone company response to newspapers By Alvin Fuhrman, Manager

Last weeks Dallas Morning News and the Gainesville Daily Register had lengthy articles critical of the telephone industry's recommendations to the Texas Legislators regarding the sunset
Review of the Public Utility Commission of Texas. Newspapers have
teamed up with Broadcasters Consumer Groups and Cable Ty multiteamed up with Broadcasters, consumer Groups and cable TV mult
Most of those opposed to changes in regulation are in competition with phone companies or plan to be. Competitors are not regulated, they can start any service, ask any price, and go out of business
again at will. Phone companies are sitting ducks. They can't increase- decrease rates or introduce new services without costly and time consuming hearings in Austin. Phone companies are providers of last resort, if nobody wants it, it is alright for the
phone company to provide it. None of this was ever dreamed of in 1976. And the competitors want to keep it that way. The changes phone companies are asking for:

1. Regulatory Red Tape

We are not asking to be deregulated, only less requlation. We are asking for legislation that would shorten the timeline for the
commission to act on rate change requests and make it easier for telephone companies to provide consumers with new services created by technological breakthroughs.
2. In-state Long-Distance Rates

The Public Utility Commission now sets the rate that long distance companies pay for access to the local telephone companies to originate and terminate intrastate calls. These are set higher for in-state calls than interstate calls, causing in-state long Federal Communications Commission in Washington and are lower.
In addition, the plan calls for reduction in rates local phone companies charge for intraLATA long-distance calls within their
service areas. (such as Dallas, Fort Worth, Denison). This would service areas. (such as Dallas, Fort Worth, Denison). This would
3. Small Telephone Company Regulation

Small telephone companies like Muenster Telephone Corporation are burdened with the same regulatory requirements as Southwestern
Bell, serving millions of customers. Proposed legislation would Bell, serving millions of customers. Proposed legislation would
require the PUC to eliminate those that place unnecessary burdens require the PUC to eliminate those that place unnece
and costs especially on small, rural phone companies

## 4. Competitive Pricing

We want to have fully competitive pricing. Consumers are not fully benefiting from emerging competition because rates charged by local phone companies are not flexible. It actually hinders true They don't really have to compete.
5. Alternative Form of Regulation

Alternative forms of regulation would give telephone companies that can operate more efficiently,
6. Publishers' Concerns

Some newspapers and other information providers are concerned that telephone companies are going to take over the newspaper business, newspapers then the telephone companies. Telephone companies are not capable to report the news, not any more so than newspapers are capable of building telephone lines. Telephone companies are able to provide the means to deliver the electronic news, but not to report the news. Why are newspapers so concerned about the interests in potential competitors such as cable systems that have to provide phone service in the future.
7. Local-Service Competition.

A growing number providers called "Alternative Service Providers are providing local phone service in direct competition to the Houston and Dallas. Cable systems with fiber optics are planning to compete in the future also. These competitors concentrate on high density areas with high toll usage. Low density rural areas and low toll users will pay higher rates as these companies become mor successful. Proposed legislation would provide a level playing
field for phone companies to compete with these companies.

Enrique Juarez was born on Dec.
13,1918 in El Cristo, Cuba, the
sixth of 10 children born to Enrique sixth of 10 children born to Enrique
W. Juarez and Agueda (Fernandez)
Juarez. His father was a professor and administrator of secondsary
education, who valued learning highly and instilled this value in his
children, all who became professionals.
Completing his primary and secondary education in Camaguey, Cuba, he then attended medical
school at the University of Havana
and graduated in 1944. On Jan. 8, 1945, Enrique Juarez married Angeles Diaz, his
sweetheart for 10 years. They bore three children, Enrique, Rosa Maria and Maria de los Angeles.
Through hard work, he developed a thriving practice in obstetrics
(OB/GYN) and surgery. He was the administrator of two hospitals, the
General Hospital of Camaguey and General Hospital of Camaguey and
the Emergency Hospital and was Hospital. They built a lovely home and were living a charmed,
wonderful life when revolution came to Cuba in 1959 .
Their hope for the future of Cuba was shattered when Castro revealed his communistic ties. They endured terrible changes in Cuba. The
situation deteriorated and, in 1962, the Sent unied States to live with
Angeles's ister. In 1967, they sent Angeles' sister. In 1967, they sent
their oldest daughter to the United States. Enrique Juarez asked permission to leave the country with his
remaining family but was denied. For punishment, he was sent to
work on a farm for two years.
During During this time, he learned much
about astronomy and botany from his fellow laborers, two interests he Finally, in 1971, he was granted
permission to travel to Spain and thus he, Angeles, the youngest daughter and his wife's mother,
Rosita, were eventually able to reach the United States (in Baton
Rouge, Louisiana, where they were reunited with their two older
children). In 1972, he started working at
the USPHS Indian Hospital in
Philadelphin Philadelphia, Mississippi. He
studied English and successfully completed required examinations
for foreign doctors to practice in the U.S. In 1974, he worked at the
Marine Hospital in Galveston where he completed the state board
examinations for Texas, Mississippi
 and Florida; finally selecting
Muenster for his permanent position. In 1976, they moved to Muenster and quickly became part
of their new hometown. He ostablished a busy hometown. He established a busy practice and
developed many dear friends. The family's life in Muenster was one of peace and happiness,
touched by sadness with the deaths of his sister, Lar, and her husband, Rafael, and Rosita, all of whom are buried in Sacred Heart Cemetery. Enrique and Angeles Juarez
loved their life in Muenster so moved "heir the in Muenster so
much," said their son and their
daughters, "that upon retirement daughters, "that upon retirement
they decided to remain in Muenster." The family had quickly
earned to enjoy the wonderful Texas-German traditions of
Muenster life, and hoped that their touch of Cuban culture enhanced he rich Muenster heritage.

High protein content may bring extra value to wheat

A Kansas State University crop production specialist says 1993 might be a year for armers to receive extra Most from their wheat crop. Most signs point to high wheat yields and higher than usual wheat protein, for ning to pay a bonus. One thing that will help the wheat along is adequate
itrogen. Jim Shroyer and ellow KSU agronomist Ray Lamond, a soil fertility expert, remind growers of
the need to "topdress" their the need to "topdress" their
wheat with nitrogen before about mid March, when the wheat plants start to joint.
ing will still help l:he crop, an application before jointing. Nitrogen applied after jointing will increase grain protein content more than grain yields.
"We've not had much topdressing of the 1993 crop because of the rain last fall and the snow cover this winter," says Lamond. "KSU research has shown that nitrogen as urea or ammo-
nium.nitrate, which are dry nium.nitrate, which are dry fertilizers, or urea ammo-
nium nitrate (UAN) solunium nitrate (UAN) solly effective for topdressing wheat." topdreassing wheat.
Belutions act as a good carrier for herbicides, some wheat growers might want to combine their topdress and nitrogen appli cation operations, Lamond points out.
Lamond urges growers to line up their nitrogen sup plies early to prevent a
minute run on dealers.
Ironically, says wheat that produces hig grain yields tends to contain less protein than the market

Wheat Disease Management <br> Each year producers in the county are faced with the threat of county are faced with the threat of foliar and head diseases in their foliar and head diseases in their wheat crop. We are fortunate to ane have various fungicides available that can be used both as seed trat can be used both as seed treatment and late season foliar applications. Fungicides act to prevent the spread of yield-robbing prevent the spread overeld-robbing diseases. How severe a disease becomes on a crop depends on the susceptibility of the variety, the ability of the disease to mutate, and ability of the disease to mutate, and favorable environmental conditions. No field is immune from disease, however; disease development may occur in one area development may occur in one area of the county and not in an of the county and adjoining area. Therefore, producers should spend time scouting their fields for the <br> presence of various diseases. Probably the most damaging Probably the most damaging disease that we have today on wheat is leaf rust. Leaf rust is sometimes called orange rust and sometimes called orange rust and appears on wheat leaves in the form of an orange lump or appears on wheat leaves in the form of an orange lump or pustile. The disease first appears on older leaves and, as the fungus spreads, it will infect other leaves including the spread of this fungal disease. Producers Producers should scout their fields regularly and learn to recognize symptoms of each disease. The symptical time for disease control is at or before the flag leaf emerges. Several companies currently have fungicides available for leaf rust control. This past year we ran quite a few demonstrations in the county concerning leaf rust control using foliar fungicides. Results were good, showing an average of bushel increase per acre. was conducted on the Robert Klement Farm at Hood.
