Sheriff's Dept. employees to be paid \$30,000 in OT

Twenty-eight Cooke County sheriff's department employees will receive a total of \$30,000 in overtime pay from duties performed over the past three years.

Cooke County commissioners this week approved the payments, which will vary to employees based on the individual's hours of overtime, said Cooke County Auditor Gloria Parrish. Some of the money will be taken from sheriff's department budgeted funds, with the rest coming from reserve funds, she said.

Most of the overtime has come within the past year, with most of the overtime work performed during holidays, Parrish said. "Normally, we have this type of overtime planned into the budget," she said. "I think the employees just wanted to catch everything up when the administration changed."

Joe Nichols took over as sheriff Jan. 1. All of the overtime was performed during former Sheriff John Aston's administration, Parrish said. All 28 employees still work for the sheriff's department, she said.

In another matter, commissioners voted unanimously to continue to participate in the North Texas Regional Drug Enforcement Task Force. The task force, entering its fourth year, has been very successful in fighting drugs in counties throughout North Texas, including Cooke County.

Regional Bound... Lady Hornets shock Brock

Muenster Lady Hornets made school history Tuesday night as the first Muenster girls' basketball team to qualify for the Regional Playoffs. Their 53-45 Area Championship win over 2nd state-ranked Brock Lady Eagles earned the Lady Hornets a trip to Abilene's Regional Tournament this weekend.

"The defensive game plan was executed perfectly. These Muenster girls can play some defense," bragged Coach Brian Strother. "Our defense was working great the first half - now our offense had to get scoring."

Muenster jumped out to a 5-0 lead but Brock came back to take a 9-5 lead but, at the end of the first quarter, it was tied 9-9. Amy Otto picked up her third foul and the second quarter was an offensive struggle for both teams, scoring only 7 points for a 16-16 tie at halftime.

In the third quarter, Muenster's defense shut down Brock while the offense started clicking. Danell Reiter and Amy Otto hit 2 3-pointers each to assist in a 19-point quarter and a 35-23 lead.

In the fourth quarter, Brock went man to man, but Muenster's speed and quickness really hurt the Lady Eagles, taking care of the ball. When Brock made their runs, Muenster answered every time with free throws, 12 of 15 in the quarter.

"I knew they would win if they

would play 32 complete minutes. That's our goal the rest of the way, the winning will take care of itself," Coach Strother commented. "Muenster girls have been to Area 3 times. We didn't want to read about history, we wanted to set history." The school record for wins was broken at 31. "This was the biggest win in Muenster history - so far!"

Amy Otto poured in 21 points. Theresa Kubis backed her with 16 points, 4 of 4 at the free throw line and 10 rebounds. Danell Reiter added 9 points, 2 big 3-pointers in the third quarter. DaLana Walterscheid put in 1 and pulled down 7 rebounds to break the

school record of 224 - she now is credited with 226.

Candise Abney put some serious defense on Brock with 3 big blocks. Dianne Pagel had a great game off the bench for 5 points.

"This is a great bunch of girls to coach, plus I love to watch them play. They believe, and their desire to win is unbelievable, and all their hard work has paid off," added Coach. "Our fans were great - thank you very much for coming and supporting the girls. Great win, girls! Abilene next - here we come!"

Rebate checks increase for most Cooke County cities

A total of \$212.5 million in February sales tax rebates were mailed to 1,071 Texas cities and 109 counties, a 17.3-percent increase over their payments of one year ago.

"The state of Texas has experienced year-over-year employment growth every month since January 1992. The Austin, San Antonio and El Paso metro areas showed encouraging improvements over the past year and promising business prospects for the future," Sharp said.

Texas cities received \$192.1 million, up 17.5 percent over the \$163.4 million they received last February. Counties received a total of \$20.3 million for their February rebates, a 15.3-percent increase over the February 1992 rebates of \$17.6 million.

Sales tax rebate checks to all Cooke County cities, except Oak Ridge, were up this February compared to a year ago. The check

sent to Cooke County was also larger.

Muenster's check for \$18,241.01 was up 10.93 percent from February 1992. To date, Muenster has received a total of \$25,914.72 in rebate payments for 1993. This is up 16.61 percent from last February's payments to date.

Lindsay received \$5,085.18, an increase of 10.08 percent from last February. Its total payments to date in 1993, \$8,675.50, are up 12.85 percent from a year ago. Gainesville's rebate check for February was \$186,805.91, an increase of 27.04 percent. Total payments to date are \$282,473.89. This also shows improvement (28.82 percent) from a year ago. Valley View's total payments received to date (\$5,769.40) are 12.54 percent lower than those of a year ago. The city's February's sales rebate check was \$4,812.92, an increase of 23.36 percent from February 1992.

Oak Ridge didn't fare as well, receiving only \$2,905.63 in rebates. This amount was a 12.21 percent decrease. Total payments to date, \$5,930.40, are down 3.78 percent from a year ago.

Net payment to Cooke County cities in February 1993 is \$217,220.65 compared to \$174,806.79 in 1992. This is a 24.26 percent difference. Total payments to date, \$328,763.91, compared to 1992's \$261,943.67 are up 25.51 percent.

Cooke County received \$109,953.73 for February. This is a 24.75 percent difference from last year. Total 1993 payments to date, \$168,010.26, are up 27.37 percent.

This month's payments include taxes collected on December's Christmas sales and reported in January by businesses filing monthly returns. February's rebates also reflect taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for sales made in October, November and December.

Era ISD hires Hudson as first assistant principal, sets May 1 school board election

The Era school district will have its first assistant principal in the school's history with the selection of Duncan Hudson, who will begin duties effective March 1.

Hudson, the school's athletic director, will assist Principal Sharon Durham with all aspects of school administration in grades kindergarten through 12, said Era Superintendent Randall Beaver.

School trustees agreed with the district's site based management committee's recommendation in establishing the position of assistant principal. Mrs. Durham has been overloaded as the district's only principal due to district enrollment growth and because of an addition to campus facilities which are more spread out, officials said.

Communication between campuses and administrative duties will also be made a little easier with the installation of a new intercom system campuswide, officials said.

In a related matter, the school board during its regular meeting approved a one-year extension to the two-year contracts of Durham and Hudson.

Anyone interested in filing for a place on the Era school board has until March 17 to do so.

Era trustees have called a May 1 election to fill to positions on the board. The Place 5 seat now held by Jimbo Selby and Place 4 held by Carl Enderby will be open for three-year terms. Those interested in filing may do so at the Era administration office.

Trustees, during their regular February meeting, appointed Ima Dell Barthold as election judge.

In other business, it was reported that the school's new telephone system is in place and that students and staff are beginning to use the new library, which was recently renovated from the old cafeteria. Sidewalks have been added to the campus and the fieldhouse has been remodeled. The board is expected to get more information so bids can be let soon on the first phase construction of a new track field, Beaver said.

The board approved adding a full-time aide and part-time secretary to the special education program at the elementary level. The district will also purchase more software and special education

materials as well as look at updating the curriculum. The district must use at least 85 percent of \$101,782 in state funds earmarked for special education or the district would be in danger of losing the funds in the future, Beaver said. The changes and staff additions have been needed for some time in those areas, he said.

The board also:

--Approved a driver's education program. There will be about 35 students in the program this spring and fee will be \$150 per student.

--Reported that the high school computer team placed fifth in a recent computer competition.

--Approved the recommendation of the site-based management committee to hire a music teacher and authorized Beaver to do so.

Students must bring their entries for the Arts and Crafts Show to the school gym between 8:30 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. Monday. Besides the usual arts and crafts categories for grades K-12 and Shop and Home Ec entries, there are several new categories this year. Newton's Apple in Science will receive the Superintendent's Award and, in Math, the Principal's Award; a Coach's Award for Hornet Artwork, either serious or cartoon, for entries K-12.

Parents are invited to have lunch with their children Tuesday. They are asked to make reservations so that the cafeteria staff knows how many to prepare for.

Over three million students in Texas will show they are winners in the "game" of education as the state celebrates Texas Public Schools Week. The theme for this year's celebration is "Education - the Real Winning Ticket."

Letters to the Editor

Dear Mr. Fette:
This letter is prompted by the frenzy of recent suicide deaths in which the so-called Suicide Doctor, Jack Kevorkian, "assisted." As I write this, Kevorkian has been involved in three such deaths in five days, and each death was accompanied by widespread coverage in all the media.

The greatest danger in this saturation of media attention is that it may give terminally ill people the impression that Kevorkian's way is the only alternative to futile, expensive and often painful medical care. That is absolutely wrong.

For terminally ill patients and their families, there is another choice, and it is called hospice care. It is a form of care for the terminally ill that enables them to live fully and as pain-free as possible before they die, allowing them to spend their last days in dignity, making peace with themselves and their loved ones.

Hospice treats all the needs of such patients through a team that includes physicians, nurses, counselors, therapists, clergy, aides and volunteers. In most cases, the patient can be cared for in the home, with a relative or close friend serving as the "primary caregiver." Hospice also tends to the needs of the patient's family, advising them how best to handle the many practical and emotional problems involved.

Hospice is becoming increasingly known and more widely used. Last year, for example, 35 terminally-ill persons received hospice care in our community, nationwide the total was well over 210,000 patients. Hospice has become so accepted that it is now covered by Medicare, Medicaid and most private insurers.

Unlike Dr. Kevorkian, hospice operates openly. Ours is a community-based organization that opens its arms to everyone. Further information about our service can be obtained by calling us at our Cooke County office in Gainesville at 817-665-9891 or writing me at Home Hospice, P.O. Box 2306, Sherman, TX 75091.

Although our service is only provided to terminally ill patients, experience has taught us that the earlier hospice enters a case, the more effective our help can be. For this reason, and because it is also good personal planning, we invite all inquiries - even those where there may be no immediate need for hospice.

It is not our place or our intention to pass judgment on Dr. Kevorkian or on the people whose desperation drove them to seek his services. But those who think his way is the only way should be advised about more compassionate and dignified alternatives.

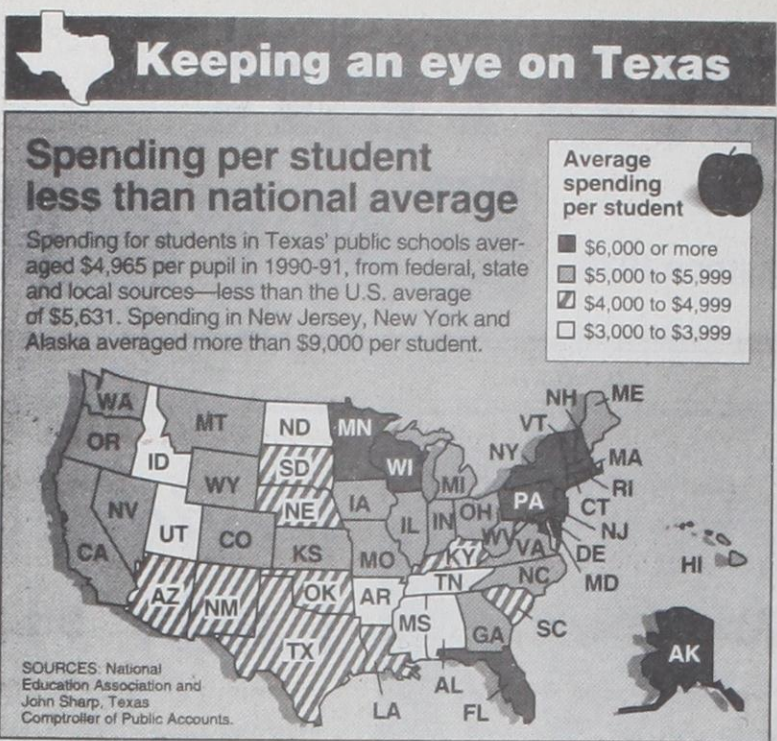
Tax Talk

This week's topic is rental real estate. An investor in a RRE (rental real estate) activity is permitted a limited exception to the passive loss rules if he is an active participant in the activity. In order for this exception to apply, the investor must have at least a 10% interest in the activity.

Basically, under this exception, the investor may be entitled to use up to \$25,000 in current losses from the activity as an offset to income from other sources. However, such losses must be first applied to income from other passive activities, and the \$25,000 maximum amount is reduced by 50% by which an investor's AGI exceeds \$100,000.

The standard for active participation can be met with the investor's regular, continuous, and substantial involvement in operations, provided that the investor participates in management decisions or arranges for others to provide services to tenants.

Take Regional from Amarillo... Tigerettes advance to the Final Four

Sacred Heart's Tigerettes battled the Mustangs of Alamo Catholic in Amarillo Friday afternoon to a 49-46 regional win and earn a trip to Waco for the TAPPS State Championship Tournament.

One expected this would be a hard-fought battle, and it was - till the last second of play. "It was a complete team effort," said Coach Jon LeBrasseur. Both teams were nervous with Sacred Heart starting slow and Alamo starting on fire. "We let Anna Nguyen attack the basket and offensively we stayed on the perimeter," Coach Jon continued. But in a matter of 30 seconds in the final period, the Tigerettes bounced back to close the score to 1, 35-34. Deann Bayer took a shot a little later to give Sacred Heart a 39-38 lead.

With 5:36 on the clock, the Nguyen sisters were back in the Alamo line-up and tied the game 39-39.

Game time is 11:15 a.m. on Friday morning. If Sacred Heart wins, they'll play for the 1A championship Saturday morning at 10:30 a.m.

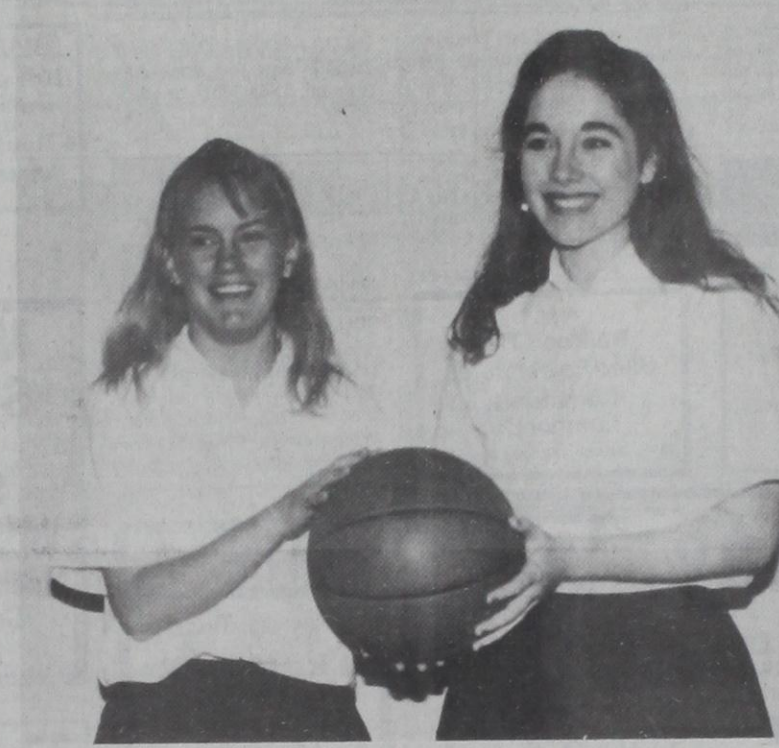

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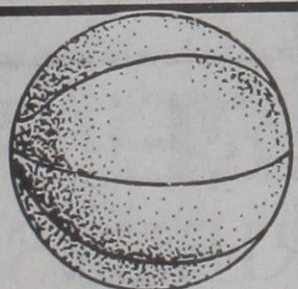

TDA reminds pesticide applicators to renew licenses

The Texas Department of Agriculture would like to remind commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators that the deadline for annual license renewal is Feb. 28.

Renewal applications were mailed in mid-January and should have reached all commercial and non-commercial applicators licensed by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Failure to meet the deadline will result in late fees mandated by the Texas Agriculture Code.

Licensing fees are \$150 for commercial applicators and \$100 for non-commercial applicators.

Applicators are required to pass category tests for each type of

pesticide application. They are also required to obtain five continuing education credits annually and 20 credits in a three-year period to renew their licenses.

As part of the 20 credits, each applicator must have at least two credits on relevant laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management strategies.

Applicators who fail to renew within a year of the renewal date will be required to retest before a new license is issued.

In addition, applicators who received a recertification deficiency notice are reminded that failure to obtain needed credits by Feb. 28 will prevent license renewal and result in late fees.

In Texas, more than 8,000 people are licensed for commercial and non-commercial pesticide use.

Protect farm life, not cheap food

Bon-appetit—and why not support the French farmers and their protests? Yes, they block international business, they create political turmoil with the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade talks, and their subsidies hurt some American farmers.

But, they stand up for their way of life and draw attention to our cheap-food policy.

Many believe farmers are expendable, and we can simply farm some place else. Nations are willing to sacrifice their own farmers and export agriculture to other countries, all in the name of economic efficiency.

In many industrialized countries, including the United States, farmers don't count. Consider the last presidential election: Farmers were not part of the political agenda.

Yet agriculture benefits more than just the farmer; it benefits millions. In California, it's a \$5.8 billion industry employing one out of every 10 workers.

California agriculture has weathered the recession far better than banking, defense and computer-related manufacturing. Yet it wasn't long ago that cities gladly would have rezoned prime farm land to lure glamorous high-tech industry into their communities.

Even on my small farm, I spend tens of thousands of dollars in the local economy each year to grow, harvest and ship a crop. That translates into jobs, jobs, jobs. I say to myself, "It's a vital part of the economy, stupid."

Americans have grown comfortable with an extremely inexpensive grocery bill, the lowest in the world. We spend less than 10 percent of our income to feed ourselves, compared to France's 16 percent, Israel's 24 percent or Sudan's 63 percent. We can't understand why others don't copy the U. S. cheap-food model.

Meanwhile, we discount studies documenting why others are healthier due to their diet. The French, with a passion for fresh produce and wine eat healthier and promote a nourishing attitude toward food.

The real price of our cheap food, how-

ever is seen in declining numbers of farmers and the concentration of farmland. The greatest price may be an expanding reliance on a rigid industrial model of agribusiness.

Farms have become "factories in the fields," ignoring a basic tenet: Farmers must live with an unpredictable and uncontrolled Mother Nature.

Yet, armed with advances in technology, agribusiness chases production and profits. The result is a continual need to out-farm your neighbor, and today those neighbors are other countries.

The current message being advanced is "if you can't beat them, join in exploiting them." Why not have the cheap labor in Third World countries stock our dinner tables? Let other, poorer nations deplete their resources so long as the cheap food chain remains unbroken. Free-trade proponents claim it's better for competition.

We lack a sense of history. We forget that a few generations ago the majority of us were rural. Yet we have a disdain for physical work and dirt. We retain the image of farmers as docile and dumb.

We ignore traditions that evolved on the farm. We disregard the warmth of farmhouses that were homes for extended family. On the farm, we had a place at our tables for parents and grandparents. We can't comprehend that, in some countries, farmers endure as a strong symbol of self-sufficiency and national identity.

We're losing our sense of meaning on food. It's something to be consumed and little more. Joy is lost when we simply equate value with cost. We complain about tasteless fruit, but we want it to be inexpensive and cosmetically clean. The produce department remains one of the few parts of the marketplace where choices are impacted by a few pennies. We support the cheapest product and gamble on satisfaction.

We've detached ourselves from our food; it is no longer personal. We want our meals faster and easier; our goal is to spend little time eating. We promote convenience and speed, equating it with quality and value. We are willing to spend billions on diets, nutritional supplements, and exercise gyms instead of simply eating right. We've managed to overlook

the notion "you are what you eat" and reclassify it as old-fashioned thinking. Food is not a player in our information age.

I applaud the French farmers. Their protests hint at something deeper—how we all feel about our food.

The French claim that food is more than a commodity or product; it is part of their cultural soul. The farmers assert they are more than managers, their farms more than factories. Livelihoods are at stake, not just trade agreements.

But the majority of us will still conclude this all gets in the way of progress. Reprinted from USA today
