City seeks volunteer to fill Tuggle's term

The Muenster City Council will appoint an alderman to fill the unexpired term of Aubry Tuggle who died suddenly on March 26. There was a question as to whether the position could simply be added to the May 1 ballot but election laws require a special election at the city's expense with published notification 45 days preceding the election. Thus, the time limit could not be honored for the regular election.

Mayor Ted Henscheid requested that any eligible Muenster citizen willing to serve out Tuggle's remaining year contact the council. The appointment will be finalized at the May 3 regular meeting.

The mayor and council voted in a special resolution of condolence in memory of Councilman Aubry T. Tuggle. It is printed on page 2 of this issue.

Street paving questions were again of concern as Councilwoman Fran Voth brought up the special price granted to Southtown Partners for paving the south side of Cross Street from Ash Street to Willow Street. Because that separate deal granting a compromise lower price would result in the city paying more than the traditional 10 percent share of the paving project, Voth wanted to disallow the discount. "I checked and this property is not in the flood plain," Voth said. "We have the power to correct mistakes." Her motion failed for lack of second. Art Hennigan's motion to drop the complete project on Cross Street also failed for lack of second. Hennigan then moved to revert to an oil and chip rock paved surface which was cheaper and had Southtown's prior approval at full cost. This motion passed by three votes to one with Gilbert Kubis voting against.

The council also changed to oil and chip on East Cross Street as a compromise with property owners to avoid the expensive assessment procedure. Paving on all projects is still hopeful for this year.

Repair of East Eddy Street was discussed, this three block section of the loop around town is the only unpaved section of that loop. Poor drainage and washing have made it very rough. An estimated \$3,500.00 of crushed rock is necessary to repair the problem including some of Maple Street which intersects. Ditch and culvert work is also necessary. Mayor Henscheid said it really needs paving to protect the repair and he and Gilbert Kubis would approach property owners in hopes of finishing the job right. The council agreed to waive curbing and hopes for assistance from County Precinct 4.

Other action and discussion by the city council included: -Flusche Enterprises must bear the entire cost of building new sewer line because their proposed

new building will go over the current line. Easement for the new section must be 20 feet wide. New construction is planned south of Highway 82 at the intersection with Main Street.

-The council accepted TU Electric's offer to continue renting space in city hall as a collection convenience point for \$200.00 per month.

-Bid to repair water tower leaks for \$16,000.00 was accepted.

-Request by Shawna Herr to rezone part of their property for a beauty shop in the second block of Oak Street was tentatively approved awaiting a final hearing by the council at the May meeting.

-Repairs to the rural rent house owned by the city were approved.

-Semi-annual contribution to the public library of \$2,500.00 was approved as was a bid by Hess Furniture to replace the front window blinds for \$380.00.

-The city will advertise for bids on garbage bags. They anticipate purchasing from Bancroft Bags for \$23,000.00, a year's supply, but must get bids first. Bancroft made the only acceptable offer last year and offered the same price for an early order.

-Park Board recommendations for the swimming pool were accepted. Pool manager will be DaLana Walterscheid at \$4.75 per hour plus concessions. Lifeguards at \$4.35 per hour are Candise Abney, Julia Felderhoff, Melissa Fisher, Laura Lutkenhaus, Amy Otto and Jennifer Walter. Private parties cost \$20.00 per hour plus \$6.00 per hour for an extra lifeguard. The pool will open on June 1.

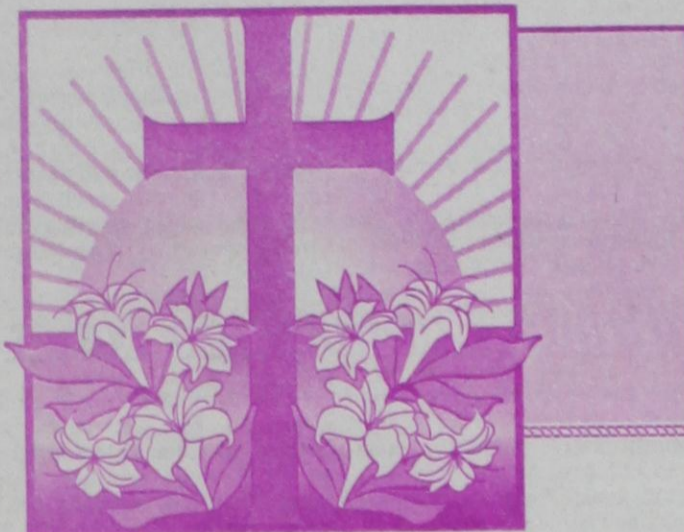
-Charlie Wimmer, Dan Bayer and Dwayne Rohmer were reappointed to the Water District Board.

-The council will switch to Texas Municipal Insurance for Workers Compensation coverage to gain a \$6,000.00 per year saving plus legal assistance if needed.

-Base repair on Third Street was approved to be ready for paving done by the Highway Department after Main Street repair now in progress. The Highway Dept. will resurface Third Street for 100 feet back on each side of Third, after the drainage construction.

-Monthly bills totaling \$45,285.08 were approved for payment.

-Councilwoman Voth reported she had received complaints about fire code violations at The Ranch. The complaints said that exit doors were barred shut and crowds exceeded the building capacity. The mayor directed the complain to Fire Marshall Traci Stoffels. Police Chief Helen Tompkins said when she goes into The Ranch to inspect, the doors are always open by the time she gets to them.

Total February revenue poor at Muenster Hospital

Al Felderhoff, Muenster Memorial Hospital Board president, opened the March 30 board meeting with a moment of silence in respect for Enrique Juarez, MD. Dr. Juarez, a physician at the Muenster Hospital and a member of the board, died on March 29 after a lengthy illness. He was still seeing patients until a few days before his death.

During the financial report for February Jack Endres, MMH administrator, revealed that the hospital's total revenues for that month had been very poor. "On the financial data side total revenue is \$80,710.00 - very poor revenues for the month. Aside from October of '92, you'd have to go back to September of '91 for a month of that poor a showing of the revenue side," noted Mr. Endres.

The board learned that everything had gone well in contractual negotiations with John Peter Smith Hospital and Dr. Thomas Currier is now taking part

in their OB/Gyn residency program. It will probably take him six to nine months to become certified. Dr. Currier plans to set up his office in Muenster when he is ready to begin his practice.

Don Flusche requested that the hospital board begin a weekly ad campaign for the Muenster Hospital in Muenster and Saint Jo to promote the doctors, special equipment, and monthly specials. A motion was made to this effect and passed. Don agreed to chair an advertising committee. Other board members on the committee are Margie Starke and Lora Hennigan. Brenda Rigsby, a Muenster Enterprise employee present at the meeting, was asked to serve on the committee to help with ad suggestions.

Jack Endres announced that the hospital had received a geographic reclassification from rural to urban. It is hoped that this will increase the amount of monetary reimbursement from Medicare per patient discharge. This change will become effective October 1, 1993.

In other business: the purchase of a local home to house visiting or new doctors was considered and the board gave Mr. Endres permission to negotiate such a transaction; reviewed the condition of the hospital's incinerator and the need for a paper shredder to alleviate some of the wear and tear on it; closed the open meeting and went into executive session at 9:20 p.m.

Graydog Down Under

Howdy Muenster again from Down Under,

This letter got a bit delayed due to much fun and excitement and many retreats over the past week and weekend. We finished up the retreats in Traralgon last Monday and Tuesday, Tuesday evening, we moved on to Moe (pronounced Moe-ee) where we did a two-day retreat on Wednesday and Thursday, another on Friday, then moved on into Warragul on Saturday. I'm staying on a dairy farm about eight kilometers south of Warragul and am loving it! So, I reckon I can give out a few details now.

At Moe, we did our retreats in "Old Gippsdown," which is an old pioneer Australia-type historical village on the outskirts of town. It was quite a lot of fun to run around in during the retreat. There was an old steam locomotive there, with a turn-of-the-century passenger car and caboose, all parked at an original passenger depot, moved there just for that occasion. "Downtown," there was an old service station, complete with real petrol hand pumps. There was a candy shop with some incredible old-fashioned homemade-type candy. The place had an old dry goods store, an old undertaker place, livery stable, land office, volunteer fire department, old country church, schoolhouse, library, assayer's office and lots, lots more. It was a most fascinating place, and it was nice to have retreats there, too.

I led the Friday retreat there at Old Gippsdown with 47 or so juniors. This was our first retreat in which the retreatants had had a NET retreat before. We've been places where NET has been before, but at those places, so far we haven't had any repeats. The schools normally will have just one class have a NET retreat each year, like only sophomores, but sophomores every year, so that all the students get one and only one NET retreat while in high school. Anyway, back to my juniors at Old Gippsdown, they were great. They were really rockin' from square one. They knew what NET was all about and they really went for it. It was a rather easy retreat to run, as well as it being a joy being with the retreatants.

That evening, we had a big dinner for all the NET'ers and their host families at one of the host homes. It was a great time with lots of food, and we even had a bonfire going outside! Yes, we were a bit outside of the city. Some of the 10th graders came in and gave us a present for retreating them on Wednesday and Thursday. It was a huge basket filled with chocolate Easter eggs and little pieces of candy caramels of all flavors. We're still eating off it. They also had made a huge card to us that they all signed (all 70 of them). It was about a 3x5 card (feet, that is). That was our first gift we received as a team. It was quite nice.

So, now I'm out at a dairy farm, with 350 cows, my host mom and dad, three host sisters, two dogs, three cats, three chickens, one goose, two bulls and one mare, not to mention two parakeets and various and sundry insects. These folks have a really nice set-up to milk with. It's a rotary platform for the cows to get on, and it has like minimal effort for the milkers. I'm impressed.

Well, I guess that'll do for now. See y'all later. God bless!

Video classroom to be demonstrated April 15

Steve Cooper, superintendent of the Muenster ISD and president of North Texas Educational Network (NTEN), has announced the completion of the fiber optic network to the first four schools. To mark the occasion, an "open house" will be held on April 15 starting at 6:30 p.m.

The main part of the program will originate at the Muenster Public School, with segments of the program from the other schools. The schools in this pilot project are Muenster, Era and Forestburg ISDs and Sacred Heart High in Muenster.

There is a great deal of interest in Austin at this time in Interactive Distance Learning. Rep. Charles Fennell of Holliday has introduced HB 1029 and Rep. Ashley Smith from Houston introduced HB 653, both in the House. These bills will

make video service more affordable to the schools. Besides Reps. Fennell and Ashley, other legislators that have shown an interest and are expected to attend include Rep. Ric Williamson of Weatherford, Sen. Steve Carraker of Roby, Rep. John Hirschi of Wichita Falls and Rep. Curtis Scidlits of Sherman.

Anyone interested in attending the demonstration can do so at any one of the four schools.

The 42-mile fiber optic cable connecting the schools together was constructed by Muenster Telephone Corporation. The lightweight terminal equipment and classroom equipment has been installed and is supported by North Texas Communications Company of Muenster.

Railroad Commission News

The Railroad Commission assessed a grand total of \$201,500 in administrative penalties this week to 22 oil and gas operators for violations under Commission well plugging and pollution rules.

To date in 1993, the Railroad Commission has levied \$636,268 in well plugging and pollution penalties, compared to \$328,666 in such penalties assessed during the same period last year.

A toll-free hot line recently installed in Railroad Commissioner Mary Scott Nabers' office appears to be a big hit with taxpayers. People from across the state are letting Nabers know how they feel about bureaucracy and governmental rules and procedures and, at the same time, are getting answers to some important questions.

"Our first caller said he had wondered for six years why railroad cars don't have reflectors on their sides so that drivers approaching train crossings can see them," Nabers said. "Anyone who has wondered something that long deserves an answer."

This week's topic is social security benefits. In 1993 you can earn more and still receive all your benefits.

If you are 65 or older on Dec. 31, 1993 you can earn \$10,560 and still get all your benefits. The SSA will deduct \$1 in benefits for each \$3 you earn over this limit. If you will be under 65 all year, you can earn up to \$7,680 and still get all your benefits. The SSA will deduct \$1 in benefits for each \$2 you earn over this limit. Beginning with the month of your 70th birthday, you can earn any amount and still get all your benefits.

If you think you will earn more than the limits this year, contact Social Security early in 1993 with your earnings estimate. The toll-free number is 1-800-772-1213.

"The state of shock our family has experienced defies description," said Lupe Martinez when she was interviewed for The Muenster Enterprise.

"It all happened so fast, it's all somewhere back there in a dream world," she continued. "I'm almost afraid to believe it's really true. First, there was this phone call at 11:30 p.m. last Wednesday, jarring us out of our sleep. Late night calls lead us to think of bad news.

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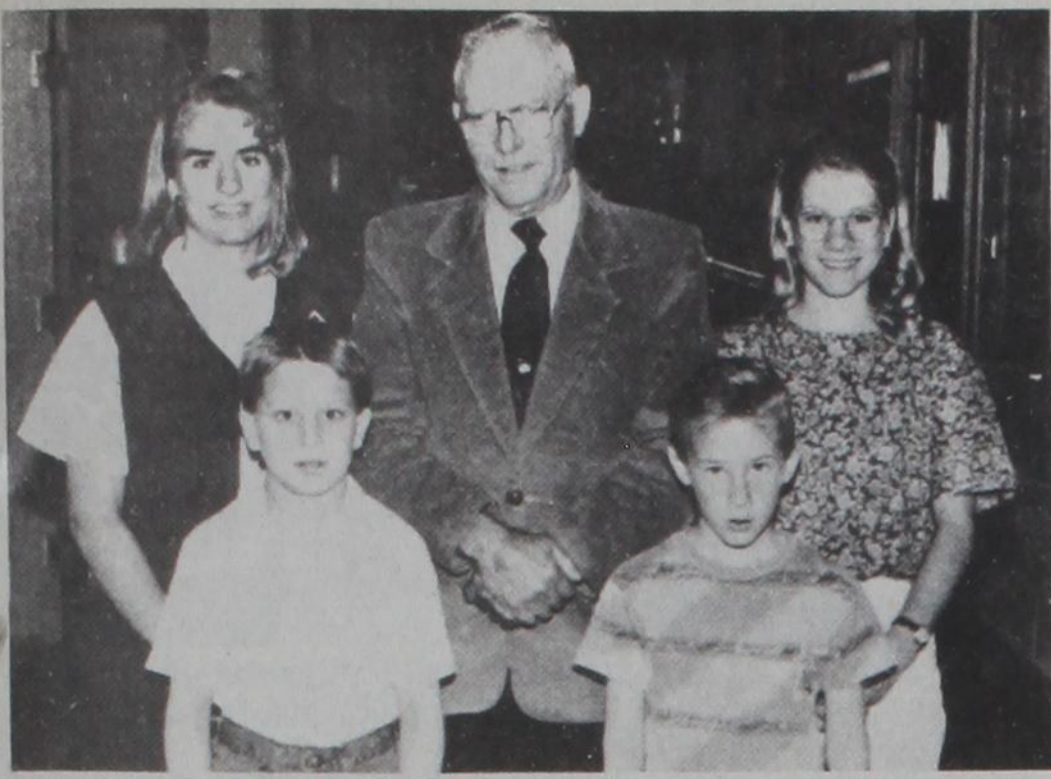

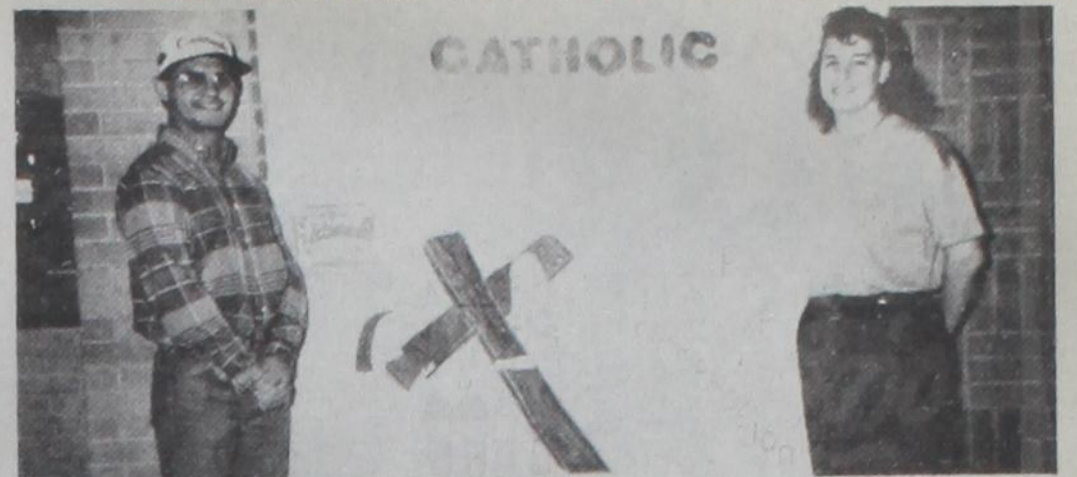

Texas wheat growers get new weapon against pests

Wheat insects like Russian wheat aphid and grasshopper take their toll on Texas' 6.2 million-acre wheat crop each year. A 1991 study by a task force of state university teachers estimated the economic impact of Russian wheat aphid in the Western United States at \$675 million from 1987-1991. The tiny insect sucked \$833,000 from Texas wheat growers in 1991 alone in a relatively light infestation year. But, a recent action by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency gives wheat growers here a new weapon in this tough battle.

grasshoppers in wheat. The registration covers 16 states, including Texas.

According to John Fitt, product development manager for DowElanco in Indianapolis, Indiana, the product has been used successfully on wheat insects in several states over the last few years under emergency use labels. The new conditional registration for Lorsban 4E grants a federally approved label for key wheat growing states.

Fitt says application of Lorsban 4E on wheat must be made in full compliance with the federal label. Interested wheat growers can get more information from their local ag chemical dealer.

County Agent's Report

"Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Program

The "Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Program promotes proper watering, fertilizing and mowing of lawns to prevent needless collection of grass clippings. When homeowners practice "Don't Bag It," they lower their lawn expenses and get a better lawn, while the city saves on garbage collection and valuable landfill space.

Lawn care recommendations for this plan were developed by Dr. Bill Knoop, Turfgrass Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The following guidelines outline the "Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Program.

Fertilizing Plan

For slow even growth, use a fertilizer that has at least one half of its nitrogen in a slow release or slowly soluble form, such as sulfur-coated urea or urea formaldehyde. Highly-soluble or quick-release forms of nitrogen, such as ammonium sulfate or urea, tend to produce lush high growth rates for short periods.

For optimum results, mow every 5 to 6 days. As a rule of thumb, do not remove more than one-third of the leaf surface at any one time. Grass clippings left on your lawn do not cause thatch, and will return valuable nutrients to the soil.

Watering Plan

During the driest period of summer, our lawns usually require about one inch of water every five to six days. Most hose sprinklers put out one-fourth to one-third inch of water per hour, so they would need to run approximately four hours in one spot. If water runs off the lawn before one inch is applied, turn the sprinkler off, let the water soak in for about one hour, then continue watering.

The best time to water is early morning, so less water is lost by evaporation. The worst time to water is in the evening because the lawn stays wet all night which encourages disease development. Lawns watered too frequently tend to develop shallow root systems which may make them more susceptible to grub damage.

My Side of the Fence

Coeur-d-Alene is a city of just under 25,000 souls and lies alongside Coeur-d-Alene Lake in Idaho, about 40 miles east of Spokane, Washington.

As one drives west on I-90, coming down and out of the Bitterroot Mountains toward the city, a natural scene as pretty as can be found is spread out ahead. It is a mixture of lake and evergreen trees of all sorts and sizes and, as you pass through, you are inclined to slow down and just enjoy it all. The whole thing is so calm and peaceful one would like to stop and stay awhile.

Can you imagine a motorcycle gang treeing a place like that? Well, word got out to some of the folks in Coeur-d-Alene that that was exactly what was going to happen, so some of the men in town decided to give the riders a real welcome.

It happens that there are quite a number of dairies operating in this area, and a lot of the high-quality barley raised on the farm is used to feed the cows. This barley has a round, hard and much larger kernel than most, and this fact gave one of the men an idea. 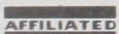
