Dank cave draws crowd

LONDON — Sitting alone in a cold, damp British cave miles from anywhere-may seem like the job from hell, but more than 100 candidates - some from as far afield as Poland and Pakistan have applied for just such a post.

Stately home Shugborough in Staffordshire, central England, is sifting through applications for the job of "hermit in residence" and will appoint the successful candidate next month.

"A whole range of people have expressed an interest, from office workers to a Tibetan monk," organizer Corinne Caddy told Reuters news service recently. She said most of the applicants were from Britain, with a few from as far afield as Pakistan and Poland.

"Our hermit will have to live as near as possible the life of an 18thcentury hermit," Caddy said.

In the 18th century, members of the landed gentry considered it the height of fashion to have a hermit living on their country estates. Usually given a five-year contract, hermits were often very well-paid.

The Shugborough hermit, however, will receive only a "small stipend" but he won't have to be deprived of modern amenities for too long — the post is a temporary one

West Nile confirmed at Clovis

JOURNAL STAFF REPORT West Nile virus, the mosquito-borne illness that has spread across Texas this summer, was confirmed in a Curry County last week, health officials have announced.

The virus also was confirmed in a Tucumcari horse that died the previous week.

These were the first two confirmed cases in New Mexico.


Several human fatalities in Louisiana have been attributed to West Nile virus, although officials say that most people would experience only flu-like symptoms if infected.

The Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta have said that less than 1 percent of the people infected will become seriously ill.

The only effective spray mosquito repellants are those containing DEET, health officials have said.

A vaccine — administered in two shots from three to six weeks apart - is being given by veterinarians to horses in the Muleshoe. Immunity is not established immediately, officials say.

Sudan to fund program again

Muleshoe and several other area school districts will continue for another year to receive funds from the Sudan district under the state's "Robin Hood" funding formula.

Muleshoe Superintendent Gene Sheets has pointed out that the agreement does not represent an increase in funding for Muleshoe, since money coming from the state is reduced by whatever amount comes directly from Sudan.

The Sudan money operates the "distant learning laboratory" - the interactive television that not only allows districts to share classes with each other but to receive dual-credit classes from South Plains College.

Last weekend's community health fair at the Eastside City Park is a cooperative effort among many groups and individuals.

"Essentially, this is just an agreement between Sudan and several school districts to share some of Sudan's property wealth," Sheets said Friday.

This semester, he said, Muleshoe is utilizing dual-credit algebra from South Plains and sending out a dual-credit English class. In agreements of this kind, the state requires the "partner district" (in this case Muleshoe) to use the money for participation in a technology consortium.



For a while now, I've been honored to be the announcer for Toni & Kenneth King's Silent Witness Christian mime ministry. I love what they do, and I am continually amazed at both its beauty, and its emotional impact. But I've never put on mime makeup and become a mime myself. (Well, neither has Kenneth, but he's a vital part of the ministry, and I'm just an announcer.) Even when, a



while back, they started miming some of the songs with me singing accompanied by tracks behind them at various churches and performances, I still announce, and do I say "us" or "them"? Well, they've told me, it's "us"! And I'm honored and thankful. (I still haven't painted my face white. That's not in the job description.)

I got a letter recently from the national political party to which I most closely subscribe. I've never voted a straight party ticket, but on almost all elections and issues, I get very close to it. 




