Nine Amendments

NINE PROPOSED amendments to the State Constitution are to be submitted for approval or rejection in the November election. We do not recall a November election in recent years in which there were no constitutional amendments to be laid before the voters, but it is somewhat unusual for as many as nine to be considered at one time. These nine, it is worth while to point out, were submitted by the Legislature after it had considered more than fifty amendment proposals offered by members of the two Houses.

MEXICO ANGRY OVER ATTITUDE OF POPE PIUS

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 5.—Conversion of Catholic churches in Mexico into "schools and factories for the welfare of the proletariat," was threatened by President Abelardo Rodriguez today if the "arrogant and defiant attitude" of the Vatican, which he accused of "falsehoods" continues.

A presidential statement attacking the Encyclical Aeterni Patris issued by Pope Pius XI accusing the Mexican government of persecuting the church said that "falsehood against the country has been characteristic of the papacy."

"Replying to open incitement to the clergy to provoke agitation, I declare that at the least manifestation of disorder, the government will proceed with the utmost energy to settle definitely this dispute which has lost the nation so much blood and sacrifice," the statement said.

"I am respectful of the liberty of belief which the republic's constitution establishes, but I am unable to tolerate that those who do not even know how to honor their own religion should employ the nation's goods for a campaign of hostility against the government, and I am therefore resolved that if the arrogant and defiant attitude of the recent encyclical continues, churches will be converted into schools and factories for the welfare of the proletariat classes of the country."

The reference to the church employing the nation's goods is explained by nationalization of all church buildings, which the church has occupied in recent years, subject to eviction whenever the government desires.

Encyclical No. surprise
The government was not surprised.

ed at the publication of the encyclical, the statement said, "since proceedings filled with falsehoods against the country have been characteristic of the papacy."

"Mexico is entering now the true period of institutions and stable government, a period of progress and advancement, and will not permit interference in the affairs of state by an entity whose existence is not recognized by our legislative principles which establish the absolute separation of church and state. The present government, born of the revolution among whose principles are spiritual liberty of the people and their disaffection, enjoys the support of the masses of the country who are unable to tolerate the domination of a foreign power."

The encyclical was expected to precipitate the final showdown in the church and state controversy which the government hoped to settle by the agreement of 1929, in which the late Dwight W. Morrow acted as unofficial mediator.

El Nacional, government newspaper, was the only newspaper here which has published a word on the situation since the encyclical was issued. The substance of the encyclical, as furnished by the United Press, was carried in the government organ, but other newspapers ignored it, fearing it might cause trouble.

Brown Is in List In Which Illegal Voting Is Charged

Brown county is listed among the counties in which illegal voting in the primaries is charged by Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson's answer filed Sunday in answer to Gov. Ross Sterling's contest suit challenging Mrs. Ferguson's nomination.

The list of counties in the answer as being those in which illegal votes were cast for Sterling, included Brown county as having alleged 617 illegal votes for Sterling.

Neither Ferguson nor Sterling leaders here today would make any public comment on the question of illegal voting here. Previously, when the votes were canvassed here, both sides said they were pleased and satisfied with the way the election was held in Brown county and were sure there was a minimum of illegal voting.

Properties Of Gov. Ross Sterling Sold Under Hammer Today

HOUSTON, Tex., Oct. 4.—Parting properties of Governor Ross S. Sterling went under the auctioneer's hammer here today at a foreclosure sale by the West Securities Company, trustees for approximately \$550,000 in Sterling's notes held by the West Production Company.

The properties consisted of stocks, bonds, notes and oil leases and lands in Harris, Cash, Dimmitt, Liberty, Matagorda, Maverick and Webb counties, according to the notice of sale.

The notice of sale listed stocks in the American Maid Flour Mills, First State Joint Stock Land Bank, the Trust Company of Texas, Sterling Properties, Inc. and the Houston Printing Company.

Bonds in the Sterick building, a skyscraper built by Sterling in Memphis, Tennessee, also were listed for sale.

The sale was held on the county courthouse steps.

An order was passed instructing policemen not to wear their guns exposed while piloting funerals. Council decided neither an automobile nor motorcycles could be purchased at this time for the police department and did not open bids called for a few weeks ago. Bids were returned.

COURT HAS NO JURISDICTION, JUDGE ASSERTS

AUSTIN, Oct. 5.—Judge W. F. Robertson this afternoon overruled a motion by attorneys for Gov. Ross S. Sterling to keep in effect an injunction restraining the secretary of state from placing the name of Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson on the general election ballot until action is taken to higher courts.

Robertson of 124th district court today ruled his court did not have jurisdiction in the Sterling-Ferguson election contest over the democratic nomination for governor.

Judge Robertson sustained the defendant's plea in abatement and dismissed the contest petition filed by Gov. Ross S. Sterling.

The court held that only the legislature had the right to pass on qualifications for anyone for governor. One of the strong points of the Sterling election contest petition was that Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson was not qualified to serve as governor.

Judge Robertson further ruled that the primary election, on which the contest was based, is a part of the whole election system and that the contest was brought prematurely, before the election was completed.

There was no demonstration in the court room as the Judge announced the decision which makes Mrs. Ferguson next governor of Texas, barring possible republican victory in the general election.

Purmer Governor James E. Ferguson left his seat in the court room, hurrying out to telephone the result to Mrs. Ferguson who had waited at her Enfield home.

Governor Sterling was not present. His son, Walter, was standing near Judge Robertson's bench as the ruling was announced but made no comment.

An eight page opinion was read by Judge Robertson. It began with a review of the proceedings to date and closed with this ruling: "I sustain the defendant's plea in abatement and dismiss the petition filed in this case by the plaintiff, restraining order heretofore issued necessarily falls."

The restraining order referred to is an injunction issued last Thursday midnight on application of Governor Sterling's attorneys restraining Mrs. Jane Y. McCallum, secretary of state, from certifying the name of Mrs. Ferguson to local election officers as the democratic nominee for governor.

NO BROWNWOOD FIRE LOSS IN MONTH OF SEPTEMBER

Centennial Resolutions Are Adopted By Business and Professional Women

Two resolutions, one heartily approving of the Texas Centennial amendment to be voted on in November and the other condemning the West Texas Chamber of Commerce for its opposition to the amendment as noted through the newspapers, were unanimously adopted by Brownwood business and Professional Women's Club Tuesday night.

The first resolution was: "Resolved that the Business and Professional Women's Club heartily endorse the proposed amendment to the constitution of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate funds for holding of a centennial celebration in 1936."

The second resolution was to the effect that the club believes the West Texas Chamber of Commerce should be condemned on its stand against the amendment, as noted in the press; that the district chamber is mistaken and that the board of directors be urged to reconsider the action and give hearty endorsement to the amendment.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. J. E. Boyd, 421 North Broadway. The resolutions were adopted by a vote of 10 to 0.

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FAMOUS WRITER IS NOT ALIVE, SAYS ATTORNEY

BY TOM MAHONEY. United Press Staff Correspondent. KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 6.—Ambrose Bierce, famous California writer who disappeared in 1890, was killed in the revolutionary battle of Ojinaga less than two weeks after his secretary heard from him for the last time.

So believes Carey McWilliams, Los Angeles attorney and author of the most detailed biography of Bierce. McWilliams has spent years in an effort to solve the mystery surrounding the fate and has had the cooperation of the state department of the United States and Mexican officials in seeking a satisfactory solution.

McWilliams bases his theory on the last letter of Bierce to Miss Carrie Christensen, his secretary, and upon information of Major Gordon de Prida, who investigated the disappearance of the Mexican government. The letter was postmarked Chihuahua City, September 16, 1913.

In it Bierce said he expected "next day to go to Ojinaga" where Pancho Villa's rebels next planned to attack the Huerta federalists.

Major de Prida, formerly censor of outgoing cables at Mexico City and at Vera Cruz interpreter for the late Richard Harding Davis, has found Villista officers who identify pictures of Bierce as an American who accompanied the rebel army to Ojinaga and who was not seen after the bodies of those slain in the successful siege had been collected and burned.

McWilliams scoffs at the recent rumors Bierce may be alive in a South American jungle and also discredits the numerous reports the author was shot at the orders of Villa or other Mexican leaders.

"Bierce would be 91 years old now," said McWilliams. "It is incredible to suppose he could be living in a jungle now or that he would have failed to communicate with his family and friends if he had lived long after the Chihuahua City letter."

McWilliams said theories Bierce was put to death by the Villa officers with whom he was last seen are without confirmation and do not fit with Mexican political history. Not until 1915 when the United States recognized his opponents did Villa turn against Americans.

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How to Avoid Winter Car Trouble

DALLAS, Texas, October 6.—"Almost human in their ability to obey the will of their owners, modern motor vehicles also have the human attribute of being susceptible to changes in the weather," J. M.
