

Ben H. Hellman, 73, a resident of this community for more than a half century, and first mayor of the city of Muenster, died Sunday evening at 5 o'clock in a Gainesville hospital following a two week illness and two major operations.

Funeral services were held here Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock from Sacred Heart church with Rev. Thomas Buergler, pastor, officiating at the requiem high mass and at burial in the local cemetery. He also delivered the sermon for the occasion
