HOUSTON, Texas, Sept. 22.—Despondency over unemployment was blamed today for the suicide of Miss Elsie Haden, 35, who climbed to the 12th floor of a skyscraper here late yesterday and leaped to her death 20 minutes after her arrival from Dallas. Justice Campbell R. Overstreet, who returned a suicide verdict following his inquest, said he understood the woman had been without employment for some months.

# Many Prisoners to Be Released Soon

BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 22.—Hundreds of short term prisoners are to be released from the state penitentiary on reprieves within the next few days, Governor O. K. Allen announced today. The release of the prisoners will be made upon recommendation of R. L. Hines, who quit his job as college professor to manage the Louisiana state prison.

Cowles said that the loan applications had decreased about 50 per cent since July 15th.

State Senator Frank Rawlings of Fort Worth, attorney for Sheriff Coley White of Austin, has been given until Wednesday to file briefs in support of Sheriff White's serving contempt citation on L. G. Phares, chief of the state motor patrol, and upon other officers. How soon the court will act after receiving briefs is unknown.

# BECK INSISTS THAT PRICE MANIPULATION EVIDENT IN MARKETS

AUSTIN, Sept. 22.—Cotton price manipulation is "self-evident," State Senator J. W. E. Beck, co-author of the Texas senate resolution for a cotton exchange investigation, said here today in answer to the demand of the New Orleans exchange for proof of the charge in the Texas resolution. "When there is such a change in price as occurred with only a 4000 bale difference in a government report there is no normal reason for such a drop in price as that which occurred after the last report," Beck added. "You will observe that cotton prices have come up again. If the New Orleans exchange wants a hearing, I will confer with Senator Will Martin (the other author) and see if we cannot arrange to give them one."
