Cub Scouts conclude Day Camp

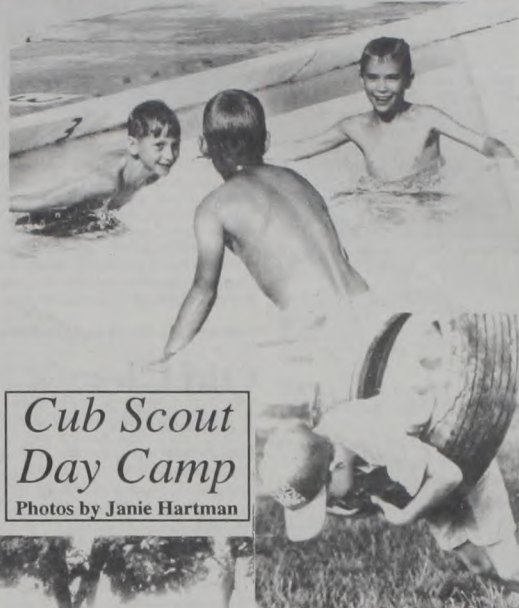

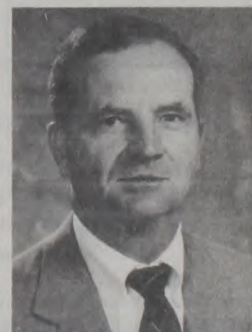

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following letter was sent to Jack Endres, Muenster Memorial Hospital administrator. Mrs. Hoenig wanted to share her family's experience with MMH with The Enterprise readers.)

Dear Jack:
My mother, Mrs. Frances Vogel, was a recent patient in your hospital after suffering a stroke. On behalf of me and my family, I would like to take this opportunity to express my feelings about your facility. First of all, the hospital was a wonderful setting for my mother to be in. It was sparkling clean and very comfortable to her needs. But more importantly, the nursing staff definitely went beyond the call of duty. Each was kind, compassionate, empathic and generally wonderful, not only to my mother but to my family as well. Even your cook, Mrs. Anna Herr, did very special things when she prepared my mother's meals. She always made her tray very attractive and even prepared homemade chicken soup for her - anything to make her stay more pleasant.

My family and I were especially touched when the nurses and Anna ordered doughnuts for us on a particularly trying day. They were

always close by with fresh coffee or tea. Also, their degree of professionalism was very apparent; my mother was always kept clean and comfortable but, most importantly, she was treated with utmost dignity.

As my mother's condition worsened after experiencing another stroke, my very large family seemed to congregate close by as the end seemed imminent. During this time, not once were we made to feel as intruders, instead we were always greeted with smiles and deep compassion. The evening of my mother's death, again your staff was very comforting and helpful to all of my family members.

Words can never adequately express my family's gratitude to everyone who made my mother's last days more comfortable. As a tribute to her, we have asked that donations be made to the hospital in her name. Please extend our thanks to everyone involved in Mrs. Vogel's care.

Justice Hecht brings campaign to Muenster

"I've worked hard since 1988 to restore integrity and respect to the Supreme Court and need help to continue the job," noted Nathan Hecht incumbent candidate for Supreme Court Justice during his recent visit with people in several Muenster businesses. "In six years Texas went from being a national embarrassment to gaining respect. Texans should be proud of what started in 1988."

Hecht explained that until 1988 candidates were being elected with huge campaign contributions from just a few people. CBS's weekly "60 Minutes" did a story on courts in 1988, "Justice For Sale". "It's all changed," said Justice Hecht. "The influence of big dollar contributions has been removed. We limited campaign contributions in 1988 voluntarily and we're continuing to do it this year. For example, I pledged to get more than half of my campaign contributions from non-lawyers. These are public courts and the public has a stake in who is elected. A candidate ought to go out and prove that he or she can get support from non-lawyers as well as lawyers." Hecht has the support of lawyers as evidenced when he won the state bar poll two to one over his opponent and the Dallas bar poll four to one. He indicated

that he is glad to have the support of the legal community, but that as a candidate he feels this isn't enough. It's got to come from the people too. "It makes all the difference in the world who the judge is," said Justice Hecht. "We elect judges in Texas. The people want that because they want a say in who these people are." People see names on the ballots and don't really know much about the candidates, he said.

Opposing Hecht in the November elections is Democratic candidate Alice Oliver Parrott who is chief justice of the first court of appeals in Houston.

My thoughts on the State Republican Convention

Today, there is so much more at stake with the liberal agenda constantly tearing at the moral fiber of our nation. We have got to stand up and fight before it is too late. The Republican Party will work for you to that end if you'll support it.

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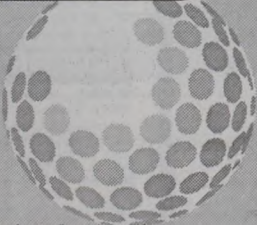

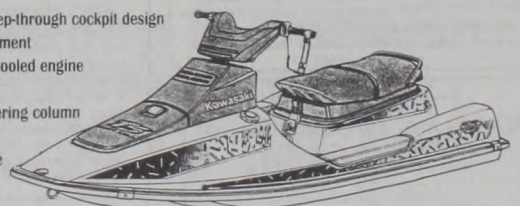

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Era ISD corrects mistake in land sale

Ten acres of land sold by Era school trustees in December for back taxes wasn't really owned by the district after all, officials said this week.

The Era school district is completing legal paperwork to recover funds from the sale of the 10.1 acres of land that had been sold in trust by the district for nonpayment of taxes since 1988. The land will be turned over to the rightful owner, which the district has discovered is the Texas Federal and Board.

Era Superintendent Randel Beaver said the land was auctioned during a sheriff's sale for nonpayment of taxes back in 1988, but there was no bidder. Since there was no bidder, the land was donated to the Era ISD, he said. Era school trustees in December awarded a \$3,600 bid to Marty Eldridge of Era for the sale of the land, but has since found that the property belongs to the land board. The land is located within the school district about five miles west of the school along County Road 337 in Landmark Estates.

Era trustees were updated on the land and legal proceedings during their regular June meeting. Trustees also heard that the district's total assessed property value is expected to drop more than \$300,000, according to preliminary tax roll figures provided by the Cooke County Appraisal District. The district's preliminary value has been estimated at \$31,050,399, which continues a downward trend in assessed value for the district and makes the Era School District one of the most "property poor" districts

in Cooke County, according to Beaver.

The board heard a report of hail damage to district facilities. Insurance replacement cost will be \$82,317, which will include roofs on three classroom-type buildings and replacement of roofs on every teacher house owned by the district.

In other business, the board: --Accepted the resignation of English and foreign language teacher Jean Arendt.

--Approved on final reading a policy awarding athletic letter jackets. The policy was amended to allow students who advance to regional or state in academic competition to receive a letter jacket as well as guidelines to add powerlifting as an eligible sport.

--Approved a waiver request to exempt juniors and seniors from final exams based on state recommendations that the students have attained at least an 80 percent average and have missed no more than three days of school.

--Approved a request by several parents to construct a baseball playing area on the campus with the stipulation that volunteer labor and donated materials are used.

County Agent's Report

WHEAT PLOT RESULTS

A farmer can do everything management-wise to plan for a good crop. However, weather is the determining factor for all agricultural commodities. We are seeing this happen not only with last year's wheat crop but now the weather is playing a key role in the success or failure of our grain sorghum, corn, and soybeans. The extremely hot and humid temperatures are having a detrimental effect to this year's summer crops.

Weather also played a key role in the 1994 wheat harvest. Drought, coupled with a period of excessive moisture and disease, all had an effect in this year's wheat crop. With this week's column, we will start a series on the results of the various wheat demonstrations throughout the county. The first demonstration we will look at was on the J. H. Bayer and Sons Farm located on Highway 82 east of Muenster. The demonstration was planted on October 6, 1993, at a seeding rate of 80 pounds per acre. Fertility was 100 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre and weed control was accomplished by using the herbicide Amber.

We tried to look at many of the new hard and soft varieties in this year's plots. There has been an increase in the dockage on hard and soft wheat which is encouraging producers to look more at the hard varieties. In most instances, if you are planning to graze, then the soft varieties will provide more forage.

This year's high producer at this location was an Agri Pro variety called Ponderosa. Ponderosa is a hard wheat which provided little to no forage production but had a

good yield at all of the wheat locations. Two soft varieties Agri Pro Mallard and Pioneer 2548 also had good yield results. These two varieties have been in the plots in past years and have yielded consistently well. Agri Pro has a new variety called Hickory which we will talk about later that is planned as a replacement for Mallard. We had Hickory, Mallard, and Magnum which are all Agri Pro varieties at the State Plots located at Era. Several other hard wheats that showed good yield results included the Ag Seco 7853, Agri Pro Longhorn, and TAM 300. Agri Pro Longhorn is a beardless hard wheat which should have some good graze out potential. TAM 300 is a Texas A&M release that has some good rust tolerance and fair yield potential. Some of the better grazing wheats include the 525, Agratec 91W, Coker 9803, Coker 9024, and 2163. 525 is showing an increase in the amount of rust each year but yields and grazing held up very well on this variety.

We want to thank the J. H. Bayer and Sons Farm for their continual support of result demonstrations in the county. The following chart is a result of yields at the Bayer location.
