## A WONDERFUL OPPORTUNITY

CTTON FARMERS in the Muenster area their profits in the future. By orderin car load lots they are able to offer at $\$ 1.70$ the same seed that would cost $\$ 2.50$ if purchased from a seed dealer and delivered by local freight.

That arrangement makes it possible for every cotton farmer to actually save money on pedigreed seed. And, looking into the future, it makes it possible to have Muenster recognized as a long staple area within a reasonably short time. With that recognition comes the premium price that all farmers-seek.

Furthermore, Muenster farmers can easily provide for future savings on seed by keeping a pure strain in this community Instead of paying the usual premium prices for pedigreed seed they could save seed from their own pedigreed crop. Again some local man, by taking a little extra pains at ginning time, could offer a pure strain of seed and get a premium price while still giving other farmers a better price than the delivered seed would cost from seed houses.
