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## BOY SCOUT WEEK

The tragic increase in juvenile delinquency has become a national problem of the utmost importance—and a solution is beset on every hand with complexities and difficulties.

This fact alone gives high significance to Boy Scout Week, which is to be observed during the February 7-13 period. The theme of that week—and it is apt one—is: "Strengthen America—Scouting Can Make The Difference."

A head of the national scout organization says: "The Boy Scouts of America for 54 years has enjoyed success and public acclaim for its part in the training of American youth in character values, citizenship skills and attitudes, and physical fitness. Over these years we have grown and flourished

because each of us involved has had a deep conviction of the worth of Scouting to boys and to America and because we resolved to act upon our convictions."

A wide variety of events and programs will take place during this Week. Beyond these, the hope is that the publicity and notice they create will encourage more and more boys to join their local Boy Scout organization—and, additionally, will lead their elders to do whatever they can to advance the work and the ideals that Scouting stands for. Rarely does a Boy Scout become a delinquent.

## HOW TO FIGHT FIRE WITH GASOLINE

The annual rhubarb on foreign aid in the Congress lit up many opinions, both pro and con. But the one we get the biggest kick out of is the straight-faced contention that foreign aid is a "deterrent to communism."

When you analyze how the money is used, and what it does to the American taxpayers—from whom it is forcibly collected—we would say it is a pretty good example of communism in action. How communistic practices can deter communism poses the biggest \$64 question we've ever come across.

In the first place, our present aid to other nations is, in many instances, used to finance nationalized industry and other socialistic ventures.

Let's not kid ourselves. Nationalization is nothing more than a respectable term for socialism—the forerunner of communism. When we are putting up the money for the very basis of the Red plague, how can we delude ourselves into believing that we are deterring it?

We Americans have long been propagandized into believing that a full stomach is the best defense against the ideology of communism. Even if this discredited theory held water, we know that the aid money doesn't go to buy food for the people—but to further subject them to control by their own governments.

Communism has never been a "movement of the masses." It doesn't move from the bottom upward; rather, it establishes itself at the top, through infiltration of governments, schools, churches, the labor movement, communications media, etc. Its leaders only deal with those of little education and in the lower income brackets when mass demonstrations and violence are deemed necessary.

Now consider where the foreign aid, itself, comes from: the producers of wealth in the United States, including investors, laborers and management, in every income bracket.

One of the justifications for foreign aid is the fallacy that, being the richest nation on earth, we have a responsibility to share this wealth with the "less fortunate" brethren in other parts of the world. Our do-gooders are apparently devoid of any understanding that our "wealth" is not a matter of good fortune at all—but that it is directly related to production. Americans have more because we produce more.

And we produce more because personal incentive and wealth are less restricted here than overseas. Yet we are told to charitably hand over the fruits of our own labor to those who are moving in the wrong direction.

And isn't there something about taking from one nation and giving to another that smacks of "from each according to his ability; to each according to his need"? If this isn't one of the basic tenets of communism, then Karl Marx was the biggest exponent of free enterprise this planet has ever known.

Isn't it time to return to some good old-fashioned "horse sense" and quit trying to fight fire with gasoline? Instead of trying to deter communism with communistic practices, shouldn't we be mounting a massive rededication to the free enterprise system? And shouldn't we begin by putting an end to the foolishness known as foreign aid?

### MEDICARE SHOULD BE REJECTED

Even though the hard cold fact that the federal government has no money except what it gets from the people has been hammered home again and again and again, proponents of the Medicare compulsory health program are studiously ignoring it. How else can you explain their insistence on enactment of legislation that would cost \$35 billion to treat the aged already eligible for the rest of their lives, as the American Medical Association has testified?

As others qualify, the cost would rise to greater astronomical heights. It seems to us that the unconscionable cost, alone, provides more than sufficient reason for Medicare's rejection but there are many other sound opposing arguments. These include:

1. The hike in Social Security taxes would have to be at least twice that estimated by the Administration.
2. There is no justification for the use of tax funds collected from workers at the low end of the income scale to pay medical expenses for the entire elderly population, including the self-supporting and the wealthy.
3. The aged who need help in meeting medical bills are already receiving it through private health insurance, through public funds, through voluntary welfare organizations and through self-financing.

return contains all your income. It will also pay you to see that it contains all your deductions.

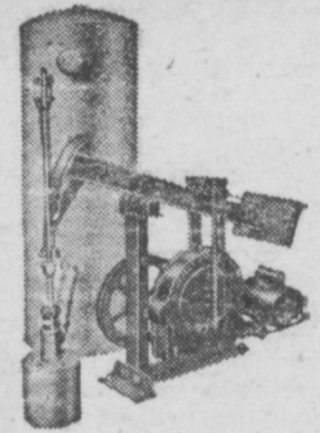

### SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



Bruno Fleitman continues to make excellent progress in carrying out a conservation plan on his Red River farm. Fifteen acres of brush has been cleared and established to Bermuda grass. In addition about 90 acres of old cropland fields have been planted to Bermuda with 40 acres being done in January this year. Bruno prepared the seedbed well in advance of planting. This year's seedbed was ready and received the moisture from January's record breaking snowfall. Cooke County ASC cost-share program is paying approximately \$9.00 per acre again this year. Personnel of the Soil Con-

servation Service located and staked a pond on the Tom Sicking farm eight miles southwest of Muenster. Cooke County cost-share program paid nine cents per yard. Tom has established three waterways and over 17,000 feet of terraces to protect 79 acres of cropland. He uses a legume rotation in his cropping sys-

tem and has 40 acres of vetch this year.  
Time is rapidly running out for those who wish to plant grass but do not have a seedbed prepared.

Alois Rohmer had his land prepared early and while the weather was good and moisture available he sprigged 35 acres to Coastal Bermuda

grass on his farm north of Muenster.

Leo Sicking also got an early start on seed planting. Early seedbed preparation permitted him to sprig 10 acres to Coastal Bermuda in January.

Ernest Medders has sprigged over 100 acres of Coastal Bermuda grass on his farm northwest of Muenster.
