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Folks who worked on the Cooke County Junior College Development Committee at the time the college and district were organized are concerned with a problem that has come up in next Tuesday's trustee election. Their intention was to assure the fairest possible representation on the board by having four trustees from the rural area of the county and three from the city of Gainesville. In seeking nominees to the original board they carried out that idea, and the election result was as originally desired.

## Voters Asked to Continue Balance On College Board

Now the county faces a possibility that the ratio will not hold up through the coming election. Two board members whose terms expire are seeking re-election. One is from Gainesville, the other from the rural area. With them on the ticket is another candidate from Gainesville.

The candidates are Howard Springer and William Pulte seeking re-election, and Gene Watts. If Pulte and Watts are elected the city of Gainesville would gain and the rural area would lose in representation on the board.

The present representation is four from the county and three from Gainesville.

Frank Morris, co-chairman of Cooke County Junior College Development Committee when the district was formed, issues the following statement to voters regarding the trustee election.

To the Voters of Cooke County:

I would like to remind the voters of the county that when the Cooke County Junior College District was organized it was generally agreed that representation on the seven man college board would be four from the county and three from the city of Gainesville. Since Mr. Howard Springer, who currently is serving out the term for the late Mr. Willard Kemplin is the only candidate from the Lois-Valley View area, I respectfully suggest we support Mr. Springer and keep the representation on the college board county-wide.

It also believes that provisions should be made whereby special appeals will not be needed for proper representation in the future. Perhaps one like that in county school board elections, whereby each commissioner precinct has its representation on the board.

President Johnson lost no time in designating Alaska as a disaster area as a result of last week's devastation by earthquake and tidal wave. In that he finds nation-wide agreement. It would be difficult, if not impossible, to find a person who does not think that the rest of us should go to the limit in restoring our Alaskan countrymen to the same economic level that they enjoyed before the disaster.

At the same time the nation is mindful that the job will be very expensive. Estimates generally run well past a half billion dollars. Considering that the nation's budget is already in the red, that amounts to a definite strain, and will increase the inflationary trend which is becoming an increasingly bigger national problem.

All of which seems to suggest that the only sensible course is to trim down on other spending plans, particularly on foreign aid. After last week's insulting outburst by Sukarno of Indonesia we are convinced more than ever that our help to some countries is complete folly. It's more than a waste. It is help turned against us. After more than \$800 million in aid he openly proclaims his support of the communist global conspiracy.

This presents a good reason to consider the attitude of others on the foreign aid list — and to scratch them off. Now especially, with good examples of domestic need and foreign treachery before us, it seems like a good idea to divert some foreign aid to domestic aid.

The wheat deal with Russia gets smellier than ever, as we discover that we have been suckered on another detail in the case. Senator John Tower reveals that, despite previous reports, Russia had enough grain to feed its people. It had 35.8 million tons, needed 32.9 million tons for bread and cereals, actually had a small surplus. But not enough for their proposed 800,000 tons of ethyl alcohol. That required 6.4 million tons, so the Soviets came to us for additional wheat. Which we obligingly sold at a bargain price and on terms which eventually will probably prove to be a giveaway.

To get the real significance of the deal, consider the Soviets' principal uses for ethyl alcohol: munitions, explosives, propulsion fuels, liquid hydrogen, primer compounds, poison gases, and other items used in warfare, including the atomic bomb. We were told at the

One Scratch Will Complete Voting On School Ballot  
Voting in the school election Saturday will be mostly a formality for Muenster people. They have no contest in their district election nor in the county board election. And the county college trustee election has three candidates for two positions. By scratching one name in that contest a person can complete his voting. No mark is needed to vote for the county and district trustees... unless a person wishes to vote for a write-in.

Locally the three elections are grouped on the same ballot. Jake G. Biffle Jr. is the only candidate for trustee at large on the county school board. Candidates for positions on the board of Cooke County Junior College are William Pulte, Howard Springer and Gene Watts. One name is to be scratched leaving two to indicate the voter's choice.

The two with the highest count will be elected. The three candidates for three positions on the Muenster school board are Jerome Pagel, David Trachta and Urban Endres.

## Indian Engineer Studies Methods Of Flood Control

Aloke B. Ghosal, executive engineer in irrigation and waterways of West Bengal, India, was with the local soil conservation work unit last Friday studying methods in flood control, which is a much bigger problem in his country than it is here.

Mr. Ghosal said that normal rainfall in his part of the country is 60 inches a year, with 80 per cent of that falling from June to October. And even that is mild compared with the northern part of the state where average rainfall is about 150 inches a year.

In his area the wet and dry seasons make it possible to farm two crops a year. In wet weather rice and jute are the main crops. In dry weather wheat, potatoes and winter vegetables are the crops. And, ironically, irrigation is necessary to grow them.

Ghosal's assignment, therefore, is to learn what he can about both flood control and irrigation, to be used in the same area. With the local SCS personnel he examined methods of keeping records and calculating reservoir capacity needed for control in relation to area watershed and frequency of rainfall. He also studied technique of constructing reservoirs.

He said farming there is still primitive. Oxen are used for power. That is the principal reason, he added, why people do not eat beef. Cattle are too valuable as workers and producers of milk and butter. So they eat sheep and goats. Even so, meat consumption is low. People live mostly on vegetables and cereals.

Ghosal is spending six months in the United States, will return to India in July. He is studying two weeks in the Upper Elm-Red Soil Conservation district.

## Facts About Social Security

It's that time of year again, the time for people to start thinking about filing their income tax returns. Gus Jones, social security district manager at Sherman, wishes to remind all self-employed people that the deadline for reporting self-employment income and paying the social security tax is April 15, 1964. He also states that in order to receive social security credit for 1960 self-employment income, it also must be reported by April 15, 1964.

If your net earnings are \$400 or more in a year, you must report your earnings and pay your social security tax when you file your individual (Form 1040) income tax return. Even if you are not required to pay income tax, you must pay any social security self-employment tax due. The present tax rate for self-employment income is 5.4 percent of your reported net earnings.

"A complete and correct report of all self-employment income," Jones emphasized, "is extremely important because future social security benefits are based on the amount of net earnings reported. The filing of incomplete or incorrect reports can result in loss of benefits — not only for the self-employed individual, but also for his family."

For more information about self-employment taxes and income, you may contact your social security office in Sherman, or the representative who comes regularly to Gainesville. He is in the basement of the post office building each Tuesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. until noon to serve you.

## City to Conduct Straw Vote on Garbage Service

An opportunity to express their preference for or against garbage disposal service is offered to voters of Muenster next Tuesday in connection with the city election.

It will not be an official vote, only a straw vote to inform the council whether or not people want a mandatory service at a price not to exceed \$1.75 per month for private homes. As proposed by the council this means that all kinds of garbage and trash are to be taken away by the city: food scraps, tin cans, glass, paper, tree trimmings, etc. If approved by voters the city will try to establish the specified service for the specified price and, if able to do so, will proceed in its usual manner.

The statement on the ballot will read somewhat as follows. FOR OR AGAINST: "A mandatory garbage collection system if it can be provided at a price not to exceed \$1.75 per month for a private residence and a graduated scale for commercial establishments based on volume and frequency."

It was pointed out that the service will not be practical if not used by all. Definite service cannot be offered without definite revenue, hence it will have to be mandatory if it is adopted.

### THIS IS A NEW ONE

Panama, which has already lodged charges of "aggression" against the United States before the United Nations, the Organization of American States, and any other body willing to listen, is now elaborating that charge. It is adding a charge of "economic aggression."

On what basis? On the remarkable thesis that Panama has a vested interest in the foreign aid that we have been giving her and that the flow has been shut off since Panamanian mobs rioted against the Canal Zone. Panama has had about 63 million dollars in aid through 1962 and the handouts have

been running around 11 million a year. This is in addition to annual payments of \$1,930,000 from the canal and the gift to Panama in 1955 of 24 million dollars in real estate and buildings no longer needed by the Canal Zone administration. When charity is being ladled out, it might be thought that the dispenser had some power of decision whether it was to be continued, increased, cut down, or shut off. But, though Panama has broken off diplomatic relations with the United States, it contends that the aid must nevertheless continue, else it will suffer.

This contention rests on a clause of the charter of the O.A.S. which prohibits members of the organization from taking unilateral economic measures against one another. But as foreign aid is a voluntary contribution, it might be thought that the provision would not apply. But that isn't the way Panama looks at the question. It figures that it has a permanent seat on the American gravity train.

United States officials, moreover, seem to take seriously the lunatic Panamanian argument that by cutting off foreign aid they might, in fact, be aggressing. They explain apologetically that the aid was suspended not as a political matter but for the practical reason that American administering personnel have left Panama.



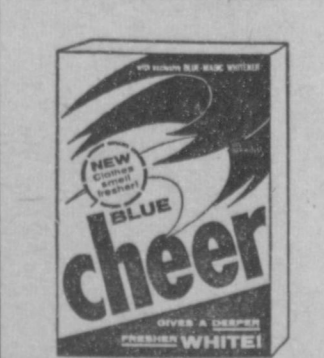

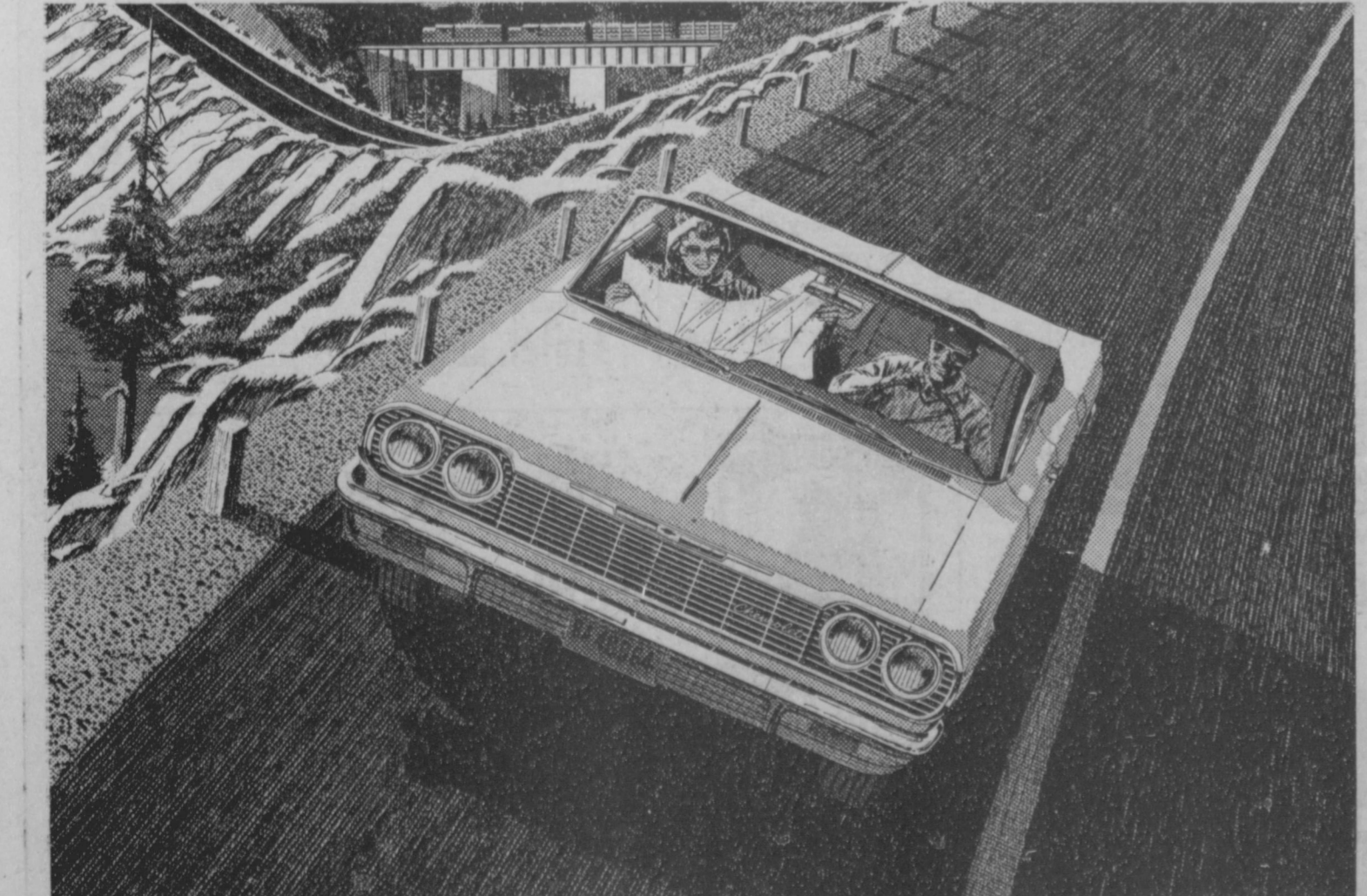

The situation recalls a statement that was accepted as axiomatic in the war. Any kind of help to the enemy increases his war potential. A gift of grain may go to soldiers instead of needy non-combatants. It may relieve a farmer for military service or factory service. It may, as shown here, go into munitions. Our folks in Washington need to give more thought to that basic fact. It's still true that the important benefit in any aid to the enemy eventually goes to his war machine. The axiom is a potent reason for refusing to send any more grain to Russia, or for giving any more foreign aid to the red satellites.

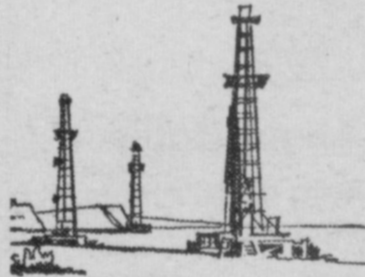
### Tigers Lose 4-3 At Collinsville
