Now the county faces a possibility that the ratio will not hold up through the coming election. Two board members whose terms expire are seeking re-election. One is from Gainesville, the other from the rural area. With them on the ticket is another candidate from Gainesville.

In trustee elections the two receiving highest votes are elected. Hence it is possible that the new board will have four members from Gainesville and County: three from the rural area. In time the board could be com-
