Can a business man, faced with an unprofitable operation, be forced to remain in business until he goes bankrupt? Seems like a silly question, doesn't it? We would say the answer is obvious. Of course he can quit. According to our understanding of the free enterprise system, he has the right to fold up any time he wishes and for any reason. In fact, we've always been under the impression that a person has a perfect right to quit even though he doesn't give a good reason for doing so.

That's why there's a sinister ring in a news report last week that Senator John Tower has introduced legislation to amend the National Labor Relations Act by adding these words: "Provided, however, that nothing in this act, or in any statute of the United States, shall be construed to prevent an employer from permanently going out of business, in whole or in part, for any reason, or to render permanently going out of business, for any reason, an unfair labor practice."

Tower's bill, he explained, was prompted by a series of recent cases, now on the way to the Supreme Court, in which NLRB and some unions apparently take the position that a man cannot contract to others a part of his business activities, such as delivery and transportation, if he prefers that course to the headache of doing business with Hoffa.

Tower expressed even greater alarm over the fact that the Supreme Court was recently asked by a union to prohibit a company from quitting business because, despite legitimate reasons for liquidation, the union claims there was also a collateral desire not to do business with a troublesome union.

How do you like that attitude? Common sense tells us that the cases presented to the Court are absurd and the unions don't have the slightest chance of getting a favorable decision. But think again. Lawyers who present the cases are not just wasting time. For some reason they believe they can win. Something about our laws and the Court's interpretation leads them to think they can force a beaten man or company to stay in a losing fight until he is completely destroyed.

Apparently they are applying the twisted axiom that human right supersedes property right, from which they assume that a worker has a right to his job even though an employer loses money in keeping him. In their narrow mindedness, or dishonesty, they refuse to admit that the employer has a human right to keep his property.

It's a tragic indictment of our country's legal interpretation when a legislator feels compelled to ask for a law which directs the Supreme Court to take notice of so basic a human right.

This reminds us of other efforts now under way to set the Supreme Court straight on the matter of separation of church and state. Proposed legislation seeks to restore voluntary prayer in school and the phrase "Under God" in the Pledge of Allegiance. It is amazing that intelligent men, claiming to be Christian, have to be told that banning God is not necessary to preserve the separation specified in the constitution. Our founders wished to avoid adoption of any denomination as a state religion, but they had no intention to ban God or non-denominational religion from public life.

The amendment to restore God to His proper place in our constitution is now bottled up in the Judiciary Committee, a fact which prompts us to wonder what sort of thinking prevents the committee from sending it to the House for a vote. Displeased with that stalling, a group of congressmen decided to circulate a special petition forcing the committee to submit the bill for a vote. It requires 218 signatures but has only 165, including Foreman, Alger and Patman of Texas. Again, we wonder what kind of thinking prevents other representatives, including many from Texas, from supporting this worthy petition.

Number Changed For Fire Alarms, Now It's 2235

To report a fire dial 2235. That's correct. The number has been changed effective with the publication of the new telephone directory.

Firemen and the phone company management decided on the change as a means of reducing the number of false alarms. They thought that small children playing with phones are more likely to dial 2222 than the new number.

Whatever the reasons, the important point is that the fire number is changed and everyone in town is urged to memorize it or make the change on their special lists.

Relative to phone calls the firemen also ask people to refrain from using their phones for a few minutes after they hear the fire siren. That's to assure available lines in case other calls have to be made about the fire. Firemen not on the fire phone network, or those missing the original call frequently have to phone in after hearing the siren.

Two other matters of cooperation are also requested by the firemen. Too many people go to fires and they park too near, often causing delay in hose connections. Those who come to look are asked to keep their distance.

And eager helpers are reminded that handling nozzles is the firemen's responsibility. They are welcome and appreciated for other help but the technical job should be done by those trained for it.

Illness Is Fatal To C. N. Worley, 78, Montague Pioneer

C. N. Worley, 78, of Saint Jo, father of Mrs. Lester Harris, failed to survive illness and a broken hip. He died Thursday, April 16, 10:25 a.m. in Nocona Hospital where he had been a patient several weeks. Death came five days before his 79th birthday.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Saturday in Saint Jo Methodist Church where the body lay in view from two o'clock to funeral time. The Rev. Ed Sooter, pastor, and the Rev. O. D. Oliver of Azle Baptist Church were officiating ministers. Burial was in Hardy Cemetery.

C. N. Worley was a native of Tennessee, born April 21, 1885. He had lived in Montague county 70 years and in Saint Jo since retiring from farming at Hardy. He married Miss Rilla Buck in 1907 at Gladys in Montague County.

Surviving are his wife; three daughters, Mrs. Lester Harris of Muenster, Mrs. Shafer Millisp of Hammond, Ind., and Mrs. G. E. Sloan of Ft. Worth; one son, Smith Worley of Sherman; six grandchildren, three great-grandchildren; one brother, L.O. Worley of Hobbs, N. M., and two sisters, Mrs. Bess Dick of Denton and Mrs. Maude Kennington of Houston.

New Directory Reflects Growth Of Phone Corp.

Marking the beginning of their second year of automatic telephone service, people on the Muenster, Myra and Forestburg exchange received their new directories Monday. The dial system was put into use on May 2, 1963.

A front cover feature of the new directory is a partial view of the Muenster Memorial Hospital, which was dedicated in January. A short description and list of its outstanding features is given inside.

The book lists 928 phones—711 in Muenster, 73 in Myra, 144 in Forestburg. Some of those listings are served by two or more phones, and the actual number of phones in use, according to Alvin Fuhrman, manager and co-owner, is 1050—825 in Muenster, 75 in Myra and 150 in Forestburg. The number of phones in use has increased about 60 during the year.

Other features of the directory are a list of area code numbers and a list of long distance rates. Regarding rates Fuhrman pointed out that a call anywhere in the United States costs \$1.00 or less after 9 p.m.

Fuhrman also said that additional circuits connect the three exchanges and additional dial equipment has been added in each exchange. The improvements permit more calls at each exchange and also between them.

Also featured are a list of emergency numbers including a change to 2235 for the fire phone, general information, and suggestions for cooperation in the use of party lines.

Jack Biffle Home And All Contents Destroyed by Fire

The Jack Biffles of Myra were left homeless Tuesday morning by a fire of undetermined origin. Their house and all furniture, clothing and personal possessions were lost except an electric clothes dryer with a few pieces of clothing inside.

The fire got its start and made big headway while a half dozen men were working near by in the yard. When discovered the heat inside was so intense that none would venture through the front door. Within a minute an alarm was sent to Muenster by mobile phone but by the time firemen got there less than ten minutes later the fire had burned a big hole through the roof.

Some two miles before they got there firemen saw the flames shooting high, radioed to Gainesville for help and also radioed Muenster to send a tank truck of water.

They exhausted their original tank of water in a few minutes and went to the Myra water tank for a refill. By the time they got back the Gainesville truck and the extra tank of water had arrived but the house was practically gone.

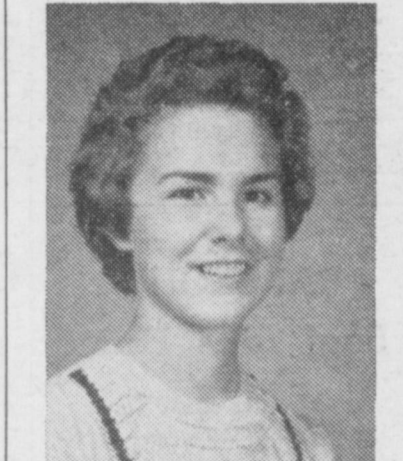
FHA Girl of Month For Feb. and Mar. Named by Chapter

The Denton City Council acted wisely in retaining the services of Lee Holt on an interim basis while the new city attorney, Jack Barton, begins his duties starting Friday.

His experience and knowledge during the drafting of the present city charter has been invaluable to Denton's municipal leaders. Holt tried to resign from the city post in April of 1962 shortly before he began his private practice. The council asked him to stay on in an interim basis until another city attorney could be found.

Despite the fact that the council and Holt both knew that his municipal job was a full-time position, the attorney managed to get everything done until the council more than a year later found a successor. This is a credit to Holt as an individual and as an attorney.

And was the city attorney who "undertook the immense task of codifying and editing the Code of Ordinances of the City of Denton, adopted and enacted Dec. 8, 1959."

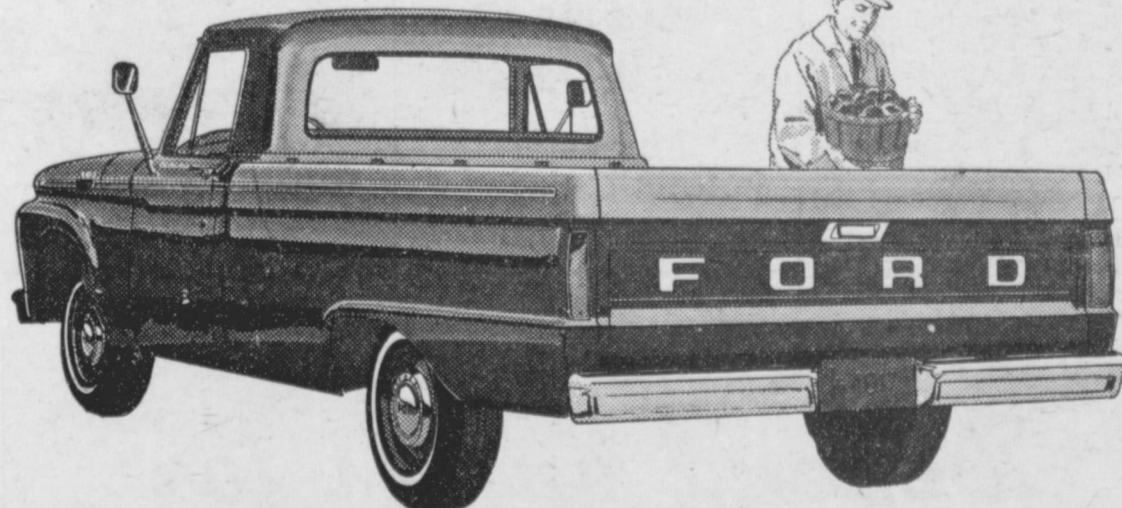
This code, the resolution said, "will stand as a monument to him for years to come."

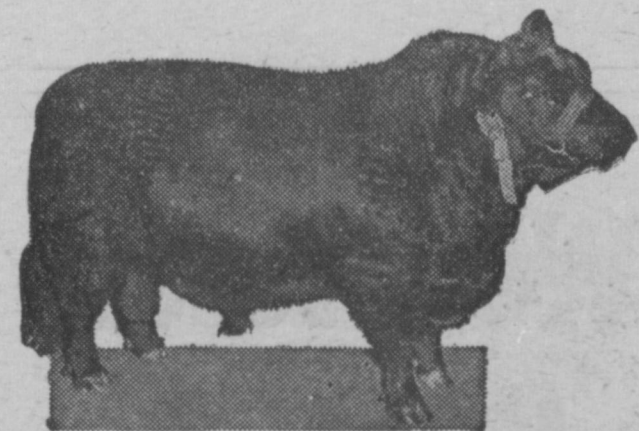
