





COUNTY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ARRANGE BALLOT FOR PRIMARY

Arrangements for the July primary were made and the ballot was drawn by Brown county democratic executive committee in meeting in the county court room Monday afternoon. About 20 members and the county chairman, Thomas H. Taylor, were present.

G. W. Duffee was elected chairman of the Weedon voting box and W. McHan was elected chairman of Jones Chapel box, filling two of the vacancies. All precinct names were selected as election judges. They may either serve or appoint some one in their place. The chairman also will appoint the election clerks in their respective precincts.

The committee decided that preliminary delegates to the county convention be held at the court house at 2 p. m. July 30 will be held by precinct conventions as the past. The precinct conventions will be held the afternoon of the first primary. The county convention vote is 50. Brown county returned to four votes in the State convention at Lubbock on September 13.

Ballot Committee. A ballot committee to certify the list before it goes to the printers was named. The committee consists of: T. H. Hart, U. Y. Smith, E. Stark, G. G. Gaines and C. V. Price.

Cost of the election and appropriate cost were determined and the chairman will notify the candidates the appropriate assessment. The committee discussed the action of the state executive committee in calling for a vote on prohibition in the primary by separate districts. The handling of separate districts would necessitate extra help in the polls in counting. The question was left to Chairman Taylor to investigate further and he will call a meeting later. Taylor told the committee that the courts may act on the question.

COUNCIL PASSES SUNDAY SHOW ORDINANCE ON FIRST READING; VARIOUS MATTERS ACTED UPON

Fireworks broke loose at city council meeting Tuesday night when the question of whether or not the city of Brownwood should have a paid or a volunteer fire department was again aired. The question was brought up by Alderman Edward Henley after the other three aldermen had passed on the first reading an ordinance prohibiting Sunday picture shows or other forms of entertainment. Petition asking the council to pass the Sunday show ordinance were received a few weeks ago. The question was referred to the ordinance committee, W. T. Hoekinson and Kay Roberts, and at the meeting Tuesday night the committee had the ordinance drawn and were ready for the vote. Henley said he did not know the ordinance was written or was to be brought up. Henley's vote was the only one against the ordinance.

Question of Paid Firemen After the show ordinance was passed on the first reading, Henley said he had something to bring up, but he did not have it fixed before hand so it would pass. He reminded the council it had passed a motion previously to try to effect a compromise to restore the volunteer fire department. He made a motion that the volunteers replace the paid department, thereby cutting off five paid men and salaries of some \$3,000 a year. The motion died for want of a second, but the discussion was hot.

City Tax Resolution One of the most important actions taken at the meeting was the passing of a resolution to amend the 1931 ordinance relative to city taxes. The amendment is to be worked out by Judge Lee and Mayor Butler and announced soon. It will offer an inducement to people to pay city taxes promptly. The council made it plain that the city will not remit penalty and interest on delinquent taxes this year as was done last year. Details of the plan are to be given out to the tax payers when it is properly worked out. The plan will graduate the interest on delinquent 1931 taxes to make it less on the man who pays after his taxes have been delinquent only a short length of time.

Picture Show Ordinance The picture show ordinance is a revised action taken by a former council that repealed the ordinance prohibiting Sunday shows and other entertainments. The ordinance which was passed to the first reading sets a penalty of not more than \$100 for violation of the ordinance. Religious entertainments are excepted under the ordinance. 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CANDIDATE IS SHOT BY SANTA ANNA LABORER

SANTA ANNA, Texas, June 20.—Lester G. Jones, 29, son of Mrs. J. S. Jones, was shot and possibly fatally injured here at 10 o'clock Sunday morning by J. J. Weldon, laborer. Mr. Jones, who is a candidate for the office of Justice of the Peace and is prominent in lodge circles, holding the office of financial secretary of the local camp, Woodmen of the World, was shot twice as he sat talking with Constable J. E. Brandon on the stairway leading to the second story of the Corner Drug building, on Santa Anna's main thoroughfare. According to eye witnesses, Jones' assailant walked coolly up to the foot of the stairs, pulled his automatic and began firing, two bullets taking effect before the wounded man was able to arise and begin his retreat up the stairway. Constable Brandon quickly seized the gun from the hand of Mr. Weldon after two shots had been fired and the weapon had snapped in an attempt at further firing. Rushed to Hospital The wounded man was rushed to the Sealy hospital, where an X-ray picture revealed that "two of the 38-calibre steel bullets had penetrated his body. One bullet entered at the point of the tenth rib on the right side, emerging a short distance back and was found lodged in the clothing. Another bullet entered the inter-costal space in line with the right armpit, penetrating the base of the right lung and tearing away the top of the liver and imbedding itself in the eleventh dorsal vertebra on the anterior surface, causing paralyzed condition of the diaphragm. J. J. Weldon, from whose hands the smoking automatic was taken, was taken in custody by Constable J. E. Brandon and City Marshal J. D. Whetstone and rushed to Coleman where he was placed in the county jail to await an examining trial, pending the outcome of the wounded man's condition.
