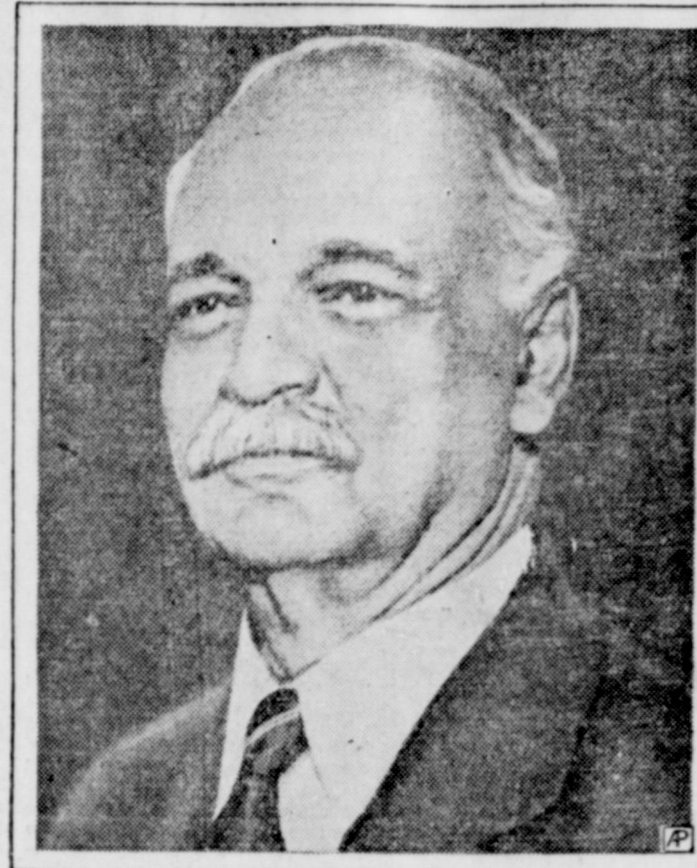

TWO MEN CHARGED IN SLAYING OF OFFICER, TWENTY QUESTIONED

DALLAS, Texas, June 16—Two men stood charged with murder today in connection with the slaying of a Dallas county deputy sheriff and appropriation made for its upkeep for a remainder of the fiscal year. Expenditure of \$1845 was ordered on a "Y" at the junction of highways 40 and 114 in Dallas county.

Maintenance of highway 1 from El Paso to White Spur received an appropriation of \$9,625. Appropriations were made to paint the Brazos river bridges east of Richmond and east of Columbia.

Appropriations were made for plans for an interoceanic canal.

Hardin was suffering from a pistol bullet wound when arrested. Officers believe he was injured in the gun battle with the dead deputy.

Sheriff Hal Hood said Jesse Warren, present at the time of the raid, recognized both men. He said James admitted being present at the time of the sun battle.

The sheriff said a woman well acquainted with members of the gang which attacked the sheriff was held for questioning. In all 22 persons have been held in jail in connection with the slaying.

BONUS BILL IS REPORTED UNFAVORABLY

WASHINGTON, June 16—A senate vote on the \$2,400,000,000 Patman bonus bill was prevented today when Senator Thomas, Dem., Okla., objected to a unanimous consent agreement for an immediate ballot. Previously the finance committee had reported the bill unfavorably and Chairman Smoot pressed for a vote.

The House passed the measure yesterday, and today hundreds of members of the bonus expeditionary force went to the Senate gallery to watch the fate of the measure.

Thomas asked for postponement of the vote until tomorrow, so he would have opportunity to study the bill.

Texas Democrats Urged To Support Shouse At Chicago

DALLAS, Texas, June 16—Members of Texas democratic delegation which will go to Chicago today received a letter from national committee man Jed Adams urging support of Jett Shouse for permanent chairman in the interests of Speaker John Garner.

"It will be of great injury not only to Mr. Garner, but to the democratic party to do Mr. Shouse the injustice of voting against him," wrote Adams.

"The friends of John Garner have not entered into a movement to slip any candidate, but they have entered into a movement, and that earnestly, to nominate John Garner, and this cannot be accomplished by giving to any other candidate and his partisans absolute control of the convention."

APPROPRIATIONS FOR HIGHWAY PROJECTS MADE BY COMMISSION

AUSTIN, June 16.—Appropriation of state funds for maintenance of roads near Amarillo was announced here today.

Expenditure of \$115,000 on highway 5 was authorized and \$75,000 on highway 32. Plans were ordered also for a Canadian river bridge on highway 5 to be built without county aid. The orders recite that the county has exhausted its road bond fund.

In Dallas county highway 15A has been taken over for maintenance and appropriation made for its upkeep for a remainder of the fiscal year. Expenditure of \$1845 was ordered on a "Y" at the junction of highways 40 and 114 in Dallas county.

Effective June 21, every bank check issued will carry a special two cent federal tax. This tax and many others recently voted by Congress will affect almost everybody in Brownwood, as well as in the state.

Local bankers say the tax on checks will put much additional work on them since the banks have to collect the tax and send the money to the government.

The two banks here clear about 4,000 checks daily, it is estimated. When the tax goes into effect, if the banks still clear that number of checks the government will receive \$80 per day in Brownwood alone.

Bankers believe the law will greatly reduce the number of checks written. People probably will not write small checks, but will carry the cash with them.

At the first of the month many people will write one check to cover all their current bills and will pay off in money instead of writing a separate check for every bill.

Stamps Not Found Success. The method of attaching stamps to the checks was not found successful when it was tried and so is not being used this time.

First returns due the government by the banks from these taxes is for the period from June 21 to June 30, inclusive. From then on it will be once a month.

Federal taxes on various things, it is estimated will cost every family about \$3 or more per month. Postage on letters will require 3 cent stamps instead of two.

Tax on automobile tires and tubes will run about \$1 per year to the average family, there will be an additional one cent tax per gallon on gasoline and oil will be taxed four cents a gallon.

The women may have to cut down on their use of cosmetics, or pay more for them, since perfumes, face powder, etc. will bear taxes.

Radio, electric refrigerators, electric lights, watches, candy and some types of soft drinks, telephones, telegrams and a number of other things will bear taxes.

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### GIVES RECIPES OF ESPECIAL INTEREST AT THIS SEASON

A great deal of the time of Miss Maggie Malone's home demonstration agent, is being taken up in answering telephone calls for instructions in how to can vegetables or fruits, or otherwise save these products.

When a Bulletin reporter entered the home demonstration office on Monday afternoon Miss Malone was just answering the twelfth request within the hour for canning information—which, you may figure, would mean being at the telephone constantly for that hour.

These calls are not confined to the members of Miss Malone's demonstration clubs throughout the county—though there are many calls from them—but numerous requests come from women in Brownwood. One day recently Miss Malone received about twenty requests from women in this city for information on how to take care of fruits or vegetables.

Miss Malone will be glad to continue to answer these questions, and invites any one wanting information on this subject to call her during her office hours, telephone No. 402. However, she believes that a number of recipes for pickles, preserves, etc., may be of great help to the women in this region, and in many instances do away with the necessity of their calling for further information. She has therefore given should clip these and save them for use in their work of preserving their fruits or vegetables.

**Olive Oil Pickles**  
1 gallon sliced cucumbers.  
1 quart onions (ground coarsely).  
1 tablespoon white mustard seed.  
1/2 cup salt.  
1 tablespoon white pepper.  
1 1/2 cups olive oil or 1/2 cup salad oil and 2-3 cup of olive oil.  
Slice unpeeled cucumbers very thin. Add salt, mix thoroughly and allow to stand over night. Press juice out of the sliced cucumbers thoroughly. To the quart of ground onions add white pepper, mustard seed and olive oil (or half olive oil and half salad oil).  
Let this mixture stand for 1 hour, then add it to the sliced cucumbers mixing all together. Pour enough apple cider vinegar to cover. Dilute vinegar with water to proportions of 1 part vinegar to three parts water. Pack pickles solid into sterilized jars (pints) or 1/2 pint glass top jars and seal. Let stand ten days before using.

**Bread and Butter Pickles**  
25 large cucumbers.  
12 onions (white medium).  
1/2 cup salt.  
1 pint vinegar.  
2 cups sugar.  
2 tablespoons mustard seed (white).  
2 tablespoons ginger.  
2 tablespoons turmeric powder.  
Let unpeeled cucumbers stand in water over night. Then slice cucumbers and onions and place in pan with salt and water. Let stand one hour, then rinse off salt, add vinegar, mustard seed, ginger and turmeric powder.  
Boil all ingredients until peel turns yellow (about 40 minutes.) Pack pickles solid in sterilized jars and allow to stand ten days before using.  
Use small glass jars for the pickles. Glass tops.

**Cucumber Pickles or Gherkins**  
Small cucumbers or gherkins (1 cut the larger ones if used). Brine: 1/2 cup salt to 1 gallon of boiling water.  
Pickle dressing:  
1 gallon pure apple vinegar—two cups sugar.  
2 teaspoonfuls each of cinnamon, whole cloves and allspices.  
Use small cucumbers or gherkins, pour boiling brine over them and let stand 24 hours. Drain and repeat twice more with fresh boiling brine. The fourth morning cover with fresh boiling water and let stand till next morning. Have the pickle dressing boiling and the spices bagged in cheese cloth, loosely tied.  
Place pickles in dressing and allow to stand until next morning, the sixth morning.  
Use an enameled lined kettle or earthen jar for this process. Next morning reboil the vinegar and pack pickles solid in jars which have been sterilized. Pour boiling pickle dressing over them and seal. Best to use small jars, 1 quart largest you should use.

**Beet Pickles**  
Use young tender beets free from cracks and peel trim all defects. They should be uniform in size, 1 1/4 to 1 1/2 inches in diameter, and good color. The Crosby Egyptian or Detroit Red (dark red) are good varieties for canning and pickling.  
Cut tops off, leaving 2 inches and all roots on until after cooking; steam under pressure 15 pounds for 15 to 20 minutes. Peel, trim and drop whole beets into spiced vinegar which has been previously prepared and hot.  
**Spiced Vinegar**  
1 gallon of 4 per cent vinegar.  
5 cups sugar.  
5 teaspoonfuls of mixed spices.  
The spices up in bag. Mix sugar, vinegar and spices. Let simmer about half an hour for the spices to infuse. Drop hot beets in and let boil 3 minutes. Remove the spice bag, pack jars with beets and cover with the hot vinegar. Seal at once and place where they will cool quickly.

**Cold Saccharine Pickles**  
Freshly gathered cucumbers (fresh and crisp).  
1 quart of vinegar to 1 pint water.  
1/2 teaspoon saccharine.  
1/2 teaspoon salt.  
15 cents worth of oil of cinnamon.  
15 cents worth of oil of cloves.  
Mix and stir all together cold. The cucumbers are washed and packed in a crock or earthen ware jar covered and sealed. Pieces of cauliflower whole peppers, mangos and cabbage hearts may be added.  
**Squash Preserves**  
Take young tender white squash,

peel and cut out seeds, then slice thin or cut in cubes.  
To about 2 cups or a double handful of squash allow one cup of sugar. Pour sugar over squash and let stand all night. Next morning boil without adding any water, but during the cooking add one small can pineapple either grated or the sliced cut in cubes (the latter looks more like the squash) and to about 4 quarts of fruit add the juice of 1/2 lemon.

**Berry Preserves**  
Blackberries, dewberries or strawberries.  
2 cups of berry pulp (run through a colander).  
3 cups of sugar (heated very hot but not melted).  
Mix at once with the berry pulp and seal with paraffin.  
Keep well and is very good.

### 2 ARE INJURED WHEN CAR HITS BRIDGE RAILING

W. A. Beck and J. O. Davenport, employees of the Portland Cement Company at San Antonio, suffered severe injuries shortly before 12:00 o'clock Monday night when the heavy automobile they were driving ran into the concrete railing of a bridge south of Dulin, seven miles south of Brownwood. Both are receiving treatment in Bellevue Hospital.

Beck and Davenport were driving toward Brownwood on the old Brady road. They met a truck at the bridge, were blinded by the light and pulled over too near the railing, striking it with terrific force, they say. The truck did not stop, but another car stopped soon and helped them, telephoning to Brownwood from a nearby house for a doctor and ambulance, the state.

The injured men were taken to the hospital by the doctor and a McInnis Funeral Home ambulance. Today they were reported resting fairly well, but doctors said the injuries were severe.

Each man suffered the fracture of the kneecap on his right leg. Doctors and nurses said it was the first time in their experience that two men in the same wreck received so nearly the same injury. Beck's kneecap was crushed and he suffered a deep cut on his forehead. Davenport's kneecap was fractured and cut in such a way that part of the bone was protruding when he was picked up. He also suffered several fractured ribs.

The heavy automobile which the men were driving was practically demolished.

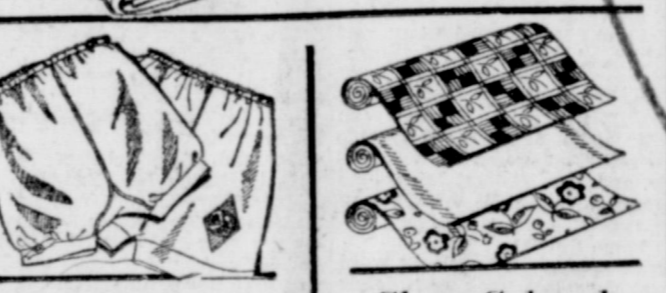

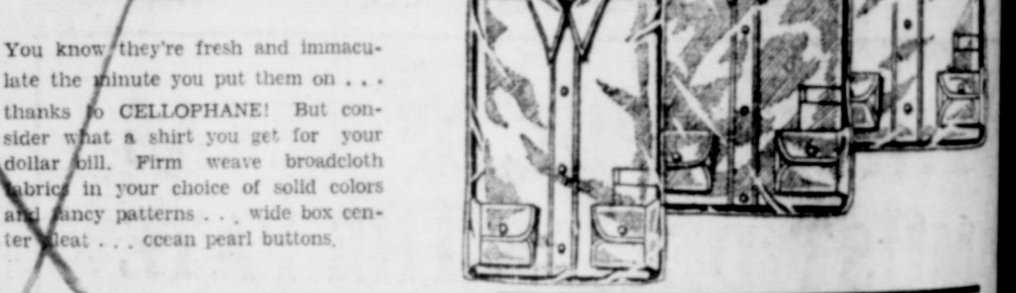
