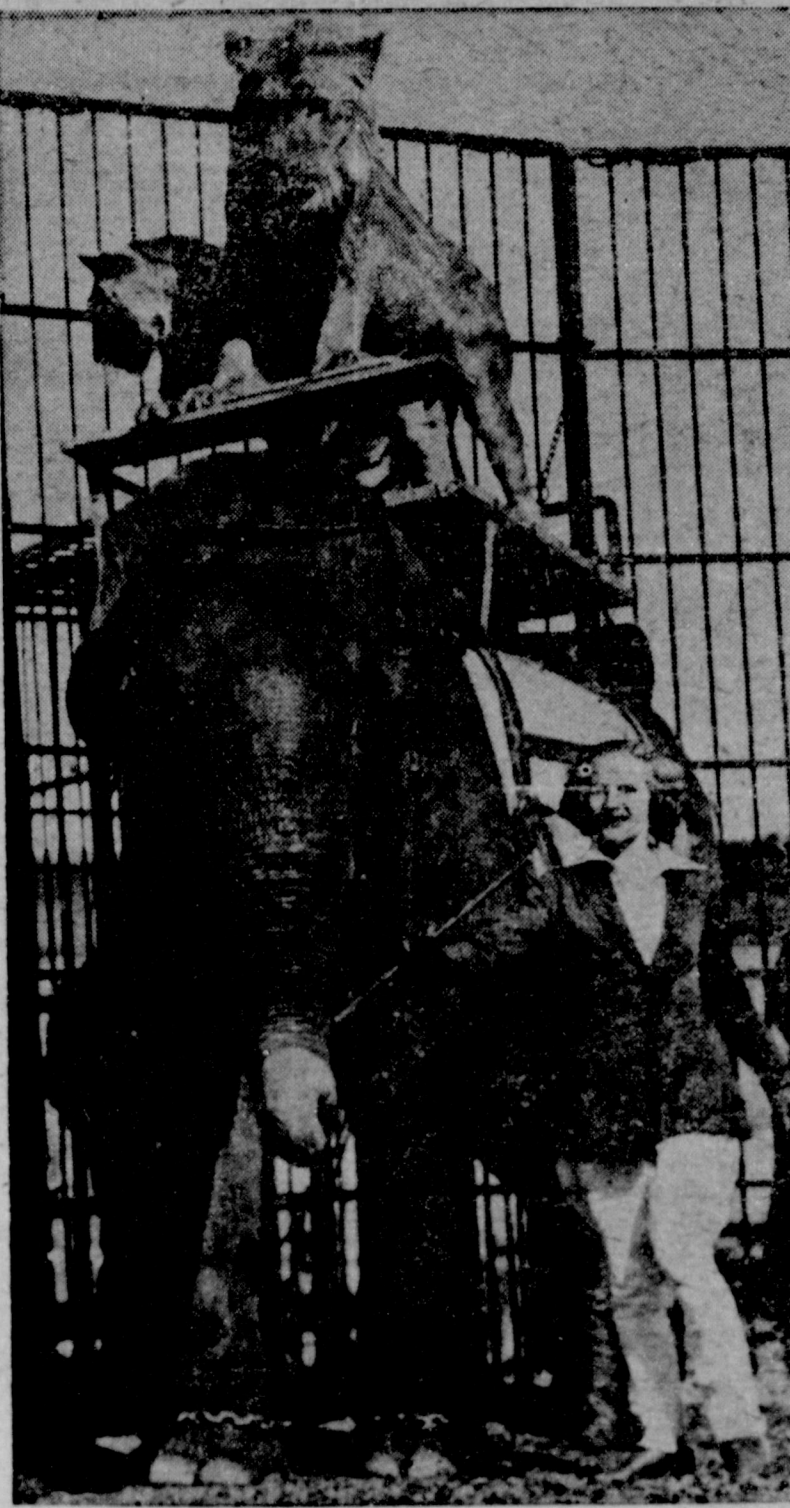
**Cpl. Spaeth Writes Of Experience In Belgium**

One day a truck with 7 Yanks, including Cpl. Spaeth lost from their company, wandered around and finally came to a town, where the natives stopped them and welcomed them. Cpl. Spaeth inquired if any of the group could speak German. They could, and warned the soldiers that German tanks were coming that way and they should remain for the time being in their homes. They gave them their beds, supper and breakfast, and even stood guard while they slept. Moving on the next day, the seven Yanks captured 45 German prisoners.

The last message from Cpl. Spaeth advised that he had set foot on German soil.

ly establishes immunity although second attacks sometimes occur.

A virus is responsible for the infection, the characteristic symptom of which is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive, nervous, circulatory and genito-urinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more often than not is mild.

"The patient suffering with this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exists, and the family physician should be called promptly. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer advises, "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is indicated. The doctor's orders should be followed strictly. Violating his instructions can lead to serious injury which may permanently affect the individual."

But he made no mention that the greater part of poll tax receipts go to the schools, hence that the negroes in failing to pay poll tax are failing in their share of school support.

Austin, Texas.— With the opening of the school term an increase in the incidence of mumps is to be expected. This is due in part to the fact that mumps is essentially a childhood disease and the contagious factor exists before the symptoms appear.

Mumps is transmitted by direct contact with an infected person and with articles freshly soiled by the secretions or discharges from the mouth or nose of persons having the disease. It takes from 12 to 20 days for mumps to manifest itself after the infection takes place. The disease can be easily transmitted, but one attack usual-
