

Civic pride at Muenster received a bit of a jolt this week in the disclosure that voluntary donations are failing to do the job on our hospital project, and it becomes advisable now to take on a tax program to assure that our debt will be paid.

When the project originated we were enthusiastic, proudly recalling that the community has come through in other endeavors, and confidently predicting that it would do as well this time. But our record of performance did not hold up. There was too much of a "Let George do it" attitude. Too many gave just a little. To many gave nothing. As a result the debt retirement program is hurting and a more positive method seems nec-

From a practical stand point, however, all that is really hurt is our pride. There are compensating factors which go far in overcoming our natural dislike for a tax

First consideration is the fact that the arrangement we are anticipating now is much more satisfactory than the one we evaded a few years ago. Remember the deal then? It was to establish a county hospital, and all the county, including this area, was to be taxed for it's support. But no hospital was to be located here.

The outcome was close. So close that we can assume it would have gone the other way if Muenster's plans had not been in the making. Except for that we'd be paying a tax today but would not have our local hospital. Well, as it appears now, we still face a tax — to that extent we're breaking even — but it will support the hospital here, not

The Status of Forces Treaty is back in the headlines. The bare outline of the story is approached, in Turkey, by a "lady in distress" who represented herself in urgent need of \$500 in U.S. currency, offerthe black-market rate 14 to 1 The "lady" proved to be a police "stoolie" and the next day two of the four GIs were armanded. When they declined, their wrists were tied, they were swung off the floor by the wrists, and flogged with leather straps until they decided to confess. Meantime, the other two GIs had been pickarea were the next improve- ed up and also confessed. Each was sentenced to seven months

One of the men, Corporal with Commissioner John B. rights supposedly guaranteed by Turkish law, and all guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution. After five years, during which the Corporal, his wife and five children were forbidden to leave the country, the higher court dismissed three of four counts against the Corporal. The lower court promptly sentenced him to seven months in jail and a fine of \$17,000 on the remaining count. Of course, the Corporal didn't have \$17,000. The alternative was an additional three years in jail.

Some American newspapermen, and his home-town friends, came to McCuistion's rescue with the funds for the

Corporal McCuistion was the victim of the Status of Forces agreement, by terms of which an American soldier overseas, who commits a crime off duty, may be arrested, tried, sentenced, and punished under the laws of a foreign nation. No recourse to American military authorities, or courts, is provided. And, of course, American diplomatic personnel who negotiated the treaty agreement are specifically exempted from

its terms. Couldn't Congress have another look at our GI's "civil rights?"
