The AFL-CIO state convention held in Brownsville this week pledged its support to Lyndon Johnson in the coming presidential campaign. The report fits with that from labor leaders in other parts of the country, indicating that they are counting on him to strengthen their control over rank and file workers, which means, principally, the repeal of Right to Work laws in some 20 states. At the same time it is in-

teresting to note that proposals have been sent to the Democratic platform committee supporting both sides of the Right to Work issue. George Meany, national AFL-CIO president, asks for elimination of Right to Work. C. D. Cadwallader, a railroad conductor, asks that the platform favor its retention.
