A well servicing job on the city's No. 4 water well, on South Maple, is intended to increase production there to a level that will be adequate for the summer's heavy demand. Water Superintendent Steve Moster said its output was down to about 80 gallons a minute.

A perforating job at a lower sand level will bring an added Rohmer of Fort Worth. supply of water, possibly increasing the well's capacity to 150 gallons a minute.

At this time the city has no water problems. The three wells can furnish much more than is needed. But all wells have to be in good condition to furnish all that's needed through the hot months.

> But there are at least two other points worth examining: the rail union officials, first of all, clearly want to have their cake and eat too. They have for years mounted increasing pressure on the railroads for higher and higher wages for railroad workers. Yet when the railroads - struggling for existence in the fiercely competitive transportation arena seek to pay for these hikes by improving efficiency and eliminating unnecessary jobs, the answer of these labor "leaders" is outright opposition and a demand for nationalization.

Even more important, however, is a quick look at the contrasting pictures today of privately-operated railroads in the United States and government-operated railroads in Europe. For every dollar European governments take in on their rail lines, they pay out \$1.20. The general taxpayer (who else?) comes up with that 20 cents on every dollar.

In this country, our railroads not only pay for all their own expenses out of their own revenues but also turn more than five percent of what they take in back to Government in property and income taxes-about \$500 million a year. Nationalize these lines, and Government not only loses this tidy sum but is also socked for likely future operating deficits, and for the mere \$26 billion it would cost Uncle Sam to buy up privatelyowned rail properties!

US taxpayers - railroad workers among them - may take comfort in the 9-to-1 margin by which a recent nationwide opinion poll rejected any such senseless waste of tax dollars. Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield (D. Mont.) was quoted as viewing the railroad nationalization proposal as "unwise and uncalled

Of course, sugar also is an important part of the diet. But is can be controlled. out the day is hard on teeth. Eat your candy all at once, then brush your teeth.

Many children, perhaps mostof them, lose a tooth or two through an accident with a baseball bat, a fall or other playground scramble. Even if it's a baby tooth that will eventually come out anyway, prompt professional care is important. First, wrap the tooth in a wet towel or place it in water. Don't clean the tooth; you may remove vital tissue. Take the child and the tooth to a dentist as quickly as possible. There's a good chance that the dentist wil be able to replace the tooth
