

An after election development that seems to be in very poor taste is the current attempt by liberals of the Republican party to boot out the conservatives and reinstate SH Homecoming themselves as the leaders of the organization. The plot seems both unethical and shabby.

GOP is a party with its founprecinct and county levels. Its membership is composed of people who are dedicated to definite principles which do not harmonize with the liberal faction any more than they do with the opposite party. To take over such an organization and change it to accommodate the personal ambitions of self appointed new leaders -or old leaders who had been previously repudiated at the grass roots — is obviously wrong.

This is not to say that no change whatever should be made, but rather that this method of change is all wrong. Rank and file members, not a group of power manipulators at the top, should make the decisions. Grass roots folks have a right to pick both their

policy and their leadership. The shabby side of it is the attempt to take charge after failing to give the party any Dallas Christian help in the past campaign. They disowned it then, plainly revealing their intent to ruin if they could not rule. Now they deserve to be disowned by those they double crossed.

But that's only a minor issue in the controversy. The important thing is to retain the organization which represents the principles of the 38 per cent who voted on the attempted a screen pass.
