### Develop Area as PopulationGrows, Cobb Talk Urges

Members of the Cooke County Electric Cooperative at their annual general meeting Monday night were urged to work together in developing a community that is able to absorb its increasing population. Their speaker was J. R. Cobb, general manager of Texas Eelc-

tric Cooperatives Inc. He recommended that rural people look farther than their farms and help provide industry to keep their young people at home. "Bring the obs to them instead of sending them to the jobs."

He also pointed out that development of water resources is vital to the future of the area, a project that should be tackled jointly by rural and city people. Farmers who want to help develop their community should see that there is plenty of water to meet industrial and residential de-

mands. Cobb likewise reminded the group that oil field business, now 78 per cent of the electric co-op's revenue, is due to shrink as production decreases, so new business has to be created if present volume is

maintained. Manager Mike Sloan spoke to members on the past year's usiness and called attention to the financial report previously sent out. Total income for 1964 was \$1,388,111 and expense was \$1,079,431, for a net income of \$308,680. Net for the previous year was

\$284,124. Equally favorable figures are shown on the co-op balance sheet. Total assets of the system are \$3,404,894 and total liabilities are \$676,341. Payments in interest and principle to REA for the year were
