A few such pictures from Peru tell the story of what is being done for unfortunate undernourished youngsters in many parts of the earth. Less than a year ago the children on those pictures were getting no protein in their diet. A basic essential of food was missing and they were slowly wasting away.

Then the Religious Overseas Aid Program reached those people. Just a little protein was added to their daily diet, and they began improving immediatly.

Reports tell us that the conditions mentioned above apply to some extent to more than half the people of the world. Poverty or ignorance, or both, are responsible, and a tremendous job faces the relief agencies that are trying to help. Even when they spread their good work as thin as possible they find that they do not have enough. The enormous need will probably never be matched by available help.

Nevertheless we can get deep satisfaction from the thought that the good work is reaching farther every year. And we can get added satisfaction from the thought that

Tuberculin Tests Are Available to School Children

An opportunity to be tested for tuberculosis is offered this year to all students of both Muenster schools. The only condition is consent of the

The tuberculin test recommended by the National Tu-

berculosis Association will be given here on March 31. It will start in the public school at 8:30 a.m. and when finished there will be given at the parochial school. Mrs. Mary Hardy of Gainesville will direct the program and Doctors Hejduk and Kralicke are asked to help.

Explanatory letters with leaflets and forms for parent signatures were sent home with school children Monday.

The leaflet explains that a nurse or doctor puts a drop of harmless tuberculin liquid into the skin. This feels about like a pin prick.

On April 5 the children who received the tuderculin will be examined for reactions. If it is positive the child will be referred to his or her family doctor for furthur examination, probably including a chest X-ray. If the reaction is negative nothing more will be

The leaflet furthur explains that tuberculin is only a test, not a vaccine. And it is not harmful and does not cause a
