The topic claiming top interest in the community nowadays, and apparently destined for increasing discussion during coming weeks, is the proposal to create Muenster Hospital District.

Opposing it is the customary reluctance of people to vote a tax on themselves, an understandable objection that probably extends as far back as the first tax in recorded history.

Favoring it is a set of circumstances which, in the opinion of many, outweigh the objection. First and foremost of those is the fact that the desired goal does not seem attainable without at least a partial lift from a tax.

We would like to see our hospital earn enough on its operation to meet its debt retirement schedule along with current expenses, but the history of other hospitals offers little encouragement of that kind. As things are going now there is strong reason to believe that our hospital will be able to pay its way in current operation but will need help to keep up with its bonded obligations.

When we originated the project we had high hopes of raising enough money by donations to pay for the building and equipment by the time it was finished. That was a two way miscalculation, however. Costs were higher than expected and contributions were lower. To finish the job it became necessary to assume a debt. Even then we had hopes of paying the debt by donations, but again voluntary response was not adequate. Too many gave just a little, too many gave nothing. Experience has shown that the community needs a more dependable way of raising money.

As we review those financial disappointments, however, we should recall another very important fact in the county's recent history. An attempt was made to establish a county hospital to be supported by a county wide tax. If it had passed Muenster people would be paying a hospital tax today but would not have their own hospital. As most of us recall, the outcome of that election was very close, so close in fact that we can be reasonably certain it would have passed if Muenster's hospital plans had not been in the making.

In fairness, the people who oppose present efforts to create a hospital district should keep that very pertinent fact in mind. Instead of jeering at the failure of previous financing efforts, they should give the local hospital credit for saving them a few years of tax. And they should also appreciate that the tax now being considered is for their local hospital, not one in another city. As it turns out now the local effort was not a big mistake, as they try to make it appear, but a fortunate development for all the community, including themselves.

That bit of history also suggests another good reason for forming a local hospital district. Remembering that the other election was too close for comfort, we prefer not to be included in another effort in behalf of a tax supported county hospital. We have assurance at this time that no such program is being considered, but we don't know what the future will bring. Prudence prompts us to see that it will not happen. By setting up our own district we accomplish the double purpose of assuring our own hospital's financial stability while avoiding future tax payment to another hospital's support.

And now, let's consider the actual amount of a person's tax in the proposed hospital district. Anyone can easily figure it for himself by looking at the valuation on his county tax statement — the proposed rate is 30 cents per hundred. In the case of almost any person it's a trifle compared with the amount he pays for income tax or normal spending for cigarettes or alcoholic drinks.

Furthermore, it is money well spent. It's a tremendous bargain for the wonderful combination of benefits we enjoy in having our own hospital. Ask the person who has been a patient, or who has experienced the convenience and economy of visiting sick people here at home.

## Service and Reception Observes Golden Wedding of Matt Mullers

Fifty years ago Miss Angeline Herr became the bride of Matt Muller. Memories of that day and a half century of married life were recalled Saturday when the couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Festivities marking the golden milestone included an anniversary Mass in Sacred Heart Church at 4 p.m. and a reception afterward in the Parish Hall with a 6 o'clock banquet buffet, and dancing to end the happy occasion. The observance was similar to that on their wedding day on Jan. 12, 1915.

Among the 250 guests were the golden-weds' eight children and their families including 25 of the 27 grandchildren and the six great-grandchildren.

Only ones missing were a grandson in the seminary in Missouri and a grandson in the Navy in California. Other relatives from far and near joined in the celebration.

**Renew Wedding Vows**  
Father Alcuin Kubis officiated at the Mass and directed renewal of wedding vows pledged 50 years earlier. On that day the couple drove to town to church in a 1912 Ford, one of the few cars in the area at the time. The bride wore a floor length white satin gown with a wreath and full length veil.

For the anniversary the 50-year bride wore a navy blue jacket dress and a winter white hat and a yellow-throated white orchid corsage. Their attendants were Theo

Miller who was best man for his brother in 1915, and Mrs. Joe Schnitker of Denison, the former Miss Bertha Herr, replacing her sister Miss Rose Herr who later married Theo Miller and is now deceased.

Frank E. Martin, 80, of Lindsay and a former Muenster resident, died at 2:30 a.m. Wednesday in a Gainesville rest home after a five-month illness. He was a retired farmer.

Funeral service for him with requiem mass will be held Friday at 9 a.m. in St. Peter's Church at Lindsay and burial will be in Lindsay Cemetery. Father John Walbe will be officiating minister and George J. Carrol & Son Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements.

Rosary service will be held at the Carroll Chapel Thursday at 7:30 and again at 8 p.m. Mr. Martin was born in Germany Feb. 18, 1884, and was two years old when his parents brought him to the United States. They settled in Mexia, Texas. He later lived in Valley View, Lindsay, and Muenster and returned to Lindsay after retiring from farm work.

He married Miss Rose Walter on Feb. 13, 1912, in Gainesville. She died Aug. 13, 1928.

## Muenster District Scholastic Count Starts Next Week

The annual scholastic census of the Muenster School District will begin next week, after mid term exams are finished, Superintendent L. B. Bruns announced Tuesday.

The method of taking the census will be the same as usual. Blanks will be sent home with all school children and parents are urged to fill them out and return them promptly so that the job of listing and checking can start soon. In preparing his list Superintendent Bruns checks against last year's census and this year's class rolls to make sure that no students are overlooked.

New pupils, those who will be 6 years old by September 1, fall into two groups in the count. Those with brothers or sisters now in school are not likely to be missed because family contact with the school is established. Those who have no family contact with the school can be overlooked. Parents of those children are asked to contact the school and make sure they will be counted.

## TP&L Announces 3% Reduction of Rate in Muenster

Fred Lynn, manager of Texas Power & Light Company, filed with the Muenster City Council Monday night revised rate schedules which will reduce electric rates in Muenster by an average of approximately 3 per cent.

The revised rate schedules affect most residential and commercial customers and will be effective with all bills delivered in February.

The rate reduction will be the second for Texas Power & Light Company in the past 17 months. Revised schedules reducing rates on the average of 2½ percent were put in effect in September, 1963.

Concerning the rate reduction, the manager said that Company-wide it will amount to approximately \$3 million a year.

He added that about \$1.2 million of the annual reduction was made possible by continuing general improvements in operating efficiency and by an increase in the average use of service. The additional \$1.8 million was made possible by the recent reduction in federal income taxes.

## Bigger Pump for Fire Truck Okay'd by City Council

More pumping capacity for the city's rural fire truck and also a better unit for the city's various pumping jobs resulted from a decision of the city council Monday night.

A water pump with 18 HP engine will be bought to replace the fire truck's smaller unit with 8 HP engine. And the smaller pump and engine will replace an old worn out unit of still smaller size. Net result is a new and more powerful unit for fire fighting, also a good unit for the city's pumping jobs.

Principal uses for that pump will be cleaning the swimming pool and also disposing of accumulated water when repairs are needed on the water lines.

## Next Monday Is Election Date for City Annexation

An election to decide whether the city of Muenster will annex an area of more than 50 blocks will be held next Monday, Jan. 11, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the city hall.

The strip of land extends the full length of the east city boundary, which measures one mile, and also takes up space between the city and the railroad right of way south of town.

The proposed addition includes an area that awaits development into a residential building addition after sewer and water services become available — and installation of the services depends on whether the area becomes a part of the city.

Qualified voters living in the area proposed for annexation will be permitted to vote in the election. If they approve the addition can be completed by action of the city council.

## Bank Gains in Deposits, Loans During Past Year

Muenster State Bank showed gains in both deposits and loans for the past year, joining the three other banks of the county in the prosperous trend.

The gains are shown on a statement of condition as of December 31, in response to a call Wednesday by the state banking commissioner.

Deposits ending the last day of 1964 were \$3,877,780.25 a gain of \$152,339.59. Loans ending the same day were \$2,051,004, a gain of \$357,982.

Total deposits in the four county banks were \$24,691,447, a gain of \$1,370,934 for the year. Loans in the four banks were \$11,332,814, a gain of \$1,030,447.

## C. W. Wilson, 83, Muenster's Oldest Native Son, Dies

Clarence W. Wilson, 83, Muenster's oldest native son, died suddenly of a heart attack in his home at 8:45 a.m. last Thursday. He had been in poor health for several months and was recovering from two weeks of pneumonia when the fatal attack came.

Mr. Wilson was born here on Dec. 26, 1881, eight years before the community of Muenster was founded, and spent all of his life here. He was a son of O. Wilson, who moved to a farm 5 miles northeast of town in 1880. He was born on that farm and attended the Hays school in the same neighborhood.

He was married to Velma Curtis of Gainesville on Nov. 23, 1904. From then until 1920 he farmed northwest of Muenster. For the next 31 years he lived in town and worked as a carpenter. He retired on Jan. 1, 1952.

Funeral services for Mr. Wilson were held in the Scott Funeral Home Chapel, Saint Jo, at 2 o'clock Saturday, with Rev. W. O. Craig of Nocona and J. H. Ghism of Gainesville officiating. Burial was in Mountain Park Cemetery under direction of Scott Funeral Home. Bearers were John Kleiss, Gettes McCool, Al Walterscheid, Victor Hartman, Claude Ayres and P. C. Zipper.

Survivors are his wife and three sisters: Mrs. George Johnston of Albuquerque, N. M., Mrs. E. J. Womack of Floydada and Mrs. Lloyd Sparkman of Gainesville.

#### WHAT MEDICARE WOULD NOT DO

One wonders how many people—and especially those in the 65-and-over age group—actually know what Medicare would and would not do.

It seems apparent that the number is comparatively small—and that most people, if Medicare is ever adopted, will be depressingly surprised at its limitations.

As U. S. News and World Report points out, "Even the name is a misnomer. . . . The very term Medicare is raising expectations that will not be met in the opening plan."

Medicare does not—repeat not—cover physician's bills or dentist's bills. It does not pay for needed drugs except when given in a hospital or a nursing home. And, of course, it would do nothing for those under 65, except tax them heavily to pay for it.

Medicare is essentially a hospitalization plan. And even in that it is severely restricted. It would pay the whole bill for only 45 days. The maximum hospital stay for which it would provide benefits would be 180 days and then the patient would have to pay part of the bill.

Ironically, despite all the vastly exaggerated claims made by some Medicare advocates, the existing Kerr-Mills law, which provides aid to the needy under a federal-state arrangement, is more liberal and inclusive. So are various local welfare plans, public and private. And the medical profession has pledged itself to serve any who need attention, regardless of ability to pay.

The last Congress found Medicare wanting and refused to approve it.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO APPLY FOR AN ACT CREATING MUENSTER HOSPITAL DISTRICT OF COOKE COUNTY, TEXAS TO THE RESIDENTS OF COOKE COUNTY, TEXAS AND ANY OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES: PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that after due publication hereof, the undersigned intend to apply to the Texas Legislature at its regular session in 1965 for the passage of an Act creating Muenster Hospital District of Cooke County under the authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution, the general purposes and nature of such Act being expressed as follows:

AN ACT providing for the creation of MUENSTER HOSPITAL DISTRICT OF COOKE COUNTY, Texas, pursuant to authority granted by Section 9 of Article IX of the Texas Constitution; describing boundaries of said District; providing for elections on the questions of the creation of such District and the levy of a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation for its maintenance and support and the payment of bonds issued by it; providing the County tax assessor and collector shall assess and collect taxes for the District on the County tax roll providing the District with power to issue bonds and methods for authorizing same for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same for hospital purposes, and for any and all such purposes, and for the refunding of such bonds; providing that bonds issued by the District shall be lawful investments and security for certain funds; providing a temporary and permanent governing body for such District, its powers, duties, responsibilities in connection with the operation of the District and its facilities, and the tenure of its members, recognizing that no city nor the County has or maintains hospital facilities and that a hospital authority created under the provisions of Article 4437a has been created and providing for the acquisition of properties of the authority by the District; withdrawing authority for the issuance of bonds or other indebtedness or the levy of taxes for hospital purposes or for medical treatment of indigent persons within the District by any other municipality or political subdivision of the State; providing the District shall have power of eminent domain; enacting other provisions incident and germane to the subject and purpose of this Act; providing a severance clause; making certain findings in connection with the publication of notice of intention to apply for the passage of this Act; and declaring an emergency.
