

At present, cutting of major airframe parts for the prototype Concorde is well under way.

Pictured above are eight aeronautical technicians meticulously tracing the delta-shape wing at Sud Aviation's plant at Blag-nac near Toulouse in southern France. The overall wingspan of the Concorde will be 83 feet 10 inches, the aircraft's length will be over 184 feet, and the total weight, 326,000 pounds. The first flight of the Con-

Test programs ve also been launched for the Concorde's electric and hydraulic systems, and in 1966, static ground testing of the jetliner will begin in southern France.

When introduced into passenger service in 1971, Air France's Concorde jetliners will accom-modate 118 passengers and fly between the U.S. and France at almost 25 miles a minute at a maximum altitude of 63,000 feet.


