"THE FIGHT AGAINST EROSION"

Major worry of U. S. farm experts is erosion resulting from bad land use. The U. S. Soil Conservation Service reports, according to this map from March of Time's "Post-War Farms", one hundred million acres of land either completely eroded, or damaged — two hundred million more threatened with erosion. A major cause of this erosion is one-crop farming. Meeting the threat of this menace which has impoverished some one-third of the nation's farmers, Georgia's textile tycoon, Cason Callaway, deliberately choosing poor land, has successfully fought erosion by soil-enriching crops, such as the scuppernong grape, the blueberry and the Kudzu vine, whose roots flourish in the stubbornest terrain.

May Send Bond Certificates By V-Mail Overseas

War Finance Committee Provides Method For Gifts To Fighting Men

Cooke county's War Finance committee, intent upon reaching the Sixth War Loan Campaign goal as soon as possible came forward with a new stimulus for bond sales Monday.

The committee has distributed to all issuing agencies in the county Christmas bond certificates which may be sent by V-Mail to service men and women

Reproduced on a letterhead is a war bond with space for the name and address of the one in service.. It is headed "Christmas Bond Certificate" and below is the notation, "A real bond inscribed as above is waiting for you." There is also the word "Greetings" and space for a brief message from the sender.

E bond sales in Muenster totaled one fifth of the quota for this series Wednesday. The goal is \$50,000. Slightly more than \$18. 000 of the community's \$75,000 quota in this drive was accounted for this week.

Leaders of the campaign stress nig part in AAA programs will the purchase of E bonds, pointing out that it is the ideal investment for the individual. Sixty days after purchase the money invested this security is as available as a bank balance. In case of an emergency or unexpected misfortune these bonds can be cashed at the bank immediately upon presentation.



Either you can buy this oil in the form of a good furniture polish or you can make a very good and inexpensive polish yourself. It's quite easy.

Simply mix one part turpentine with two parts of boiled linseed oil. - you should use this oil polish at least twice a year on varnished or oiled furniture, the agent advises. The turpentine will help remove the dirt which collects on furniture. The oil soaks into condition.
