As the bill is proceeding now, prospects are fine that people of this area will have an opportunity to vote on assuming a tax for the purpose of retiring bonded

This fact applies especially in cases of serious illness when family members stand by for weeks taking turns at giving round-the-clock attention. That gets to be an important item. Imagine the extra time and mileage involved if all visitors and special attendants, several every day, had to go to distant hospitals. People who have visited both here and away from here appreciate the difference.

Hospital District Bill Amended at Senate Hearing

The bill to create Muenster Hospital District moved a step nearer to legislative approval last Monday night in a special room. hearing before the Counties Committee of the State Senindebtedness and caring for

As presented to the committee by Senator Ralph Hall, the bill is slightly different from that previously passed by the House of Representatives and represents a compromise worked out by Hall between supporters and opponents of the bill.

This one authorizes the district to levy a tax for the purpose of retiring bonded indebtedness and to care for indigents of the district, as required by the Hill Burton act. The orginal bill authorized sufficient additional tax to make up possible deficits in the hospital's operation.

The difference is that under the amended bill the hospital can not ask for tax help in its regular operation. Debt and care of indigents are the only tax supported expenses. If money should be needed otherwise it will have to be \$1.25 per person. raised by other methods.

The bill may also have a provision whereby other areas can join the district in the future by a vote of people in the area concerned. The provision was offered as a late amendment and Senator Hall said it has a fair chance of being included.
