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Hospital District Bill Amended at Senate Hearing

A gratifying sign for the future of Muenster Memorial Hospital was apparent Monday night in the Senate committee hearing in Austin on creation of the Muenster Hospital District. As the bill is proceeding now, prospects are fine that people of this area will have an opportunity to vote on assuming a tax for the purpose of retiring bonded indebtedness and caring for indigents of the district.

Even more important is the fact that much of the ill which has developed over the hospital issue seems to have been removed. Senator Ralph Hall did a swell job of reconciling opposing views and promoting a willingness to work together for the good of all. Hereafter we can expect more harmony in community effort for this project. We have a fine opportunity to redeem an old time community reputation of working together and getting things done.

In the spirit of restored understanding let's admit that there have been faults on both sides of our issue and drop the matter there without any more pointing of fingers. Let's take on the project as it stands today, realizing that a wonderful achievement is seventy per cent finished and we have the choice of giving up all that or getting a million dollar value by taking on the thirty per cent of remaining obligation.

That's measuring our project in terms of money, and it leaves no doubt that a real bargain awaits us. But there are other standards of measuring which can not and should not be overlooked. Convenience, time saving, the satisfaction of receiving medical or hospital attention at home are all intangibles that have a great bearing on our lives along with a definite money value.

Many, many things have to be figured in when we think of our hospital's real value. Those who have been patients say the care is superb. So, point number one is the fact that our hospital is tops and we're in good hands while we are there.

Folks of the area visiting there have another factor in their favor. It has been a convenience and a time saver to many of us. This fact applies especially in cases of serious illness when family members stand by for weeks taking turns at giving round-the-clock attention. That gets to be an important item. Imagine the extra time and mileage involved if all visitors and special attendants, several every day, had to go to distant hospitals. People who have visited both here and away from here appreciate the difference.

Still another major factor is the simple matter of seeing one's family doctor. Presence of our hospital and that only is responsible for the fact that two doctors are practicing here. Think of the extra time and travel involved if our people had to go elsewhere for their attention.

Needless to say, time and travel are big items. Hundreds of hours and hundreds of dollars are saved by our people every week because we have a hospital here.

All of those factors combine in recommending our hospital very strongly to every person of the area. All deserve to be considered very carefully in relation to the likely possibility that a sure way of keeping our blessings will be offered to us soon. And when that time comes the important question facing each voter is whether the combination of available benefits is worth as much to him as they will cost him.

As mentioned before, the hospital district still does not have final approval of the legislature, but prospects are looking good. Meanwhile it's not premature to start comparing benefits and costs.

Would you pay an additional \$10 for license plates for the sake of prestige? That opportunity will be yours in the future, according to a bill passed by the Legislature. For the 10 bucks you can specify three letters to be printed on the plates, for instance your initials, or your name if it's short enough. Anticipated revenue is \$5 million a year, to go into tourist and industrial development.

Tony Hesse, 67, a native of Muenster and a life-long resident, died at 1 a.m. Wednesday in Lisbon Veterans Administration Hospital in Dallas where he had been a patient ten weeks. He had been in declining health in recent years and sick with his final illness for about a year.

Funeral services will be held Friday morning at 9:30 in Sacred Heart Church with Father Alcuin Kubis officiating at Requiem Mass and at graveside rites in Sacred Heart Cemetery, Nick Miller Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

Two rosary services were set for Thursday at 4 and at 8 p.m. in the Miller Chapel.

Bearers will be nephews: Al Felderhoff, Raymond Hesse, Wilfred Walterscheid, Werner Yosten, Paul Hesse and Emil Rohmer.

Tony Hesse was the son of prominent pioneer residents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hesse, who were among the first to settle in Muenster when the colony was started. His father was one of the community's first merchants.

Except for a period in the army during World War II Tony Hesse lived on a farm a mile and half southwest of town where he farmed with his brother Alois Hesse. He never married.

Survivors are six sisters, Mmes. John Rohmer, August Walterscheid, John Felderhoff, Nick Yosten, and Albert Henscheid and Miss Theresa Hesse, all of Muenster; Alois Hesse of Muenster and Meinrad Hesse of Lindsay.

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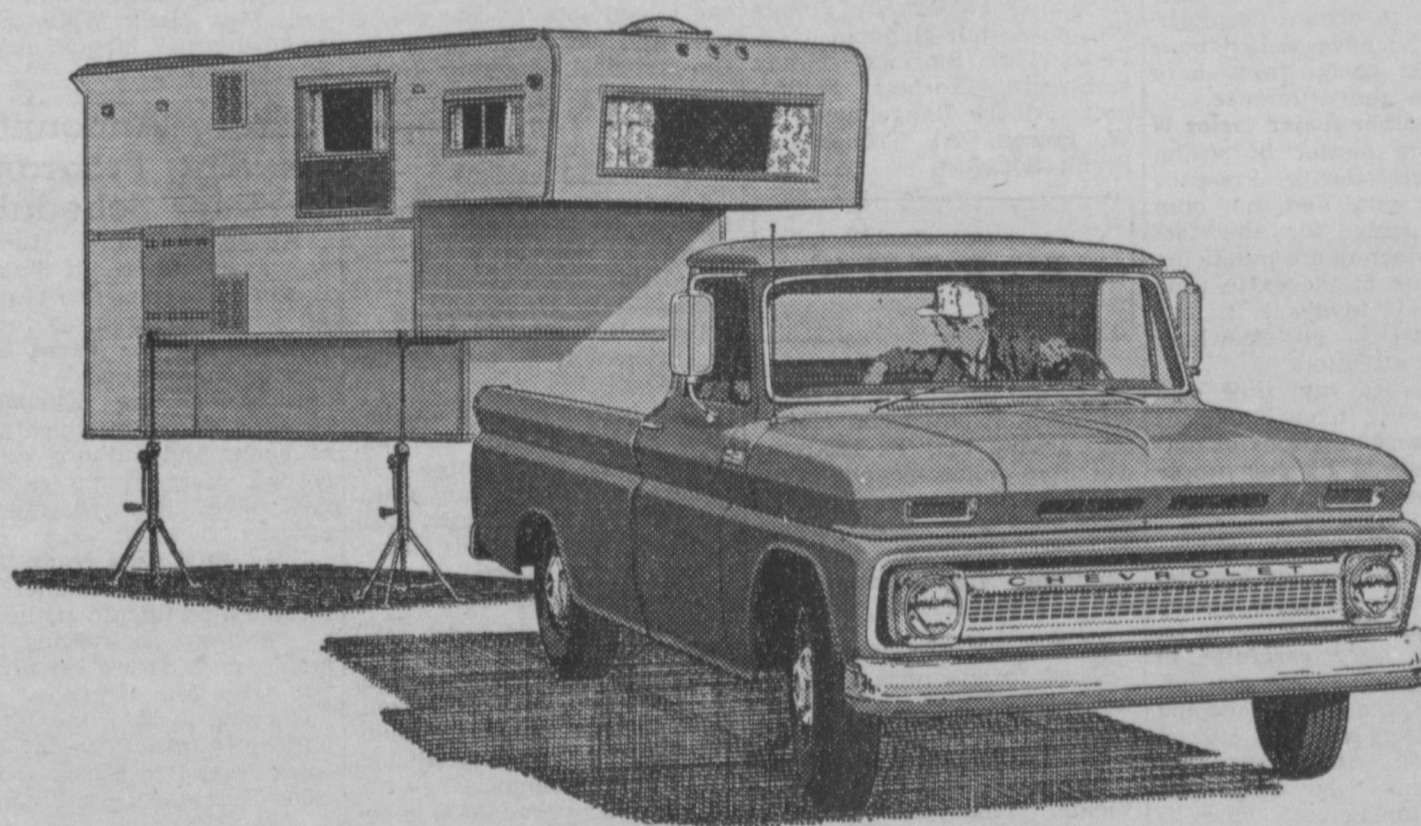

Even if no benefits are payable right away, there's an advantage in having your claim already approved when you actually retire."

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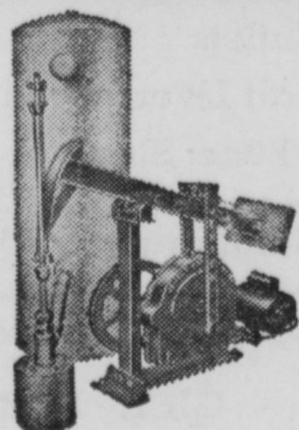

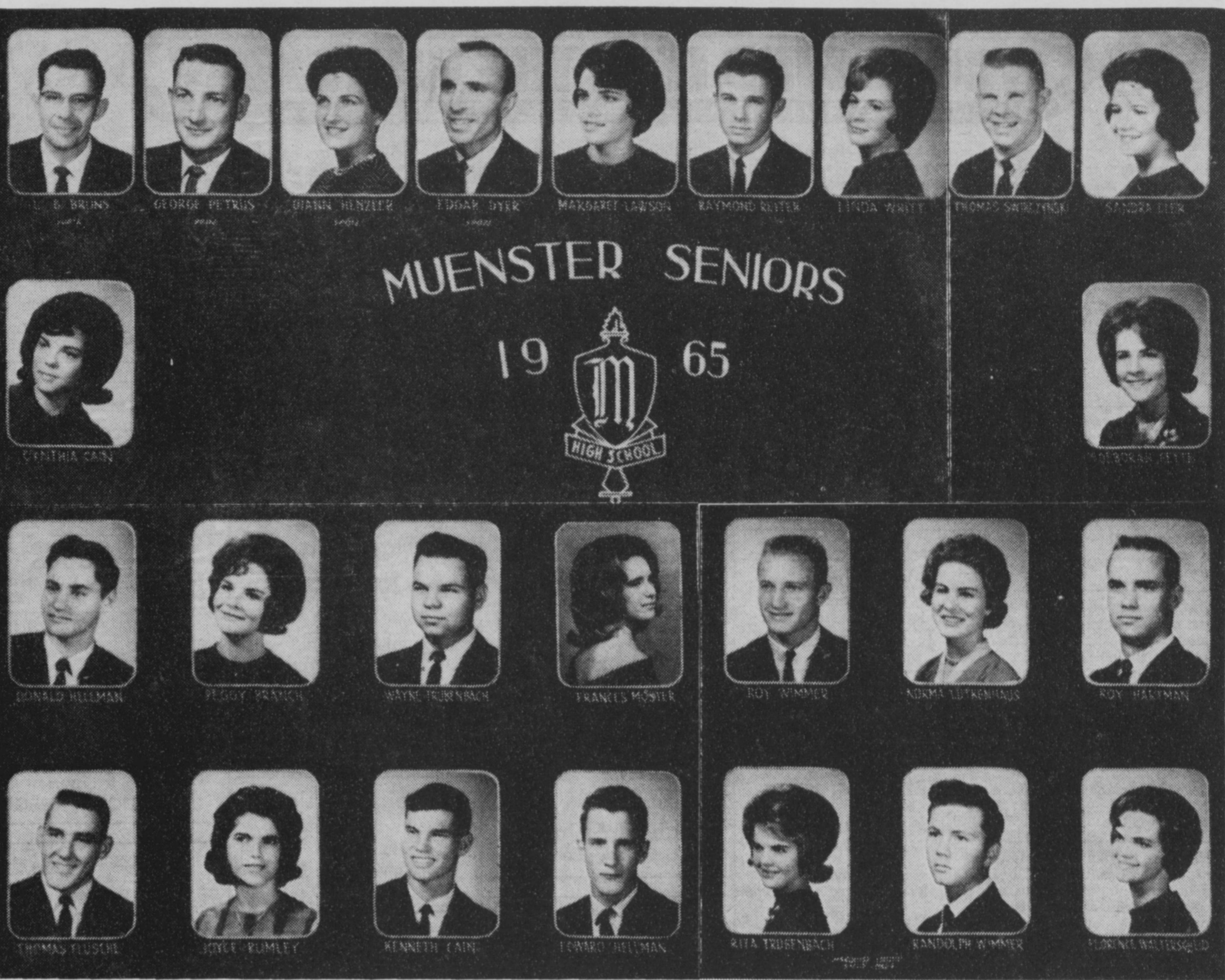
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Horses & Cowboys Of Colonial Acres In Tenn., Va., Shows

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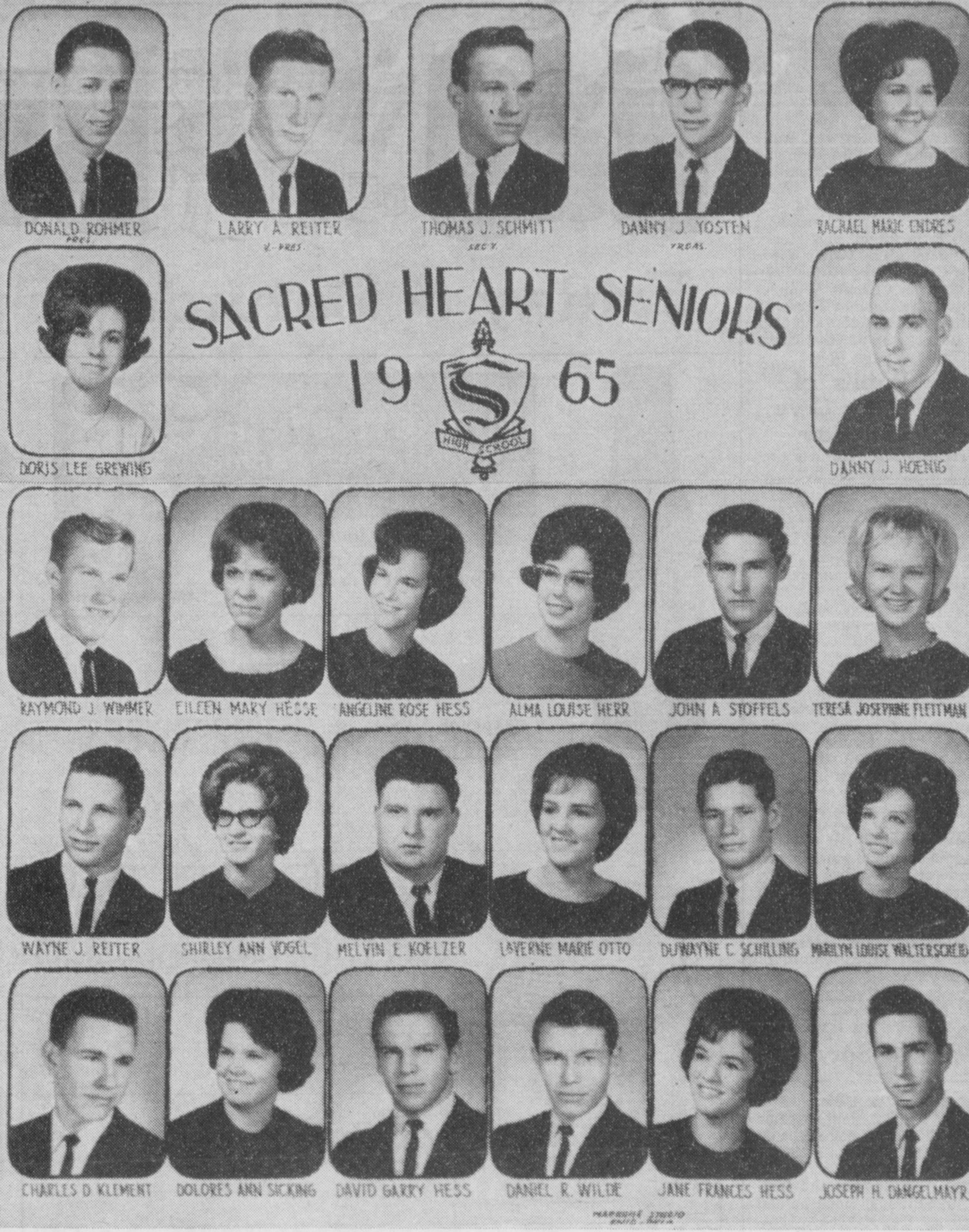

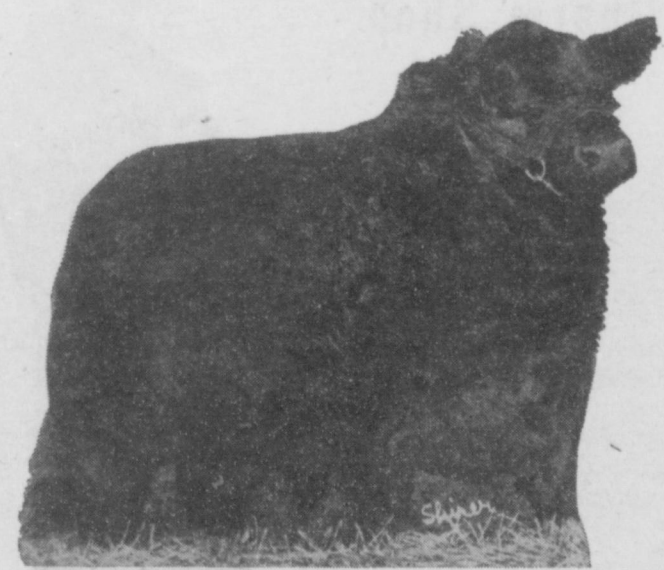

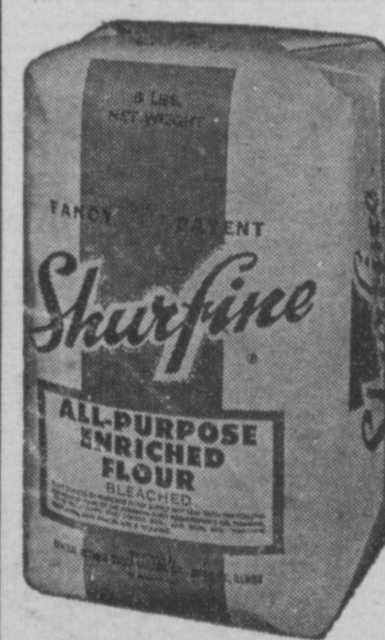
