erty renditions. County Judge William Carroll explained that the tax reduction is due principally to hikes in oil and land valuations. Oil valuations are up \$2 million over 1964 figures and land is up a half million

dollars. Cooke County's tax rate remained at 74 cents for a number of years until it was raised in the mid-1950s to 84 cents. The ten cent hike was voted to purchase highway right-ofway throughout the county.

With the new tax rate there are only five counties in Texas that have lower rates than Cooke. Comparable 1964 tax rates in surrounding counties show Montague with 95 cents; Denton. \$1.04; Grayson. \$1.05; and Wise, \$1.10.

Sound financial condition of Cooke County is indicated in that despite the tax cut a for all elective office holders was ordered by the Court. The pay hikes will be effective January 1, 1966, at start of the new fiscal year.

The Communist Party had 12.000 members in 1932. When Roosevelt recognized Russia in 24,000. After four years of the less male drivers. "New Deal," Communist Party membership was 40,000 in 1936. By 1938 the "reforms of the thirties" had upped the membership in the Communist

Party to 75,000. Only when Stalin and Hitler signed their pact did membership fall in 1939, but, during the American-Soviet alliance in World War II, membership began to climb again and rose to almost 80,000. The beginning of the "cold war" in 1947 brought membership back down to 59,000. It brought, too, a change in Soviet technique. Moscow doesn't press for party membership these days. The emphasis is on giving guidance and leadership and money to "peace" fronts, youth organizations and racial agitation fronts. Moscow presently finds these organizations more useful than an expanded membership. Also, de-emphasis on recruitment of members, as such, makes it more difficult for the FBI to place additional undercover agents inside the Communist Party itself.

The record shows that when the US and the USSR are "friends," the membership in the party grows. This is because the Communist Party, USA, has no independent existance. It is a creature of the Soviet Union and its life and fortunes ride with those of the Soviet Union. As the Administration proceeds with its "Great Society" and further expansion of "the reforms of the Thirties," we will see membership begin to rise again. And the rise of the front organizations will keep pace, for the cadre technique has been too successful for Moscow to abandon it.



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
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

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Public Water Approved by AMA Is fluoridation of public water

supplies an effective method of reducing tooth decay. Yes, says an official policy statement of the American

Medical Association. Is introduction of fluorine into public water supplies

Again, the AMA says yes. The position of the medical organization with regard to fluoridation is set down in a new pamphlet published by the

The association first endorsed the principal of fluoridation of community water supplies in 1951, and further reaffirmed this position in 1957.

The AMA's Council on Foods and Nutritions and the Council on Drugs in a joint statement declared:

"Fluoridation of public water supplies so as to provide the approximate equivalent of 1 part per million of fluorine in drinking water has been estabished as a method for reducing dental caries in children up to 10 years of age. In localities with warm climates, or where for other reasons the ingestion of water or other sources of considerable fluoride content is high, a lower concentration of fluoride is adviseable. On the basis of available evidence, it appears that this method decreases the incidence of caries during childhood. Other evidence indicates as well a reduction in th rate of dental caries up

to at least 44 years of age.

"No evidence has been found to prove that continous ingestion of water containing the equivalent of approximately 1 part per million of fluorine for long periods by large segments of the population is harmful to the general health. Mottling of the tooth enamel associated with the level of fluordation is minimal. The importance of this mootling is outweighed by the caries - inhibiting effect of the fluoride.

"Fluoridation of public water supplies should be regarded as a prophylactic measure for reducing tooth decay at the community level and is applicable where the water supply contains less than the equivalent of 7 part per million of fluorine.

This statement was adopted by the House of Delegates of the AMA as official policy of the medical organization.

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
