

Americans would be paying \$2.2 billion more per year for gasoline, if motor fuel had risen along with the Consum-er Price Index during the past 10 years. That remainder comes from Governor John Connally of Texas, who is this year's chairman of the 33-state Interstate Oil Compact Compact Commission.

In a speech at the Commission's recent mid-year meeting, he pointed out that the average price of gasoline has actually declined in the past decade, while the cost of living has continued to rise. Between 1955 and 1964, the Consumer Price Index rose 16 percent, while the price of gasoline excluding taxes - dropped





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
