The Pope's speech was only an elaboration of the angelic message at the time of Christ's birth - "Peace on earth to men of good will." The way to eliminate war and reduce human suffering is to substitute love and understanding for selfishness and intrigue which too often dominates the dealings among nations. The noble purpose which he held up for the UN was no different from the one originally proclaimed in the organization's charter. But the method Plan Is Shaping of operation prescribed by him was so very different from the one that has been in use.

Already we hear there will likely be political implications resulting from the Pope's endorsement of United Nations. It can be interpreted as a repudiation of views to the contrary, and critics of the UN can expect to be accused of disagreeing with a very eminent man of God.

The contestant must correctly name each plant and tell whether the plant is annual or perennial, warm season or cool season, native or introduced, grazing value as to whether good, fair, or poor, and wildlife value whether good, fair or poor. Training of this nature is intended to give the future farmer some worthwhile information about management of grasses, so as to keep them thrifty and productive.

NEAR 50,000 A YEAR In 1962 highway deaths topped the 40,000 mark, and in 1965 the 50,000 mark is not far away. In 1964 America's highways were stained with the blood of 48,000 persons.

Tragedy did not stop with the deaths, but added 3,840, 000 persons to the injured list according to the Travelers Insurance Companies which has completed a survey of statistics from motor vehicle departments. Four million copies of The Travelers report are distributed annually.

political power in an effort to bring about a major change in the Taft-Hartley Act That change is to eliminate Section 14(b), which authorizes the states to enact Right-to-Work laws. If the effort is successful, every worker in major industry will have to join and pay dues to a union. regardless of his wishes and beliefs, or lose his job.

We will see what happens. But if Taft-Hartley is to be changed and amended, there are certain other steps which urgently need to be taken. As the Los Angeles Times puts it, "It should be amended to prohibit discrimination by unons on the basis of race, color or creed. It should be amended to prohibit the use of duties for political purposes. It should be amended to provide for secret balloting in union representation elections. Union leaders would fight most such amendments to the bitter end. But equity, fair play, and just plain common horse sense demand that the one change not be made without the other."
