FOOD FOR FREEDOM

ANY FEED MAKES SILAGE

Feed in a silo will keep indefinitely, says Albert Brient, County Agent. Some crops make better silage, but anything which cattle will eat is good filling for the silo.

It is not necessary to have a big crew and fill the trench in a day or two, Brient explained. A farmer with one helper could fill a 20-foot section of a 100 by 6 foot trench in three days by putting down a two foot layer daily. In this way the trench should be filled completely in 15 days, using a cutter or by 'shingling' in the bundles. In upright or pit silos, however, bundles could not be used.

Groups like corn, grain sorghums and sweet sorghums may be handled in the same manner for silage. Other crops or groups, require different treatment. If any of the former group is destined for the silo immediately after cutting the grain should be in the stiff dough stage. If the maturity of the leaves are a healthy green and are chopped into one-half inch length or less, no water need be added. If the feed is put down in bundles enough water should be added to dampen it.

On the other hand if the maturity of the leaves are dry and little juice is in the stalk enough water should be added, even when chopped, to dampen the feed. Bundles should be wet thoroughly. The protein content of corn and grain and sweet sorghums in the stiff dough stage is five to six per cent. To increase the protein, cut the sorghums in the bloom stage and the corn in the milk stage, and allow them to lay in the field until about half dry enough to bale for hay. When put in the trench add enough water to dampen it. Johnson grass, which if saved is abundant enough to feed all of the cattle in Texas, and sudan grass make good silage. But if put into the silo immediately the seed should be in the stiff dough stage. In that state the protein content will be about six per cent, but if these grasses are cut before heading the silage will analyze from 12 to 14 per cent protein. However, these grasses when cut before heading should be allowed to lay until two-thirds dry enough to bale for hay before being stored in the silo, Brient says.

RATIONS FOR HIRED HANDS

If you are going to have any temporary hired hands on your farm or ranch in the season ahead, this news may be of interest.

You can now get allotments of rationed foods for feeding temporary hired hands you've employed for 60 days or under. Previously the allotments were available for workers hired for 30 days or less. If however, you've hired a hand for more than 60 days you're supposed to collect points in exchange for the rationed foods you serve.

This news has been sent the Texas A. & M. Extension Service by the Office of Price Administration. If you have a hired hand employed for less than 60 days, apply for his allotment with your local ration board.

MAKE GRAPE JUICE AT HOME

This is the harvest season for wild grapes and for some of the improved varieties. If you're interested in making some grape juice at home, you'll be glad to learn that you can make a high quality juice from thoroughly ripened grapes without the addition of sugar.

Mrs. Julia E. Kelley, Cooke county home demonstration agent, explains that wild Mustang grapes contain little natural grape sugar and yield only about half as much juice as some of the improved varieties. The Mustang juice can be combined with others, however, for a good product.

Public Schools Get \$4 Additional Payment

AUSTIN. — A \$4 supplement payment on this year's per capita apportionment of \$25 was made available to public schools Monday. The supplemental payment totals \$6,044,844, based on 1,511,211 scholastics, said the State Department of Education.

It was made possible by a balance in the available school fund after full payment of the \$25 apportionment. The State Board of Education approved the additional payment, subject to approval of the Attorney General's Department which was given recently. The board indicated that so far as possible the additional money should be used to increase teacher salaries.

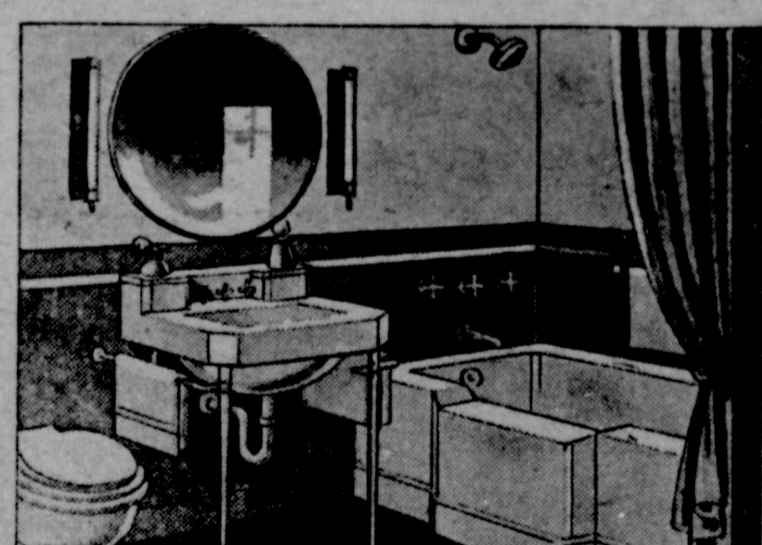

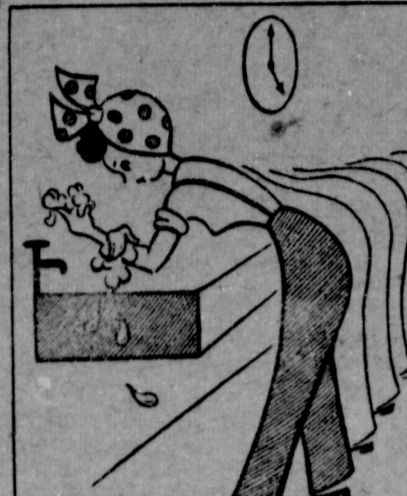

To prepare juice, stem about 3 1/2 pounds fully ripe grapes and crush thoroughly. Add 1 1/2 cups water, bring to a boil, and simmer, covered, 10 minutes. Place fruit in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice.
Measure sugar into dry dish and set aside until needed. Measure juice into a 5- to 6-quart saucepan. Place over hottest fire. Add powdered fruit pectin, mix well, and continue stirring until mixture comes to a boil. At once pour

ually wrapped should be enclosed in inner boxes of wood, metal or cardboard.
Perishable goods, such as fruits and vegetables that may spoil, are prohibited. Intoxicants, inflammable materials such as matches or lighter fluids, poisons, and anything that may damage mail, also are prohibited. Gifts enclosed in glass should be substantially packed to avoid breakage. Sharp instruments, such as razors and knives, must have their edges and points protected so that they cannot cut through the coverings and injure postal personnel or damage other packages.
Relatives and friends who know that the personnel in the armed services to whom they plan to send gifts are at far distant points should begin to mail their packages on the opening day - September 15 - of the mailing period. Last year late mailings, causing concentration of great numbers of packages in the final days of the mailing period, threatened to defeat the program. It is stressed that success can be assured, with the limited personnel and facilities, only if the public gives full cooperation through prompt mailings of the overseas gift parcels from the opening of the mailing period.

COUNTY TAX RATE SET AT 56 CENTS

At a meeting Thursday the county commissioners court tentatively set the county tax rate at 56 cents, the same rate that has been in effect since 1938. Judge C.F. Sullivant reported Friday.

Though this rate does not become legal until after August 15, it was tentatively set, he explained, in order that the tax assessor-collector could start making out his rolls.

The 56-cent total will probably be broken down into the following divisions: general fund 25 cents; road and bridge fund, special, 15 cents; road and bridge fund, regular, 11 cents; jury fund, one cent permanent improvement fund, 4 cents.
