Small Rain Gets The community's weekend

rainfall measured only 1.16 inch but it was enthusiastically welcomed by area farmers. Though far short of area needs it brings relief to the neardrought that has been hanging on for the past eight months.

With a total of only .5 inch in January and February and 9.2 for the preceding six months, the community has had only 9.7 since July 1, and vegetation has been just hanging on. Ranges are tinder dry and grain crops, though still having a bright color, have no height.

General opinion is that the weekend rain will give the grain a pick-up while waiting for the next moisture, which, hopefully, will not be long in coming. Pastures got a similar assist. They can get started but need more rain. This rainfall, plus .01 measured earlier, brings the month's moisture total to 1.17



The Senator adds that members of the military should not be above criticism, and any abuses should be exposed and corrected. But when the doves complain about fringe benefits being too extravagant for the military, they are out of line. If they want to save they really ought to start at home.

Convinced by their own idealism or influenced by the detente propaganda that communists are spreading over the country, those people argue that the money could be spent more wisely and more humanely on social programs. Bless America."

No one will deny that their program is more desirable. Everybody agrees that it is better to concentrate on improving our way of life than to make these expensive preparations for death and destruction. But the objectors ignore the most important point. That is that the Soviets are expanding their military as fast as possible, and prudence demands that we maintain the capability to defend ourselves if that power should challenge us.

Well, it is a documented fact that the Russians are already ahead of us in power and still gaining, as shown in a recently completed study by the Library of Congress. It shows, among other things, that the Soviet combat force outnumbers ours 4.8 million to 2.1 million. Also, in the European theatre Russia and its allies of the Warsaw Pact have 895,000 troops stationed Yr. whereas the NATO countries have only 625,000. And the '66 '67 comparison of weapons is even more one sided. NATO is **'68** outnumbered 19,000 to 7,000 in '69 tanks, 2,900 to 2,300 in tactical '70 aircraft. Reed, County Supervisor of the Farmers Home Administration (Fm-HA). Measures to alleviate problems of waste disposal and

pollution control on farms may be eligible for financing through this source. "These funds are available

on a first-come, first-served basis throughout the nation," Mr. Reed said. He explained that soil and

water loans from FmHA can be used to develop water supplies for home use, livestock watering or irrigation. The funds also can be used for drainage projects, to install water or waste facilities associated with pollution abatement and control and to build other structures that contribute to conservation and meet health, safety and environmental requirements. Funds also may be used to

level land, establish permanent pasture, develop farm forests, and to carry out basic soil treatment practices such as liming, fertilizing, and subsoiling.

These loans may be repaid in terms as long as 40 years with an interest rate of five percent charged on the unpaid principal. Applications may be obtained at the Farmers Home
