teresting as he lists an assortment of experts who apparently are baffled by the IRS seeking the state's endorseforms. He says that account. ants making out the income tax report are found to be wrong 75 per cent of the time. Lawyers are worse, their average for bungling is 78 per cent. But who's the worst of them all? Believe it or not it's the members of the IRS staff whose job is to help us puzzled taxpayers determine what we owe Uncle Sam. Their average for being wrong is 79 per cent.

With this much confusion already reported, a person is inclined to wonder whether it doesn't actually get more involved. For instance, who are the super-experts, or whatever they call them, who pass judgment on those lawyers and accountants and tax people? Who can say that they are right? If their checkups were re-checked, what would their grade be?

In one respect this is a laughable situation. Imagine all that confusion in the atmosphere of authority and finality with which these people surround themselves. But consider also that the figure they hand down as the corrected amount of your indebtedness also stands a fair chance of being wrong. It's only reasonable to assume that the IRS official experts are subject to about the same percentage of error as the other experts. So, nobody really knows whether he paid the correct tax.

The real absurdity about this situation is that people hire tax experts because the tax forms are too tough for them - but they're also too tough for the experts. That seems like more than sufficient reason to simplify the forms. For many years people have been begging for an any one can fill out his own and save the fee that has been paid to the experts. It's been suggested also to eliminate deductions. Just pay a certain percentage of gross income, and that's all.

However, people will not vote for candidates but rather for delegates who are pledged to support those candidates at the national convention. The number of dele-15.9. gates per candidate is determind by the total number of votes in the state senatorial

district. The local district is allowed three delegates per candidate. hence the ballot lists four groups of three each, the first group for Wallace, the second for Bentsen, the third for Carter, and the fourth not pledged to anyone. To support either of the candidates a person votes for that candidate's three delegates, or if none of the candidates is wanted the voter can vote for the fourth or uncommitted trio.

It's possible also to split support between candidates by voting for delegates from the separate groups. However the limit is 3 votes in the entire list of 12 delegates.

# YOU CAN

The financial crisis of New York last year drew world wide attention in financial circles. The possibility of any metropolis collapsing into bankruptcy, however, has serious implications for every municipality in the country.

Most cities raise money for capital improvements, such as streets, 'sewer systems and water systems by selling bonds. These can be either general revenue bonds, paid off by general taxes, or revenue bonds, which are paid off by the users - a water bill is a good example, since the revenue is used in part to pay off water bonds.

Banks are probably the largest single buyer of municipal bonds throughout the country. But, before banks, or any others buy bonds they must have confidence that the bonds will be paid off at the pro-per time and at the stated rate of interest. While the city of New

York may have brought on its financial crisis through profligate programs and spending - plus some highly questionable bookkeeping practices — its demise would throw all municipal bond users under a cloud. Ultimately, it could mean higher city taxes, because municipal bond money would be more expensive.
