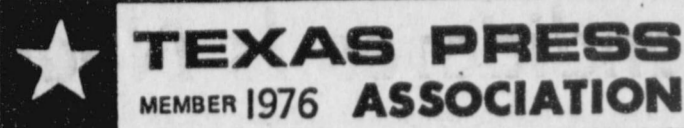

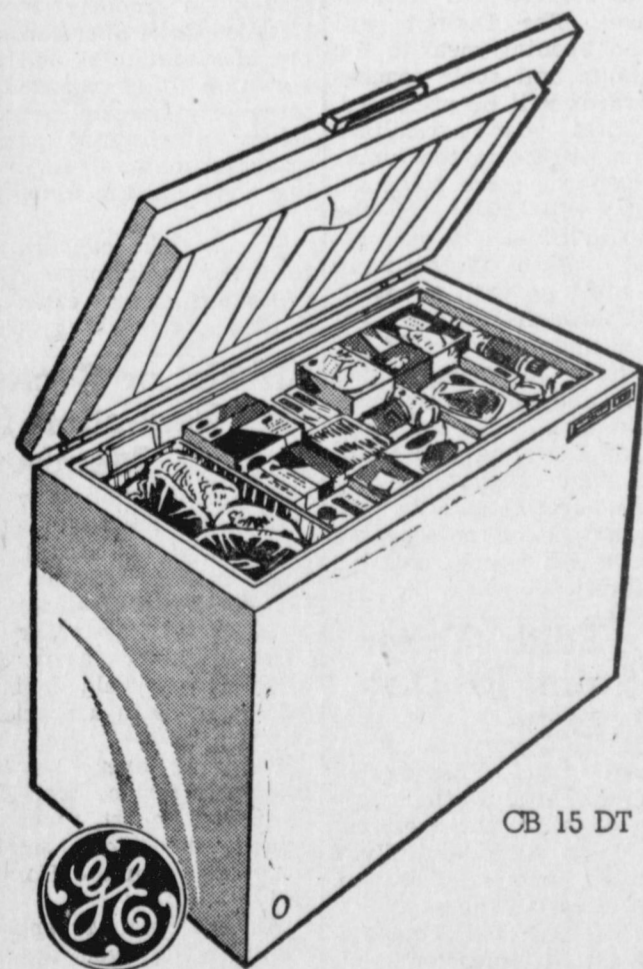

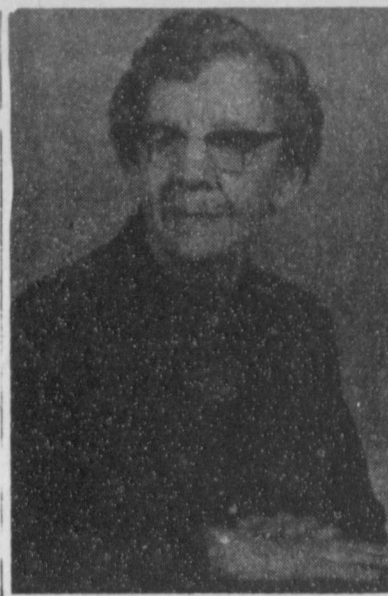
TEJAS 1876

February 23 - March 1, 1876
 YOUNG COUNTY Sheriff Dick Kirk was instantly killed Monday morning at Belknap by Buffalo Bill. Kirk attempted to arrest Bill, drawing his pistol. At the same time, Bill picked up a needle gun. They fired together. Bill missed the sheriff, but was himself shot in the breast. Buffalo Bill fired a second shot, after falling, shooting Kirk through the head. Buffalo Bill escaped, but was traced some distance by the

blood, and it is thought he was fatally wounded.
 LAMAR COUNTY — As much as 5,000 yards, or about a mile and three fourths of track is being laid per day on the Trans Continental branch of the Texas and Pacific Railroad between Brookston and Paris.
 HOUSTON — Croup is prevalent here to the great anxiety of parents.
 GIDDINGS — The Centennial Masquerade Ball was a brilliant success, reflecting

credit upon the city. The attendance was large, from all sections.
 GRAHAM — A party that started from here after Buffalo Bill has returned and report him dead.
 BEXAR COUNTY — General Ord will probably organize a frontier scouting party to consist of two regiments of cavalry.
 GALVESTON — The north-er yesterday made the atmosphere of the cockpit of the Central Market anything but genial to His Honor, and judicial proceedings were suspended until a fire had been kindled in the court room; in the

meantime, the judge toasted his shins in the police headquarters.
 ERATH COUNTY — Farming is decidedly progressive here. Erath County is taking steps to organize an Agricultural and Mechanical Association.
 WOOD COUNTY — Thursday's eastbound through freight on the Texas and Pacific Railroad fell through a trestle about two miles west of Mineola. The engine passed over unharmed, the caboose also escaped, the remainder of the train was wrecked.
 GALVESTON — Many folks are arriving from the interior for the Mardi Gras celebrations.

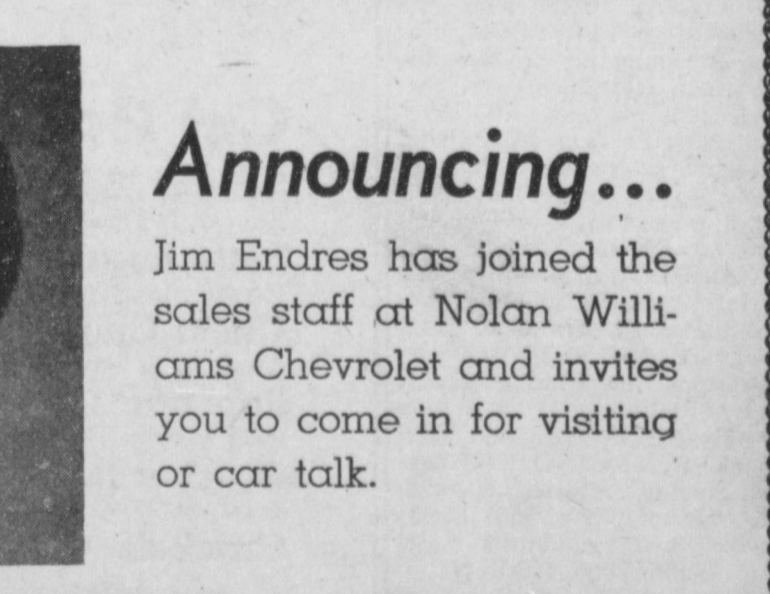

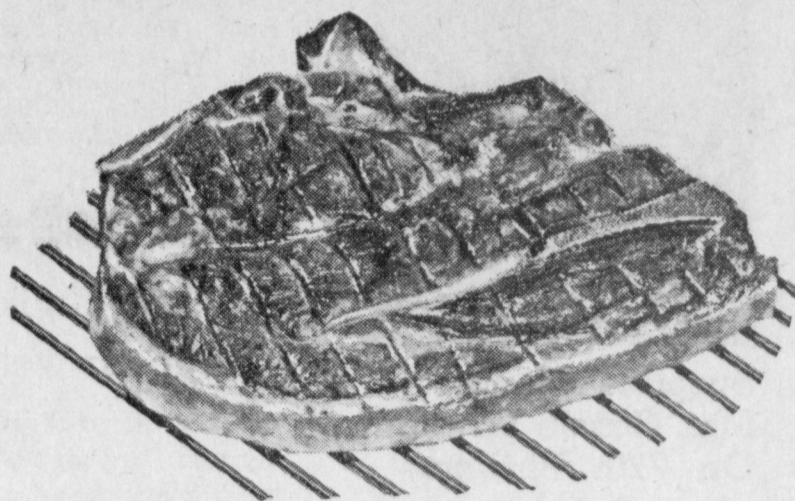

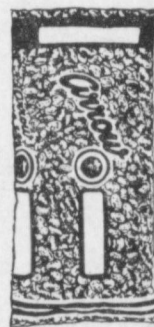

4-H Club News

Several Cooke County boys and girls have already started planning their 4-H clothing project. Clothing is one of the most popular 4-H projects. It isn't limited to girls, either. Last year several Cooke County boys participated in the project with three of them entering garments in the County Dress Revue. 1975 was a landmark year for the National Dress Revue as Kevin Kerr, Cygnet, Ohio, became the first young man to participate as a state winner.

4-H clothing program isn't all sewing, although one objective is to develop skills in planning, buying, and constructing clothing. Youth also learn how to select suitable accessories, correct posture, and good grooming habits, and how to work and share with others. Helping young people understand themselves in order to select and make clothing which is becoming and expressive of the individual personality is another objective.

4-H'ers study clothing with the help of volunteer adult leaders. These leaders assist the youth in setting goals, and in planning activities and events to reach the goals. Adult leaders also teach the 4-H'ers basic clothing knowledge and construction skills. An adult doesn't have to be a professional seamstress to be a clothing project leader; just a person with a desire to help others.

TP&L Will Invest \$313 Million on '76 Construction

Texas Power & Light Company plans to spend \$313,519,000 for the construction of new facilities in 1976. J. F. Skelton, TP&L president, announced.

The construction budget is the largest in the Company's 64-year history, and expenditures will be necessary for TP&L to keep pace with the growing electrical demands of customers in its 51-county service area.

During 1976, TP&L will continue construction of numerous power plants designed to reduce the company's reliance on natural gas as a boiler fuel. Because of dwindling na-

tural gas supplies, TP&L is now focusing on other fuel sources — lignite and nuclear — for future electric power production.

The Comanche Peak nuclear plant now under construction near Glen Rose will consist of two 1,150,000-kilowatt generating units and will be owned jointly by TP&L, Dallas Power & Light Company and Texas Electric Service Company. The first unit is scheduled for operation in 1980, and the second in 1982. The companies also will build a 3,200-acre lake at the plant site. Lake water will be used for cooling purposes.

A nuclear plant produces electricity the same way a conventional plant does. The heat source is the only difference since nuclear fission produces the heat which turns water into steam. The steam spins the turbine, which in turn spins the generator, to produce electricity.

Scheduled to be placed in operation in the more immediate future are several lignite-fueled plants. TP&L has been acquiring lignite deposits in East Texas for the past 30 years. Texas lignite, a soft coal, is low in sulphur content and presents fewer environmental problems than most other forms of coal.

Four Lignite-fueled plants now under construction in Titus, Rusk, Henderson and Robertson Counties will add about 6 million kilowatts of generating capacity during the next seven years.

All of the new lignite plants are being constructed adjacent to lignite deposits estimated to be sufficient for the service life of the units.

By 1983, when the lignite-fueled plants now under construction or in design stages are completed, an estimated 67 per cent of TP&L's energy requirements will be supplied by lignite, compared with about 13 per cent in 1974. Nuclear will furnish 12 per cent of the Company's power needs, with gas and oil accounting for only 21 per cent. Lignite-fueled power plants cost more than twice as much per kilowatt to build as gas- or oil-fueled plants.

According to Company officials, TP&L is making every effort to preserve the environment in all of its operations. For instance, in the mining of lignite, the Company has an extensive and expensive program of restoring the land. After the sub-surface deposits of lignite have been removed, the soil which covered them is replaced, graded to a natural contour and planted with grasses and other vegetation compatible to the area. Thus, the land involved is restored not only in appearance, but to an equal or better state of productivity.

Also in 1976, the Company will build or improve transmission lines, distribution lines, substations or switching stations in numerous parts of its service area.

However this is not proposed to replace the welfare give-aways, and, according to Burleson's view, it will not create as many jobs as expected. He quotes Urban Institute as finding that each \$1 billion in such programs creates 30 to 60 thousand jobs . . . less than a tenth of what the program's supporters claim.

Another objection by Burleson: the expenditure of this huge sum could aggravate the problems of deficit spending and inflation, the two things which should have the highest priority of concern.

In the last analysis this is another case of socialistic politics. Most members approving the legislation come from the big cities . . . where the money will go. But the tax money to pay for it will come from all of us.
